

LEANS DEFEAT FATS

Torrid Day Exhausts Corpulent Ball Players.

PROMINENT MEN IN GAME

Mayor of Vancouver, in Pitchers' Box, Makes Phenomenal Catch. Business Men Sell Peanuts Among 2000 Spectators.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 21.—(Special.)—In the most enthusiastic ball game of the season, in which the Fats and Leans, composed of professional and business men of Vancouver, struggled for supremacy, the former were defeated by a score of 15 to 7 here today. The game was played on the athletic field of the Vancouver High School and was attended by nearly 2000 persons. All stores closed.

Before the game a big parade passed through the business district, the procession of 30 automobiles being led by the city band, playing "Hot Time" and similar airs. The two teams, dressed in ball suits from a dozen different teams, rode in machines to conserve their strength.

The game started off with the Leans at bat and Mayor J. P. Kiggins, of this city, dressed in a white suit and black stockings, in the pitcher's box and Arthur Dorland catcher. Troch struck the ball straight over the pitcher, but Kiggins jumped high in air and hooked it with his right hand, while the rooters rose in a body and cheered.

The afternoon was hot and the Fats, unused to such exertion, mopped their brows with red bandana handkerchiefs, while the Leans looked on pitilessly. The advice that "no one loves a fat man" was amply disproved today by the applause the heavy eight players got when they made good plays.

Several innings of fast ball weakened the Fats and the Leans, seeing their advantage, piled up a big score. Arnold Troch pitched for the Leans and Hug Parcel caught.

Side attractions to the game were performed by W. P. Connaway, cashier of the Vancouver National Bank; Miles R. Smith, president of the city School Board; Frank E. Hodgkin, assistant cashier, and Samuel J. Miller, passenger agent for the North Bank road, who sold pop, ice cream cones, peanuts and chewing gum. They were dressed in white aprons, chef's caps and pleasant smiles.

The proceeds of the game, amounting to several hundred dollars, go to liquidate a note owed by the Commercial Club.

FOOTLIGHTS BECKON TO COBB

Detroit Fielder May Star in New Version of "The College Widow."

DETROIT, June 21.—Tyrus Cobb, center-fielder of the Detroit American League baseball club, declared today that he was seriously considering an offer to go on the stage next winter in a revised version of "The College Widow." Several prominent theatrical men and Outfielder Jimmy Callahan, of the Chicago White Sox, are said to be interested in the venture.

General Land Office, After Hearing, Disposes of Famous Cases—Valuable Tracts Are Involved.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 21.—The General Land Office today, after a hearing, held for cancellation 27 timber and stone entries in Oregon, commonly known as Heppner cases.

These entries, covering valuable timber lands, were made by residents of Heppner. Sworn statements were filed in April and May 1903, and proofs submitted in July and August, 1903. These lands, except in two instances, lie within the Umatilla National Forest, temporarily withdrawn May 19, 1903, and were included in the National Forest July 15, 1906. They were conveyed about July 1, 1906, to the Northwest Timber Company, a Washington corporation of which David Wilson, of Spokane, was president. It was charged that entries were fraudulently made in the interest of J. L. Ayers and Dr. P. B. McDowd, both of whom were drowned in the Heppner flood, June 14, 1902.

J. W. Scriber, a banker of La Grande, associated with Asa B. Thompson, who was then Receiver of La Grande Land Office, was the chief figure in the subsequent financing of transactions until the lands were conveyed to the corporation. The tracts involved comprise about 4200 acres, which, together with nearly twice as great an acreage of patented lands, were conveyed to the corporation.

WOMAN DIES IN TUB

Mrs. Clara J. Powers, Aged 60, Drowns Herself.

ILL HEALTH CAUSES ACT

Falling Sight Makes Her Despondent—She Writes to Her Husband, Son and Daughter and Lies Down in Water.

Mrs. Clara J. Powers, 60 years old, living at 508 East Ash street, committed suicide yesterday in her home by drowning in the bathtub. She had filled the tub with water and lay down in it on her right side, submerging her head. She left three notes, one to her husband, A. B. Powers, one to her son, Paul, and one to a married daughter living in Hoquiam, Wash., telling of the contemplated act and that she was tired. In the note to her son she advised him to marry and make a home to take care of his father. Mrs. Powers had been in ill health for several years and her sight was failing. These are the reasons she gave for self-destruction.

OREGON "E" GIRL SAVES COMPANION FROM DROWNING.

Mary Roach Leaps Into Mill Race and Keeps Friend Above Water. Portland Man Rescues Both.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—When Miss Gladys Cartwright, 18, arrayed in swimming suit and water wings, sprang from the landing of the Bend boathouse into the swift waters of the Eugene mill race, she quite unwittingly furnished an exciting finale to the many interesting chapters of escapades and romances which have happened along the banks of this historic stream in the collegiate year just closing.

Miss Cartwright, who is a member of the Gamma Delta Gamma sorority and a daughter of Dr. Richard Cartwright, of Salem, was taking a swimming lesson

she drifted helplessly with the current under the tutelage of Miss Mary Roach, a Eugene girl who is also attending the university. Soon after the beginner had taken her first leap the water-bag preserver slipped from her shoulders and in an evasive distress. Then, in full view of the frightened feminine onlookers, Miss Roach proved herself a real heroine.

Steadily braving the strong current she gave chase and overtook her pupil before she had been carried farther than 60 yards. She managed somehow to keep her friend's head above the surface for a few minutes while the matrons of the neighborhood turned in a general alarm.

Finally, with the aid of a discarded dinner bell and a dishpan drum, they succeeded in arousing William H. Holmes, Jr., of 202 East Madison street, Portland, who was loitering on the front porch of the Kappa Sigma fraternity house nearby. Holmes, being a member of the varsity track squad, instantly capitalized all that Trainer Hayward had ever shown him about hurdling and arrived quickly upon the scene.

Holmes leaped over the steep embankment and rescued both girls, by this time clutching at some stray twigs near the bank. Neither of the girls is today any the worse for the near escape from drowning.
