Top Prices Are Offered for Several Lots in Country.

FOR PORTLAND DELIVERY

Demand From the Sound and California for Bluestem—Sales of Red Wheat to Go South.

Crop Conditions.

An increased demand for club wheat for Portland delivery was the feature of the wheat market yesterday.

There has been an especial change in the crop situation in the Northwest. The Columbia River counties are badly in need of rain, and some of the large dealers believe Oregon will not have more wheat than last year.

Trading in the oats market was quiet and there was no change in prices. Nothing was doing in barley.

Italy—The crop outlook in the south is less favorable, but in the north it is better.

Spain—The crop outlook is favorable, with climatic conditions being higher than last year.

North Africa—The crop outlook is less favorable as a result of the recent storms.

California dealers reported that 25 cents was paid to Fraser & Carter, of Sutter County, for 30,000 pounds of new hops.
