TURNERS IN CONCLAVE

PORTLAND DELEGATION ARRIVES IN LOS ANGELES.

Physical Culture and Singing Contests to Be Features of Sixth Annual Convention.

LOS ANGELES, June 22.—(Special.)—The Portland and Pacific Northwest delegation of Turners and Saengers arrived on the Coast Line train tonight for the sixth annual convention of the Turnersbund, which opens tomorrow night. The Denver, San Francisco, Oakland, Sacramento and San Diego delegations are also here.

An auto tour of the visiting women of the societies, Saturday afternoon, was arranged by the committee today. An excursion to Catalina on Tuesday is being discussed. A reception to-morrow night in Turner Hall will open the festivities. A regulation banquet and recital contest for prizes will follow.

Mayor Alexander will extend an official welcome to the visitors Saturday night in the Temple Auditorium, after which there will be physical culture exhibitions and singing. There will be exhibitions in Flora Park Sunday, with a ball in Turner Hall at night. More gymnastic exhibitions will be given Monday night.

FREE SUGAR BILL IS UP

Representative Warburton Carries Out Idea Contained in Speech.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 22.—Representative Warburton, of Washington, following out the idea contained in his recent speech in the House of Representatives, has introduced a new bill placing sugar on the free list and increasing the internal revenue tax on cigars and tobacco. It is his contention that such legislation will tend to reduce the cost of sugar to the consumer and at the same time provide not only sufficient revenue to compensate for the loss of customs duties on imported sugar, but a surplus which can be used to offset the loss of customs revenue if other food products and necessities of life are placed on the free list.

La Center Retains Saloons.

LA CENTER, Wash., June 22.—(Special.)—By a vote of 73 to 55, La Center has voted to retain the licensed saloons.

SCHOOL OFFICERS SAFE

RECALL CANNOT BE APPLIED AT PRESENT TIME.

Attorney-General Declares That Legislation Must First Pass Additional Laws.

SALEM, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—That the recall cannot be invoked against school officers because the Legislative Assembly has not provided necessary and proper laws therefor, is the substance of an opinion, handed down by Attorney-General Crawford today at the request of the Salem School Board and the opinion will probably eventually check the movement for a recall against Director Millard of this school district.

It is held by the Attorney-General that a school director is a public officer and that all public officers in the state are subject to the recall. But he says "While a school director is a public officer and subject to recall, he cannot, in our opinion, be recalled without additional legislation providing for the same and prescribing the mode of procedure. School elections are not elections held under section 2 of article 11 of the constitution. The above section prescribes the qualifications of voters at all elections au-

thorized by law not otherwise provided for in the constitution, and it will be noticed that women are not qualified voters thereunder, while they can vote at school elections."

Another question asked of the Attorney-General was relative to the right of women to sign recall petitions directed at school directors. This question he answers by holding that in the first place school directors cannot be recalled without the Legislature passing more extensive laws covering the recall of such directors, but should the Legislature do so and not change the qualifications of those who vote at school elections, women now being entitled to vote at these elections, they would also be allowed to sign such recall petitions.

This opinion is made doubly of interest because the Attorney-General has been asked relative to the recall of a school director contemplated at Stayton.

OUTLAWS' TRAIL ENDS

BLOODHOUNDS AFTER MAIL ROBBERS ON BLIND TRACK.

Manhunters, Foiled, Return to Marshfield — Suspect Reported Hiding in Dense Timber.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—With dense timber and a wild country to protect him, a man supposed to be one of the robbers who held up the Shasta Limited is eluding the officers of Coos and Douglas Counties in the neighborhood of Loon Lake. Yesterday the bloodhounds which have been used by the manhunters followed a trail to Allegany, but without result, and the dogs were brought to this city.

When J. A. McDonald, owner of a sawmill at Loon Lake, reported here that he had seen a man he believed to

be one of the robbers, the officers all started back to that country.

This evening their search had been fruitless and several of the officers are said to be on their way back to Marshfield.

The fugitives are believed to be staying under cover in the daytime and traveling only at night, but unless they had provisions or have secured food of some homesteader, it is thought that they must be nearly starved out by now.

Allegany is wild and if the hunted men have food it would not be difficult for them to evade the officers for an indefinite time. The search, however, will be kept up.

One suspect was arrested last night in Marshfield, but he proved conclusively that he had nothing to do with the holdup and was released.
