COLUMBUS KNIGHT DAY MEMORABLE

Banquet Attended by 500 Closes Initiation and Degree Work.

LODGEMEN ATTEND MASS

Portland Members, for First Time, Induct Big Class Themselves. Every Oregon Body Sends Envoys to Take Part.

Representatives of every council in Oregon and most of those in Washington, with scattering members from Mobile, Ala.; Columbus, O.; Los Angeles, San Francisco, Denver, Colo., and from Philadelphia gathered at a banquet at the Commercial Club last evening and swelled an attendance that made the assembly the largest and most notable in the history of the Knights of Columbus in the Northwest. In the day Portland Council No. 678 exemplified three degrees for the edification of one of the strongest classes admitted to the order locally, and the banquet was principally in honor of new members and visiting brothers. The main dining-room of the Commercial Club was filled, there having been 200 reservations. Dr. Andrew C. Smith, grand knight of Portland Council, presided as toastmaster. Before introducing the speakers he referred to the progress of the order in Oregon, its relation to the Catholic Church and the fundamental principles of the organization. Rev. Father E. V. O'Hara delivered the invocation. Rev. Father Edward Conaty, a Knight of Columbus, from South Dakota, who came to Portland a month ago to assume charge of St. Rose's parish in Rose City Park, spoke on "Our Holy Father."

Postmaster Merrick Heard.

Postmaster Merrick heard to "Our President," and the theme of Frank J. Longman, deputy grand knight of Portland Council, was "Catholic Citizenship." John P. Shields, who joined the order in the East and displayed a familiarity with its success in various places, selected for his theme, "The Mission of Knighthood." State Deputy Roger B. Sinnott, under whose direction the state degree team conducted impressive portions of yesterday's initiation, spoke on "McLaughlin and Old Oregon," and Rev. Father George F. Thompson, chaplain of Portland Council, was heard on "Ideals of Fraternism." T. J. Patterson gave an impromptu address that included facts of particular interest to the candidates.

Lodgemen Attend Mass.

The day opened when the candidates assembled at the Cathedral, and in company with many members of the order attended high mass at 8 o'clock. Father Thompson preached on Columbusism and what admission to the order meant to practical Catholics. Following the mass, the candidates were collected to the Masonic Temple, at West Park and Yamhill streets, where the first degree was exemplified. In the afternoon the second and third degrees were conferred.

For the first time in the history of

an Oregon council the initiatory ceremonies were conducted by members of the home organization. It has been the custom to invite degree teams of other states to direct a part of the exercises. Recently some of the most influential councils in the country inaugurated the practice, Portland Council being among the first in the West. There may not be another class guided through the impressive services here this year, but, in any event, the programme of yesterday will go down in the Council's history as memorable.

CITY RULE PRAISED

Galveston's Success Under Commission Plan Told.

CHARLES F. ADAMS SPEAKS

Expert Points to Victory of System in Texas Seaport and Its Abuse in Des Moines—Washington Uses Method.

Charles F. Adams, an authority on the "single tax," spoke at the Young Men's Christian Association meeting yesterday on "The Commission Form of City Government." He said, in part:

"You all know the condition into which American cities were getting a few years ago, and in which some of them still are. Suddenly, through the great physical disaster at Galveston, the turning point was reached and improvement started which augurs well for the future. Many prophesied Galveston would not be rebuilt. But the emergency of the situation aroused the spirit of the business men in the city, and they obtained permission from the state to set up a temporary government, of the commission type. There is now but one city in the United States that is strictly managed on the commission plan. That is Washington, D.C."

The remarkable success of the commission of safety in Galveston was so widely and favorably spoken of in the press that other cities adopted a government in many respects similar. Des Moines Makes Change.
