

HAVEMEYER CASH PUT IN MICHIGAN

Late Sugar Baron Interested in Merger of Independent Beet Plants.

HIS INVESTMENT SOUGHT

President of Combination Declares Stockholders Asked American Magnate to Come in but Retained Control.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—That the American sugar refining company owns 27 per cent of the common stock and 55 per cent of the preferred stock of the Michigan Sugar Refining Company, a beet sugar corporation controlling six refineries in Michigan, was declared today by C. H. Warren, president and general counsel of the beet sugar concern, in testimony before the House "sugar trust" committee of inquiry.

The Michigan company was organized in 1906, according to Mr. Warren, six independent companies having been amalgamated with a capital of about \$3,000,000 issued and an authorized capital of \$15,000,000.

Henry O. Havemeyer was interested in acquiring blocks of stock in the independent companies before the formation of the company, he said, but the controlling interest always has remained with the Michigan investors, who still hold 62 per cent of the stock.

Consolidation Was Sought.

"Did you represent the American Sugar Refining Company or Henry O. Havemeyer in seeking to bring about a consolidation of the independent beet sugar companies of Michigan in 1906?" asked Chairman Hardwick, who said that all of these companies sought to have outside capital brought into Michigan for their benefit, said Mr. Warren. "They approached Mr. Havemeyer or his representative in every instance except one, and these interests paid for all the stock purchased."

The admission by officers of the Michigan company that the sugar trust controlled 37 per cent of their stock, it was pointed out today by members of the committee, is in contradiction of statements made by representatives of that company before the ways and means committee of the House two years ago. It was then maintained that the American Sugar Refining Company had no interest in the Michigan beet sugar corporation.

33,000 Shares Obtained.

Mr. Warren also testified that Arthur Bonner and Charles R. Heike, formerly of the American Sugar Refining Company, accumulated approximately 33,000 shares of stock in the Michigan Beet Sugar company, which were merged into the Michigan Sugar Refining Company.

Mr. Warren admitted that in early years of the Michigan concern, Mr. Havemeyer, president of the American company, occasionally wrote letters to express whether he thought the price of sugar was going up or down.

President Warren submitted figures to show the increase in the business of the Michigan companies since the formation of the corporation.

Earlier in the day, Havemeyer, son of the late sugar king, closed his testimony before the committee continuing his description of the National Sugar Refining Company.

Young Mr. Havemeyer, in his testimony, defended "trusts," but limited his approval to "reasonable combinations."

SNOHOMISH FIRE SPREADS

Timber Over Wide Tract Destroyed Despite Army of Fighters.

EVERETT, Wash., June 21.—(Special.)—The most disastrous forest fire that has developed in Snohomish County since flames began to menace property and cause damage last week is burning about eight miles east of Arlington. The fire has swept over a wide tract and has caused great damage and loss in the vicinity of the Elby Logging Company and George Kunze's camp.

A report from the scene tonight is that the camp of Kunze had been destroyed by the flames. The Elby Logging Company has suffered heavy losses, the flames having caused great deal of standing timber. Both companies have every available man on the fighting line and have sent here for others.

BRUSH FIRES DYING OUT

Blaze Near Hoquiam Is Spent, and Timber Is Safe—Man Burned.

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 21.—(Special.)—The brush fires which have been sweeping over the logged-off land north and west of Hoquiam have about burned themselves out without endangering the green timber. No damage has been done and only one accident has been reported.

R. H. Eatwell, a camp cook, was severely burned about the head Monday when a brush fire swept into the bunkhouse at the camp of the Aloha Lumber Company. He was removing the belongings of the men to a place of safety when the fire was blown into the building by a sudden gust of wind, setting fire to the structure. Eatwell was badly, but not dangerously, burned before he could escape.

First Forest Fire Destroys Home.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 21.—(Special.)—A forest fire, the first of the season in this county, yesterday destroyed the farm house of Oliver McKee, four miles from Amboy. He was away at the time.

POWDER TRUST DISSOLVED

Government Wins Suit Against 28 Defendants in Delaware.

WILMINGTON, Del., June 21.—The Federal Government today won its suit to dissolve alleged powder trusts, in a decision handed down late this afternoon by Judge Lanning, in the United States Circuit Court for the District of Delaware.

The suit was instituted in 1907 under the Sherman antitrust act against 43 corporations and individual defendants.

The court dismissed the petition as to 15 defendants and held that the other 28 were in combination to restrain interstate commerce and that the combination was dissolved.

WOODMEN RAISE SALARIES

Rochester Convention to Pay Sovereign Officers More.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., June 21.—Woodmen of the World in biennial session here today adopted salary increases recommended by the salaries committee as follows:

Sovereign commander, \$10,000 to \$12,000; sovereign adviser, \$500 to \$800; sovereign clerk, \$500 to \$1,000; chairman of finance committee, \$500 to \$700; sovereign attorney, \$500 to \$700.

Expenses of the managers were fixed at \$12 a day, with no change in the mileage allowance.

Water Tank Fire Quelled.

The water tanking of the Oregon Furniture Manufacturing Company, at 1214 Macadam Road, caught fire yesterday evening. Engine Company No. 10 experienced difficulty in extinguishing the flames. Sparks ignited a narrow walk around the tank, which is about 70 feet high, and the flames burned it away before the department could extinguish them. The damage was slight.

TRIBUNE ASSERTS EVIDENCE STOLEN

George O. Glavis Alleged to Have Facts Involving "Certain Senator."

ARREST WILL BE MADE

Charge Is That Newspaper Paid to Defendant \$650 to Get Papers, and That He Would Not Turn Them Over to Employer.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—James Keely, general manager of the Chicago Tribune, tonight swore out a warrant for the arrest of George O. Glavis, of Chicago, charging him with stealing books, documents and papers, the Tribune's property, said to contain the evidence of "moral turpitude" of a United States Senator and other Government officials.

The books and records that figure in the case were said tonight to be in connection with business relations of the "certain Senator" and Government officials before certain Federal departments in Washington. The Tribune was to use this as evidence, "wherever competent in the public interest."

The Tribune alleges that it furnished Mr. Glavis with \$650 which it asserts was the amount he said the vendor of the business demanded. Mr. Keely charged tonight that Mr. Glavis said the records are not now in his possession.

The Washington authorities tonight notified the Chicago police to arrest Mr. Glavis.

Wade H. Ellis, former assistant to the Attorney-General, has been engaged by the Tribune as its counsel. Mr. Keely said tonight that Mr. Glavis came to him in Chicago some time ago and said that he knew that the books of a certain firm in Washington contained documentary evidence both of the moral turpitude of a certain United States Senator and other officers of the Government.

Mr. Glavis, as agent of the Tribune, said Mr. Ellis "was authorized to purchase the business and all its books and papers and was paid a certain amount to make the purchase."

Mr. Glavis reported that he had made the purchase of the business and its records, but has declined to turn them over to the Tribune, or to say what disposition has been made of them.

Mr. Glavis is said to be with an advertising agency in Chicago.

CITIES MAY USE JOINT LINE

Portland Capital Proposes to Supply Harbor With Water.

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 21.—(Special.)—J. D. Moughamer, city engineer of Hoquiam, appeared before the City Council this evening and submitted a proposal to build a water supply system for this city and Aberdeen. He is backed by Portland capital and the syndicate proposes to invest about \$150,000 in the plant.

The proposal is to build a plant to bring water to the limits of the two cities and sell to each, the water to be distributed through the municipal systems. In Hoquiam adoption of the plan will necessitate the purchase of the local plant by the city, which is owned by a private corporation.

Mr. Moughamer plans to bring water either from the Wynoochee of Humpulps River, in the National forest reserve, building a 24-inch pipeline about 25 miles in length.

The matter was referred to the water committee, which was instructed to confer with the Aberdeen Council. In order to make the plan practical both cities must make contracts with the company. Hoquiam is already considering the purchase of the local plant.

TAFT PRAISED IN HEBREW

Liberalism of President Commended in Orthodox Convention.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The endorsement of the Orthodox Jewish congregation of this city for his renomination in 1912, was accorded President Taft last night.

The meeting was attended by Chief Rabbi Margolis, of New York, and Levithal, of Philadelphia, as well as by many of the most prominent Jews in Washington. Several speeches in praise of Mr. Taft's liberal policy as exhibited toward the Jews were made. These were followed by a resolution contrasting with the persecution received in Russia. The entire meeting was conducted in Hebrew.

PROMOTERS IN TOL

Realty Men Use Mails for Defrauding, Alleged.

BUYERS BELIEVED MANY

Fullman, Wash., Man Charges That Jovita Heights Lands Sold for High Prices Are Not Worth Sum That Is Asked.

SEATTLE, June 21.—W. A. Ridge-way, of Spokane, president of the Jovita Heights Company, and Harry Lyons, advertising manager of the same company, were arrested today on Federal warrants charging them with using the mail to defraud. They were released on \$5000 bond each to appear tomorrow before United States Commissioner W. D. Totten for a preliminary hearing.

The complaint was sworn out by Benjamin M. Bell, of Pullman, Wash., who charges the defendants with having sent fraudulent matter to him through the mail in connection with lots in Jovita Heights, a townsite in the southwestern part of King County, not far from Tacoma.

The complaint alleged that the townsites company advertised valuable logged-off land for sale and did sell 25-foot lots at prices ranging from \$140 to \$5000. This land, the complaint charges, is really worth only \$50 an acre.

It is asserted the Jovita Heights company has sold lots to people from all parts of the United States. The defendants say they have spent more than \$25,000 developing the property.

WOOL BILL FACES CRISIS

As the result of the Senate's action, Senator Penrose before adjournment, called a meeting of the finance committee of which he is chairman, for 10:30 o'clock tomorrow morning and he and other regular Republicans predicted that when the Senate convenes at noon tomorrow the wool measure, together with the free list bill, will be reported adversely.

Today's fight began the instant that the wool revision bill appeared from the House. Senator Jones, apparently with the approval of Democratic leaders, moved that the finance committee be instructed to report the bill back to the Senate on or before July 16. The admitted purpose of the motion was to prevent the finance committee from holding the bill indefinitely or from failing to report it at all.

The result of the Gore motion was to disrupt so completely the lines that have formed in the Senate that it cannot be foretold when a vote can be reached on the reciprocity bill or whether enough votes can be mustered to pass it without amendment.
