

SEE'S TEACHINGS READ TO JURORS

Four Persons in Line of Prophet's "Hypnotic Eyes" Fall Asleep.

MUCH GOSSIP IS CAUSED

Parity Is Freedom, Declares Head of "Absolute Life" Cult in His "Book of Truths"—Marriage Is Frowned Upon.

CHICAGO, June 23.—(Special.)—The "Absolute Life" cult was the subject of the trial of the chief of the cult read startling extracts from Evelyn Arthur See's "Book of Truths." The extracts as read show the real teachings of See, whereby he was enabled, the prosecution charges, to make "affinities" of the girl converts.

The customary crowd thronged the court-room, expecting Mona Rees, the "high priestess" of the cult, would be called today. However, the reading occupied all the afternoon and adjournment was taken to Monday, when she will be the first witness.

A remarkable development today was the fact that one juror, a stenographer, a court officer and a newspaper reporter fell into deep sleep during the hearing. All were in line of See's "hypnotic eyes" and the incident caused unusual court gossip.

Nap May Bring New Trial.

James E. Callahan, of counsel for the defense, said that the juror's lapse would be used, if necessary, in applying for a new trial.

Here are some of the most salient paragraphs of See's "book," as read today:

"Shame, shame on you. What you call shame is your own mind's darkness."

"To the pure, all things are pure; to the impure, all things are impure."

Fear Is Condemned.

"To come to purity is to establish freedom. Oh, woman, do not fear man. Oh, man, do not fear woman."

"Any experience in the world is not forbidden."

"Being pure to you in your conception of an act, all things are really pure."

"When you escape the delusion in which mortals live the possibility of impurity will be dissolved."

"The man and the woman shall neither deny the order of the other."

"Nothing is sensual that is of the spirit through the body."

"In her own right, a woman hath right and she shall not be wronged."

"Let not the man impose his right against the woman's right."

Marriage Is Prohibited.

"Let no one who has come to absolute life descend from the spirit to the form of marriage."

"All flesh, spirit and mind are one. Each is for all and all for each. Thus each person is unto himself and unto himself and so perfect freedom is attained."

"Society will sanction what you do, because it is my will. I have not forgotten society in my ordinances for the person. Your freedom in sex is not freedom from sex, it is freedom from sex."

In his summing up to the jury, Prosecutor Burnham will refer to the three girls, Mildred Bridges, Mona Rees and Florence McKee, as being the "three sacrifices"—daughters surrendered to See by their mothers, all of whom, it will be contended, held See in great esteem.

A quotation from page 273 of the "Book of Truths" will be offered as evidence to show that See first got the mothers in his power and then, by subtle teachings, induced them to surrender their daughters to his care and keeping.

RECALL MAY BE MODIFIED

Arizona Willing to Omit Provision Applying to Judges.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Delegates Cameron, of Arizona, today requested the Senate committee on territories to amend the Arizona constitution by eliminating the provision for the recall of judges. He based his request on the opposition of the President to this feature of the constitution, and said he feared its retention ultimately would defeat statehood.

Mr. Cameron said his people were so anxious for statehood they would be willing to come in under a modified form of their constitution.

He held the opinion that Congress had the right to change the constitution without re-submitting it to the people.

Many members of the committee dissented from this view and several expressed the opinion that the House resolution providing for the re-submission of the judicial recall provision to the voters of the territory would be favorably reported. The committee will vote tomorrow.

MONARCHISTS ARE ARMING

Portuguese Warships Pursue Vessel Landing Munitions on Coast.

LISBON, June 23.—(By way of Badajoz, Spanish Frontier.)—A mysterious ship is cruising off the northern coast of Portugal. The vessel, which flies the German flag, appears to be the steamer Porto, loaded with arms, including artillery, destined for the Portuguese Monarchists.

The Government cruiser Adamastor and the gunboat Sao Paulo interrupted the operations of the steamer while she was endeavoring to land the contraband on the coast of Algarve, the southernmost province of Portugal. The Porto then put to sea at full speed with the warship in pursuit.

CEMENT RATE SUSPENDED

Interstate Commission to Investigate Proposed Increase.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Advances in the freight rates on cement originating in Central Freight Association territory and destined to various points in the country, today were suspended by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The Commission will make a formal investigation of the proposed tariffs.

MRS. HENRY SCORES

Seattle Woman Keeps Children in San Francisco.

FATHER'S PLEA IS DENIED

Court Decides No Action Can Be Taken Until Divorcee's Appeal to Washington Supreme Bench Is Ruled Upon.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—(Special.)—Mrs. Ivy May Henry, the pretty Seattle divorcee, who for the past two months has been fighting in the courts of San Francisco for the possession of her two children, Albert and Anita, won a point this morning when Judge Murasky denied the petition for habeas corpus sought by Albert J. Henry, the father of the children, through his attorney, W. H. Matson.

This means that the two children will remain in San Francisco and will not be taken to Seattle to their father at the present time, at least. The children are now in the custody of Mary Couino, a juvenile officer of the San Francisco Protective Aid and Relief Society, where Mrs. Henry may see them as often as she pleases.

Judge Murasky held that the appeal taken by Mrs. Henry to the Supreme Court of Washington from the divorce decree granted her husband stayed all proceedings for the custody of the children in the San Francisco courts. Until the Supreme Court in Washington rules on this appeal no further action can be taken here.

The court postponed the hearing of the petition for guardianship of the children asked for by the father until June 30.

Mrs. Henry created a stir in this city when, two months ago, she kidnapped the two children. A search was instituted by the attorneys for the father, and three or four days later the children were found in a house in the Richmond district.

After a sensational fight Mrs. Henry, S. Foster Kelly, said to be her "affinity," and James W. Cochrane, an attorney, were taken into court on contempt charges and were found guilty. Attorney Cochrane and Kelly were fined and Mrs. Henry was dismissed with a reprimand. Since that time the fight has been on almost continually in the courts of this city for the possession of the children. Mrs. Henry has been living at the Savoy Hotel.

ASTORIA HAS CHAMPION

NEW RECRUIT, "DICK" FERRIS, BOOSTS FOR CENTENNIAL.

Southern California Junketers From Los Angeles Country Will Make Trip to Celebration in August.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 23.—(Special.)—"Dick" Ferris has passed long enough in his production of "The Man From Mexico" to start boosting for the Astoria Centennial. Blaine Phillips, his trusty assistant and former managing editor of the Daily Astorian, at Astoria is the second in command of the heavy artillery which is boosting for the centennial here.

Ferris, who is now under \$2500 bail for using the revolutionary party of Southern California as a press agent vehicle, says he is willing to start another revolution if it will ensure the success of the centennial. These two, with John Day, manager of publicity for the Astoria Centennial, have hooked up a combination which is expected to bring forth a great deal of publicity for the centennial pageant.

Through the efforts of this battery, Mayor Alexander has promised to appoint a special committee of business men to work up an excursion from Los Angeles and San Diego and a special train will be run over the Southern Pacific with a one-way fare for the round trip. Day, of the Astoria centennial committee, will return to San Francisco Saturday and complete details of the big Chamber of Commerce excursion from San Francisco.

MISS POLLARD IS QUEEN

Seattle Potlatch Chooses Popular Little Actress as Royalty.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 23.—(Special.)—Miss Daphne Pollard, Seattle Press Club candidate for Queen of the Potlatch, was today selected by the Potlatch nominating committee for queen, the other candidates for that honor having been withdrawn from the contest in her favor. The nomination of Miss Pollard, who by her clever and winsome personality has made friends of all the newspaper men, both prior to and since her retirement from the stage, was the unanimous choice of the members of the Press Club.

Miss Pollard, in all her theatrical career, has been under the close chaperonage and careful tutelage of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Troth, and some months ago she retired from the stage to take up a special course of study. She, with her parents and sisters, has for the past 11 years claimed Seattle for her residence, and now lives with them at 2039 Waverly place. Miss Pollard came to Seattle with the Pollard Lilliputian Opera Company in 1900. She was then but 9 years old.

MATE ACCUSED OF MURDER

Officer Arrested in Australia to Be Tried in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—Charles Smith, formerly second mate on the brigantine Makawell, was arrested by a United States Marshal today as he stepped off the steamer Oorang. He is charged with the murder of a Japanese steward on the high seas.

The vessel on which Smith was mate plies between Puget Sound and South Africa ports, carrying lumber. Last April, while off the coast of Australia, bloodstains were found on the deck of the vessel and the Japanese was missing. Smith was taken ashore at Newcastle and deported here for trial.

RAIN DISAPPOINTS LONDON'S CROWDS

Feature of Day in London Is Royal Progress Through Streets of City.

GREAT BANQUET GIVEN

Sir Edward Grey Entertains King and Visiting Peers and Special Representatives of Nation at Coronation.

LONDON, June 23.—A heavy rain, which began at sunset, brought bitter disappointment to thousands of persons who were bent upon celebrating, as an climax to the royal progress of King George and Queen Mary through the streets today. Thousands had planned to view the illuminations and wheeled traffic was barred from the principal streets.

The illuminations everywhere were turned on at dusk and sparked their brightest in the rain, but only a fraction of the crowds expected turned out to witness the effective display.

The king and queen, accompanied by the Duke of Devonshire and the Duke of Cornwall, were seen in the rain, and the Duke of Devonshire was a mass of glowing colors, and on business houses down the Strand to the heart of the city.

Parade Is Feature.

The feature of the day was the royal progress through seven miles of London streets, over a long route through the poorer section of the city.
