

LOREMER'S FRIENDS DENY CORRUPTION

Yates Bitter Toward Deneen
Whom He Accuses of Fail-
ure to Keep Faith.

LIQUOR MEN ATTACKED

Witness Attributes "Jackpot" to
Peoria Interests—Packers Not
Friendly, Chicago Editor
Says on Stand.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Ex-Governor Yates of Illinois, who once accused Governor Deneen of playing politics and sent word to him through Senator Lorimer that he was a "liar still," denied today before the Senate committee to investigate the Lorimer election, that he had ever heard of the use of money in that election until more than a year afterward.

Both he and George W. Hinman, editor and publisher of the Chicago Inter-Ocean, the only other witness, professed the greatest friendship for Mr. Lorimer.

Mr. Hinman expressed the belief that there had been a "jackpot," or general corruption fund in the Springfield Legislature for many years, but he pointed to Mr. Lorimer's enemies as the probable contributors.

Corruption Fund Denied.
Mr. Yates emphatically denied that he ever had any conversation with Edward Hines, of Chicago, over the long-distance telephone on the day Senator Lorimer was elected. In regard to a corruption fund for Mr. Lorimer's election or any other subject, Attorney Healy, for the committee, explained that these had been the barest suggestions that he held a conversation with Mr. Hines on that day but that he did not believe there would be any testimony to that effect before the committee.

The ex-Governor's political connections were probed deeply, first by attorneys for the committee and then by Elbridge Hancy, representing Senator Lorimer. Attorney Healy first took Mr. Yates through a history of Illinois politics. Mr. Yates was asked if he had had any political differences with Senator Lorimer.

"Senator Lorimer did not support me for re-nomination for Governor in 1904 and there was quite a political difference in my mind," said the ex-Governor.

Deneen's Pledge Broken.
In regard to the Governorship, he said that he and his friends nominated Governor Deneen. "I told him I was for him for Governor," explained Mr. Yates. "He told me that he would support me for United States Senator. That was a subsequent consideration—and one he did not keep."

The effects of this alleged failure were described in detail. Mr. Yates relating how he became the political opponent of Governor Deneen, and how Senator Lorimer lined up behind Mr. Yates for Governor against Deneen in 1908. His feeling toward Governor Deneen was more explicitly described in a letter which Mr. Yates said he wrote from Florida to Senator Lorimer in 1909, advising that the newspapers said that Lorimer was going to elect Deneen Governor.

"I told Senator Lorimer after he had elected Governor Deneen to call him aside and tell him he had one friend who said Deneen is a liar still, and that I am the man," the witness said.

Talk of Money Not Heard.
Coming down to the Lorimer election, the witness said he was a warm friend of the Senator and about 48 hours before the election on May 28 he learned first that Lorimer was likely to be elected. Lorimer himself told him at that time there was a chance of his election. He said he did everything he could for Lorimer in that contest, but never asked him the use of money until long afterward.

He admitted that weariness of the deadlock entered into the election of Senator Lorimer.

Senator Kenyon asked the witness if when Edward G. Shurtleff was elected Speaker he had not said: "This means the election of Lorimer as Senator."

Mr. Yates denied making such a statement.

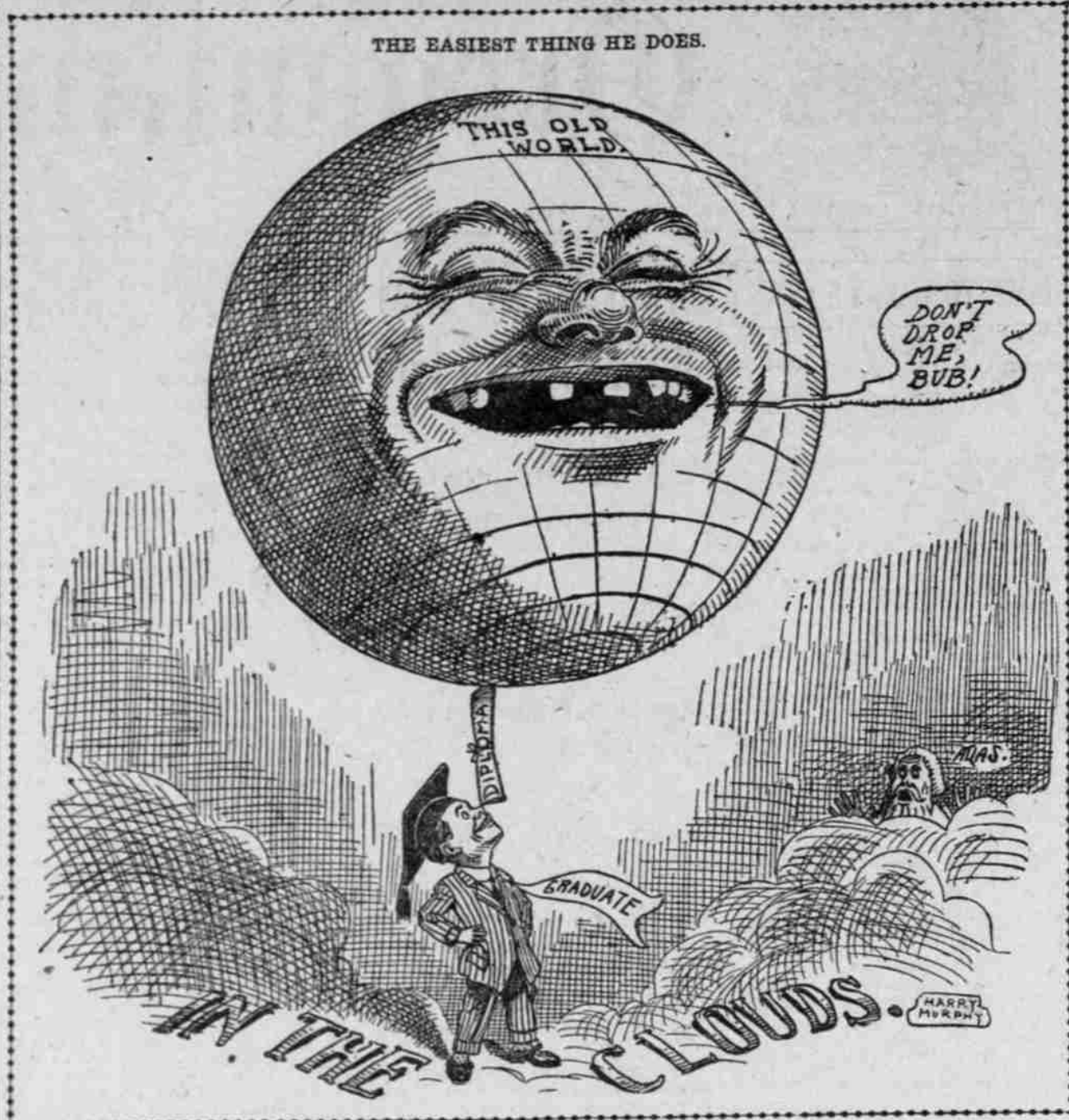

Lower California Rebel Sur-
renders to United States.

END PUT TO REVOLUTION

Overcome by Superior Numbers, 100
Americans Fighting Under Alien
Flag Ask Protection of
Their Government.

TIA JUANA, Cal., June 22.—General Mosby and a force of more than 100 Americans, comprising the pick of the rebel army in Lower California, surrendered to Captain Frank A. Wilcox, of the Thirtieth Infantry of the United States Army, at the American-bound Customs-House at Tia Juana, at 1 o'clock this afternoon, thus bringing to an end the revolution in Lower California and allowing a force of about 700 Mexican soldiers, led by Governor Celso Vega to march victoriously into Tia Juana, Lower California.

There was an imposing sight at the monument on the boundary line as General Mosby and his men rode up from the scene of battle and advanced to meet Captain Wilcox.

"We have come up to surrender," were the first words of the insurgent leader. Tears could be plainly seen on his cheeks. He was disheartened and discouraged.

Surrender Is Unconditional.
"They have 1500 men and six machine guns," continued Mosby in speaking of the federalists. "We put up as good a fight as we knew how but we were outmanned and outgunned."

FEW PESTS ARE FOUND

HOOD RIVER ORCHARDS SAID TO
BE LITTLE AFFECTED.

Professor Lawrence, of Agricultural
College and Assistants Give
Hopeful Report.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—The number of disease problems that confront the fruitgrowers of the Hood River Valley are far less serious and numerous than any region I know of," asserted Professor W. H. Lawrence, the expert employed by the Hood River Fellowship Association for the purpose of making a comprehensive study of the diseases peculiar to orchards in the valley. Professor Lawrence said he believed he and his assistants within two years would have whatever diseases that prevail here completely eradicated.

Then attention will be given to the cultivation of the orchard land proper to make it more productive. During the past week samples have been taken from the different soils to be sent to the agronomy department of the Oregon Agricultural College, in order that texture analyses may be made of them, for the purpose of working out drainage schemes.

The expenses of Professor Lawrence and his salary, \$3000 per year, are raised by an assessment, on a per acre basis, against the members of the organization. The association is growing. The orchardists realize the advantage obtained from Professor Lawrence's efforts and within a short time all progressive growers of the valley are expected to be members.

IDENTIFICATION IS DENIED
Roseburg Pursuer, Back, Says Posses
Hasn't Recognized Men.

ROSEBURG, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—The first authentic information received here for several days relative to the movements of the posse in pursuit of the two men who held up and robbed the mail car of the Shasta Limited, near Yoncalla, late Friday, was given out by Deputy Sheriff Starner, who returned here late tonight after leading the chase since the morning following the hold-up.

He says the pursuers have no clew as to the whereabouts of the bandits, other than suspecting that they are hiding in the mountain districts in Northern Coos County.

As far as suspecting certain men of the robbery, Starner brands the rumor as false and contends that the pursuers are utterly without knowledge as to the identity of the outlaws. He declares that the posse are still searching in the timbered districts between Leon Lake and Ash, but as yet have failed to find any definite clew as to where the men are hiding. Guard Miles, of the State Penitentiary, and his bloodhounds, also returned here tonight and will leave for Salem tomorrow morning.

Indications regarding the capture of the bandits appear unfavorable tonight and it may be possible that the posse will be recalled in a few days.

APPEAL IS TAKEN

Domicile, Bone of Contention
in Eddy Will Case.

DOCUMENT IS PROBATED

Massachusetts Attorney - General
Says Head of Christian Science
Church Lived There and State
Is Entitled to Tax.

BOSTON, June 22.—The will of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, founder of the Christian Science Church, was admitted to probate in the Suffolk County Probate Court today. Attorney-General James M. Swift, of Massachusetts, immediately took an appeal to the Supreme Court on the question of domicile.

The carrying of the case to the Supreme Court brings the will along side another proceeding relative to property left by Mrs. Eddy. Both actions involve substantially the same question regarding domicile of the testatrix and it is the desire of the Attorney-General to have both cases tried at the same time.

At the probate hearing today, no objections were made to the allowance of the will, a copy of which was offered by Charles F. Choate. The copy was authenticated, showing the record of the proceedings in Concord, N. H., where the original is on file.

It is asserted by the Attorney-General that Mrs. Eddy was domiciled in Massachusetts at the time of her death and that this state is entitled to the tax levy, the amount of which is said to be relatively small.

The action now pending in the Supreme Court involves the conveyance of two parcels of real estate from trustees of Mrs. Eddy's property to the directors of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of this city. The statute limiting bequests to churches to an amount yielding not more than \$2000 is also involved in the latter case.

MASKED MEN ROB ENGINEER
As Railroad Eats, Duo Draw
Revolvers and Take Money.

TACOMA, Wash., June 22.—(Special.)—While Stanley Spring, a Northern Pacific Railway engineer, was eating lunch with his fireman in the cab of his locomotive in the Tacoma freight yards at 1 o'clock this morning, two masked men climbed in behind him and with drawn revolvers, robbed him of \$10 in gold and a pay check for \$91. The holdup was immediately reported to the police and Detectives Mitchell and Edwards arrested four suspicious men prowling about the sheds at 410 A. M.

REBONDO SOON ON RUN
Vessel's Return Will Give Marshfield
Passenger Service to Bay City.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 22.—The steam schooner Redondo, which has been on dry dock at San Francisco for many weeks, will soon be on the Coos Bay again. The Redondo has been virtually rebuilt and will hereafter be in charge of Will Magee, formerly mate on the steamer Nan Smith.

Magee takes the place of Captain Hanson, who has resigned. The steamer carries lumber from the C. A. Smith mill but also takes passengers and freight and is the only boat giving direct passenger connections with San Francisco from this port.

TWO TARIFF BILLS CAST INTO SENATE

Committee Refuses Responsi-
bility and Makes Imme-
diate Reports.

SESSION WILL BE LONG

Situation, Already Complicated, Be-
comes More Complex as Result
of Action on Farmers' Free
List Measure.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Treading gingerly over ground rendered dangerous by adverse reports made today by the Senate committee on finance on the Democratic farmers' free list and the wool tariff revision bills, and startled by the threat that these measures, together with bills to revise the cotton, sugar, lead and steel schedules would be offered as amendments to the reciprocity bill, the Senate concluded today without reaching the expected vote on the Canadian measure. Chairman Penrose, of the finance committee, fulfilled his promise made in anger on the floor yesterday when it became apparent that the Republican majority had been hobbled by the coalition of insurgents and Democrats and called a meeting of the finance committee for today. It resulted in the adverse reporting of the wool bill, \$ to 4, and the farmers' free list bill, \$ to 5.

Early Adjournment Hopeless.
When these reports were presented to the Senate, every chance of an agreement for a vote on the reciprocity bill to be followed by an early adjournment of the extra session, was removed.

That the Senate had entered upon its most difficult stage of its progress toward action on the reciprocity measure was conceded on every hand. It was admitted the measure was threatened with death or amendment that might make it unacceptable to President Taft or obnoxious to Canada.

When the finance committee met today the regular Republican majority who had a bare majority of that one-time invulnerable body, expressed relief that it had been demonstrated that the organization was no longer in command, so that they could shift the burden to the Senate itself and that it was no longer necessary to dissemble. At the same time the views of the Republican regulars that the effect would be to accomplish practically nothing in the present session was voiced by such men as Penrose and Lodge.

Contempt for Bills Shown.
The remarks of the Republican leaders were expressive of contempt for the Democratic bills. Penrose was saying that the wool bill was made over night by mechanics and that no sensible body of men would think of devoting less than ten months of serious study to the question now uppermost in the minds of the President and the Senate.

The debate over the finance committee's action was short, however, saying that the Senate ran into a discussion of the reciprocity bill, Senator Cummins attacking the Root amendment on the ground that it would deprive the United States of the right to control the wool pulp exports. Finally, at Senator Nelson's suggestion, the vote on the amendment was again held over.

Vote on Amendment Prevented.
Late in the afternoon there was an apparent effort to bring about a vote on this amendment, but Nelson of Minnesota and Heyburn of Idaho reported the debate as to Canada's powers of controlling wool pulp exports. Finally, at Senator Nelson's suggestion, the vote on the amendment was again held over.

Senator Cummins, in his attack upon the Root amendment, declared that he believed the manufacturers of printing presses in the United States effectively control prices and dictate the mills from which purchasers may buy.

Senator Nelson declared the reciprocity bill could affect only paper and pulp from privately owned lands.

WIFE'S SCREAMS BRING AID
Rescuer Attacked by Husband When
He Stops Beating Spouse.

A big crowd was attracted to the Becker Suit Store, 140 Fifth street, last night by loud screams of "murder" and "help."

A. A. Roberts, a real estate man, with office in the Sweetland building, rushed in, where he says he found S. H. Becker, proprietor of the store, beating and choking his wife. Becker pulled him off, and then Robert started to fight Roberts. Roberts is a large, muscular man and met the aggressor with his fist, hitting him on the eye and mouth and knocking him down.

While this fight was in progress two men came hurrying to the police station in an automobile and reported that someone was being killed. Patrolman Madden and Nelson were taken into the car and sped away to the Becker store. In the meantime, Patrolman Hutchings had reached the store and was attempting to restore quiet. Becker then called a taxi and went to the police station with Patrolman Hutchings. Becker wanted Roberts arrested and was told to obtain a warrant. Becker's wife refused to prosecute her husband and he was released.

Missing Teacher Believed Drowned.
ABERDEEN, Wash., June 22.—(Special.)—That Walter Gillespie, the young school teacher who has been missing from the Queen's district since Monday, was drowned, is the information which reached here tonight. A boy saw Gillespie struggling in a small craft on the Queen's River. Gillespie was evidently trying to land when the boat upset. The river bed is being dragged tonight. Gillespie was a graduate of a college in Pennsylvania. His parents, from the East, were visiting him when the accident occurred.
