

MEXICO WILL TRY PRYCE FOR MURDER

Extradition of Tia Juana Rebels as Common Criminals Demanded.

BAND WILL BE PURSUED

Supreme Court Decision in Similar Case Cited in Support of Contention That Habeas Corpus Writ Must Fail.

SAN DIEGO, June 21.—With the arrest of Carl Rhye Pryce in Los Angeles on a charge of murder and arson, preferred by the Mexican Consul in San Diego, Dr. Joaquin Diaz Prieto begins one of the most widespread criminal prosecutions ever undertaken. It is said, on the Pacific Coast, State Senator Wright is acting as legal adviser to the Mexican Consul and the complaint and proceedings were drawn and instituted by him.

It is the purpose of the Mexican Consul not only to prosecute Pryce, but every member of the rebel band that took Tia Juana May 9 and killed its defenders in so doing. Most of the members of the band have been learned and warrants are out for their arrest on the same charge that was preferred against Pryce.

General Mosby Wanted.

General Mosby is wanted on a charge of violation of the neutrality laws of the United States, but this is not in connection with the investigation started by Dr. Prieto.

The men wanted on the criminal charges preferred by the Mexican Consul will be arrested wherever found in the United States and if the contention of Senator Wright is sustained, they cannot be released on habeas corpus proceedings, but must be turned over to the Mexican courts for trial.

Extradition proceedings will be instituted at Washington by the Mexican officials as fast as arrests in these cases are made.

"During my investigation of the neutrality laws recently," said Mr. Wright today, "I found a decision by Chief Justice Fuller, of the United States Supreme Court, which clearly pointed out the way for the arrest and extradition of all who participated in the Tia Juana raid on the charge of murder and arson."

Previous Offender Shot.

"A raid was made on the town of San Ygnacio, Mexico, in 1902, by a man named Ines Ruiz and associates, who later sought refuge in Texas. A Mexican Consul swore to a complaint before a United States Commissioner, charging Ruiz with murder and arson. He was arrested and habeas corpus proceedings were brought, based on the theory that Ruiz was engaged in war and hence was a political offender and not subject to extradition. The Supreme Court held that he could not be released on habeas corpus and he was delivered to the Mexican authorities, tried and shot."

This case and the extradition treaty with Mexico were followed in the arrest of General Pryce. On the day the Mexican citizens charged with violating the neutrality laws were discharged by United States Commissioner Christian here, complaints were drawn charging Pryce with murder and arson. These complaints were sworn to by the Mexican Consul, who submitted them to the Department of Justice, and after a careful investigation warrants were issued against Pryce was arrested.

"At the time the complaints were filed Governor Vega, of Ensenada, was supplied with copies and the Ensenada authorities are taking the necessary steps to have Pryce extradited."

MOSBY REPULSES FEDERALISTS

Two Killed in Skirmish With Outposts Near Tia Juana.

SAN DIEGO, June 21.—The advance guard of Governor Vega's force of federalists, en route from Ensenada to Tia Juana, encountered Mosby's outposts this afternoon at Carrizito, 20 miles southeast of Tia Juana. In the skirmish that followed two federalists were killed.

The fight for the possession of Tia Juana is expected tomorrow. Mosby is supposed to have about 300 well-armed and desperate men.

Insurgents tonight held up a construction train on the San Diego & Arizona Railroad, near Tia Juana. Two of Mosby's men are detailed to run the engine. In taking the construction train the insurgents disclaimed any purpose to damage property. They said they might need the engine and cars for an emergency.

POOR FARM UNDER BAN

Charges Are Preferred Against Superintendent Clymer.

SALEM, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—Declaring that the food at the County Poor Farm is so insufficient that a number of the inmates have left the place to live in private homes on charity, or through the general charity of the community, the county board of supervisors, Mrs. C. E. Sherwood, a prominent local worker in the W. R. C. and W. C. T. U., has made charges against G. E. Clymer, the superintendent of the institution.

She declares that in one instance a blind woman was compelled to share quarters with a blind squaw and rather than do this she sought the general quarters kept for the men. In another case she says an inmate told her the food "was not fit to eat." She cites other instances of alleged poor nourishment of the paupers. Clymer is paid \$12 cents a day maintenance for the inmates, is given the rest of the fare and free and the produce from the 20 acres.

MARRIAGE STATUS TOLD

Attorney-General Give Opinion Regarding New Statutes.

SALEM, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—Much discussion and several pertinent questions have been inspired by the new laws relating to persons authorized to solemnize marriage. A new interpretation is placed upon the status of parties united in marriage by a person who is unauthorized to perform such ceremony. Heretofore it has been held that the parties were legally married, but now it appears by the new law that they are not legally married and the person officiating is liable for performing the ceremony. The attempt in passing the new law has been to guarantee proof of property rights and the legitimacy of children. That preachers may be guided in the matter of registration, the Attorney-General has been asked to give his opinion on several points. His letters follow:

Rev. E. H. Todd, Willamette University—Dear Sir: In compliance with your request for information respecting persons authorized to solemnize marriages in this state, the law as amended says:

"Marriages may be solemnized by any minister or priest of any church or congregation in the state anywhere within this state, provided they have recorded with the County Clerk in the county where the marriage is solemnized satisfactory evidence of their authority, said authority to be approved by the County Clerk and recorded in a book by him called, 'Authority to Solemnize Marriages,' for which he shall charge 10 cents per folio for recording and indexing. Said charges shall be not less than 25 cents. Marriages may also be solemnized by any judicial officer of the state anywhere within his jurisdiction."

The statute also requires the person solemnizing a marriage to deliver to the County Clerk of the county where the marriage license issues and the county where the marriage is solemnized for record, certificate provided for in the statute, and

EX-MAYOR AND TREASURER OF GOLDENDALE, WASH., DIES IN BERKELEY.

GOLDENDALE, Wash., June 21.—(Special.)—Alexander M. MacLeod, a prominent citizen of Goldendale, who died at Berkeley, Cal., yesterday morning, was born in the Prince Edward Islands in 1833. He came to the United States in 1881, and, after residing a few years in California, went to Portland. In 1885 he returned to the Dalles, where he kept a store for a number of years. In 1894 he moved to Goldendale, Wash., where he remained until 1905, when he came to Goldendale.

Mr. MacLeod served as City Treasurer and later as Mayor of Goldendale. He was also elected County Auditor and served four years.

He is survived by his widow and three children, Harold A. MacLeod, of Goldendale; Lois MacLeod, a student at Forest Grove, and Jean MacLeod, who was with her parents in California. Mr. MacLeod was master of Goldendale Lodge, No. 51, A. F. & A. M. He was also a member of the Oddfellows, Workmen of the World and United Workmen.

Subjects the person failing to deliver such certificate to a penalty of not less than \$10 nor more than \$20.

As to the manner of furnishing satisfactory evidence to the various County Clerks of the authority of any minister or priest to solemnize marriage ceremonies, and whether it is necessary for such minister to present his original certificate to each County Clerk, the law provides: "A public record of a private writing may be proved by the original record, or by a copy thereof certified by the legal keeper of the record."

OUTLAWS ARE KNOWN

OFFICERS SAY ROBBERS ARE LABORERS OF YONCALLA.

Posses Beating Timber Along North Umpqua River, but Fugitives Are Not Yet Headed.

ROSEBURG, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—The fact that two mail cars have been looted near Yoncalla in the past few years and that several sacks of mail were stolen from the baggage room of the depot there a few months ago has led the officers to believe that the two robbers who held up and robbed the mail car of the Shasta Limited near Yoncalla late Friday night are residents of that town or its vicinity.

According to advices received here today the men suspected of the crime are laborers and are known to have been within a few miles of Yoncalla on the day preceding the hold-up. The following day they were missing and, notwithstanding the determined efforts of the officers to ascertain their whereabouts, they have eluded detection.

Both these men are said to be well acquainted with the country between Yoncalla and Coos Bay. It is also said that their personal description tallies exactly with that of the robbers as given by the mail clerk upon their arrival at Roseburg following the hold-up. The officers refuse to tell the names of the suspects tonight and maintain that they will eventually be captured.

According to Sheriff Quinn, who is directing the man-hunt, Deputy Sheriff Steward has left the posse and is on his way over the mountains to Marshfield to intercept the outlaws if they attempt to board a boat. Deputy Sheriff Steward and Guard Miles, of the Penitentiary, are leading a posse in the mountain districts west of Allegheny, in Coos County, while another posse is beating the timber along the North Umpqua River, in the vicinity of Elkton. The country west of Allegheny is said to be the wilder in the state. At this point the Umpqua River breaks through the Coast Range Mountains by means of a rugged canyon which barely affords a stage road.

Telephone advices received here tonight are to the effect that the bloodhounds are still hot on the scent, but the fugitives have not yet been sighted.

Scow Wrecked but Crew Saved.

ASTORIA, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—During the strong northwest gale last night, the Tallant-Grant Packing Company's receiving scow, stationed at the jetty sands, broke loose from its moorings and was wrecked on the rocks at the jetty. About a ton of fish were lost, but the men on board were rescued by Captain Wicklund and the Point Adams Life Saving crew.

More Postal Depositories Named.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Postmaster-General Hitchcock today named the postal savings depositories, making the number to date 800. Lewiston, Idaho, is among the new ones.

ALUMNI BANQUET CLOSSES

Address to Graduates of State University Delivered by Thomas Kane of University of Washington Is Notable.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 21.—(Special.)—Casting a last glance at campus nook and study table, 68 young men and women from the college of Liberal Arts, today completed the required four years' course of study at the university and left for home or other fields of endeavor.

The commencement just concluded has been eminently successful, even though the graduating class is smaller than it has been in recent years. An exceptionally large proportion of alumni returned this year, which with the usual quota of visiting friends and relatives served to swell the guest list beyond what it has been formerly.

Orchestra Helps Programme.

The commencement orchestra, under the direction of Professor Glen, has been largely instrumental in making the exercises attractive. Each day it has provided several feature numbers.

Today's programme opened with an address to the class of 1911 by Dr. Thomas P. Kane, of the University of Washington and closed at midnight with the annual senior ball and reception in the artistically-decorated gymnasium.

The prettiest feature of the day was the alumni banquet which endured through the afternoon. Parents, old alumni, the faculty and the graduate initiates were served with luncheon by the under-graduate women of the university. The tables covered the entire floor space of the men's large gymnasium.

At the close of the banquet formal toasts were given, with the retiring alumni President, Allen Easton '02, acting as toastmaster.

Dr. Kane in his address to the class of 1911 praised the University of Oregon for the wholesome and uplifting influence which he said it had faithfully exerted in collegiate circles. He said, "I come with neighborly greetings and good will from my university for the university of this, Washington's parent state."

Admitting his inability to show the graduates the beacon lights of success, the Northern president gave the keynote of his speech in these words: "Particularly from now on you must remember that you are going out into the world to make your own destiny."

Statistics Are Cited.

"Seventy-one per cent of the 1200 names entered in the last edition of Who's Who in America were graduates of those who had had a college education. I say this to encourage you upon your way, but if you were to construe it as meaning that your success is already assured, my reference to it has harmed you immeasurably."
