

SLOVER SELECTED AS POLICE CHIEF

Rushlight Confirms Prediction That Captain Would Be Exalted.

ACTING TITLE OFFERED

Full Appointment May Follow If Man Selected Makes Good as Executive—Mayor-elect Is Busy Picking Aides.

Mayor-elect Rushlight yesterday confirmed the announcement made in The Oregonian the morning following his election, June 6, that he will appoint Captain E. A. Slover as Chief of Police. The only qualification he made is that Slover will be Acting Chief. This probably means that he will be continued at the head of the department if he gives satisfaction as an executive. Captain Slover is now in command of a relief.

Mr. Rushlight has been busy with his appointments since returning from the hot springs, where he went to recuperate after a health of a week. He is much better, although not strong yet. He is still weak, due to pneumonia which he received in the East.

Executive Board Forming.
He is now engaged in making up his list of members for his Executive Board. He must name ten men for this Board. It is said he has decided upon but a few of them at this time. These are said to be John R. Coffey, Waldemar Seton and A. L. Finley. Others who are being mentioned for the place are Dan Kellahan, Ben Reisinger, John Berry, W. H. Fitzgerald, W. R. Apperson, D. Solis Cohen and K. K. Kuhl. It is known that some of these will be appointed.

George K. McCord, a newspaper reporter, will be Mr. Rushlight's private secretary, as published two weeks ago. Mr. McCord yesterday morning called upon Mayor Simon and Mrs. McNaughton, the present secretary, and was introduced to the routine of the position. Mayor Simon received him cordially and assured him that he would be glad to do anything he can to assist Mayor-elect Rushlight in getting started in the week Saturday morning.

City Engineer Sought.

Mr. Rushlight is having considerable difficulty in obtaining a City Engineer. Because the city pays but \$200 a month, there are few competent men who will accept the place. Tom M. Hurlbert, at present first assistant engineer, will probably not accept the position, as he is now receiving \$175 a month. Robert G. Dieck is not being considered for the position, as he is not an applicant. He was engineer of Manila when W. H. Taft was Governor of the Islands, but has lived here several years. He has offices in the Corbett building.

Mr. Rushlight will probably appoint Dr. M. G. McCorkle as his Health Officer. It is probable a new Board of Health will have to be appointed as the present members will tender their resignations. It is said Dr. Sanford Whiting will probably be one of the new members.

Members of the Water and Park Boards will resign. It is believed with the exception of Dr. A. G. Clark and Tom Lewis, of the Park Board, who desire to remain and are acceptable to Mr. Rushlight.

Mr. Rushlight wants Theodore B. Wilcox to remain on the Water Board, and it is possible Mr. Wilcox may do so, at least until the completion of the Bull Run pipeline, now nearing completion.

Appointments to the Executive Board will be announced probably Friday. The other appointments on the various boards will be made until next week, it is expected.

FRUIT FIRM INVESTIGATED

Stockholder of Hood River Company Asks for Receivership.

The taking of testimony before Judge Kavanaugh in the case of A. P. Bateham against the East Hood River Fruit Company, in which the appointment of a receiver was sought, was concluded yesterday. Arguments were heard and the case was taken under advisement.

The company owns 297 acres of land near Mosier, Or., and is a corporation with a capitalization of \$50,000. The stock, 500 shares, is controlled by Bateham and W. H. Webster, a capitalist of Chicago. Others interested in the corporation are Cecil H. Bauer, A. H. McCurtain and A. King Wilson. The plaintiff alleges in his complaint that the company has debts outstanding to the extent of \$25,447.23, and has not the necessary funds to meet the bills.

SHERIFF HERE FOR FUGITIVE

Missouri Official Comes to Get Kilmann, Convicted in 1898.

Lee Baker, Sheriff of Pulaski County, Missouri, has arrived in the city for the purpose of taking back to that state Al Kilmann, a resident of Leila, who, in 1898, was found guilty of cattle stealing and sentenced to five years in the state penitentiary, but who escaped when out on bonds before his prison sentence commenced.

Kilmann has applied for a writ of habeas corpus and will be given a hearing before Judge Gantenbein as soon as the Missouri officials have received certain documents necessary to establish their right to him. At present Kilmann is at liberty on his own recognizance. His attorney, John McCue, having vouchers for him.

Sheriff Baker said yesterday that the Pulaski County authorities gained knowledge of Kilmann's whereabouts through letters he wrote to friends and acquaintances in Missouri. He refused to say just who had betrayed Kilmann, but he has been living at Leila for several years. His neighbors say he is a good husband and father.

\$75,000 VALUE M'BRIDE ESTATE

Widow of Ex-Senator Is Made Sole Legatee.

By terms of the will of George W. McBride, ex-United States Senator and ex-Secretary of State, which was admitted to probate yesterday, his widow, Laura W. McBride, is made the sole legatee and is heir to real and personal property which the administrators estimate to be worth \$75,000, of which \$68,500 is real property and the balance personal property.

Chamber of Commerce and a nephew of the deceased, and Mrs. Laura W. McBride are named as administrators and it is stipulated that they are to act without bond. The will was executed on April 15, 1907, in the presence of P. S. Malcolm and L. A. Pike.

The property is situated in Multnomah, Columbia, Clatsop, Clackamas and Marion Counties. County Judge Gantenbein has appointed different groups of appraisers to estimate the value of the real estate situated in each county. The Court is asked to allow Mrs. McBride \$250 a month during the period of administration.

WIRELESS "OWNERS" CONFER

Stockholders in Defunct Company Will Name Receiver.

On behalf of the stockholders and creditors of the United Wireless Telegraph Company, Ben C. Day, associated with W. D. Fenton in the practice of law, yesterday applied to Judge Gantenbein to appoint a receiver for the company's assets in this state as has been done in other states since the company in New York State.

Judge Gantenbein signified his willingness to appoint a receiver but did

TITLED INSTRUCTOR PAROLED

Riding Master, Who Admits Forgery, Expects Big Legacy.

Baron C. G. Von Westworth, the former titled riding instructor of Kraemer's Riding Academy, is again at liberty, but he must report regularly to the Prisoner's Aid Society, to which organization he was delivered by Judge Gantenbein yesterday, after he had been sentenced to two years in the State Penitentiary and immediately paroled.

F. W. Tubbs, the complaining witness against Von Westworth, appeared in Judge Gantenbein's court yesterday afternoon and confirmed the report that he was willing that the prisoner be given another chance. True to his promise of Monday, when the riding master changed his plea of not guilty to guilty in pleading to two indictments charging forgery, Judge Gantenbein ordered the parole immediately after passing sentence.

When Von Westworth was arrested for passing many worthless checks, on two of which indictments were returned, he declared that he had a legacy expected to him from a relative in Germany and that all his shortages would be made good.

MISS D'ARCY IS DEAD

PROMINENT MEMBER PIONEER OREGON FAMILY PASSES.

Salem Mourns Woman Who Taught for 35 Years in Capital City Schools.

SALEM, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—Miss Maria Frances D'Arcy, one of the best known of the native Oregon women from a pioneer family in this section, died at her home here late last night, after a short illness. She had but recently resigned as a teacher in the Salem school, where she had been an instructor for the past 35 years.

Miss D'Arcy had lived practically all of her life on lot 1, block 1, of the original townsite of Salem, and it was in the home on this lot that she died. Her brother, Judge P. H. D'Arcy, is well known as an attorney, is president of the Oregon Pioneer Association, and is prominent throughout the state.

Miss D'Arcy was born in Portland, Or., May 31, 1874. She graduated from the Sacred Heart Academy, in Salem, when she was but 17 years of age. Her parents removed from Portland to Salem October 15, 1898, and she had been a resident of this city ever since.

When Miss D'Arcy began teaching in the public schools of this city, P. H. D'Arcy, Dr. J. Payton and J. T. Dearborn were directors and J. T. Gregg Superintendent of Schools. All of them are now dead. When she started her connection as a school teacher here there were but 13 instructors where there are now over 100. She was peculiarly adapted for work in the primary grades, and much of the success which she has attained that portion of the school work here is attributed to her long service.

Besides her brother here she is survived by W. J. D'Arcy, a brother, of Blackfoot, Idaho, and a sister, Miss Teresa D'Arcy, of this city.

DR. BOYD FORMALLY INSTALLED HERE

First Presbyterian Church Receives Minister Late of Detroit, Mich.

REV. MATTHEWS PREACHES

Seattle Man Welcomes New Leader to Portland in Sermon on Work of Church in World Today, and Other Ministers Take Part.

Formal installation of Dr. John Boyd, formerly of Detroit, Mich., took place at the First Presbyterian Church last night. Dr. M. A. Matthews, pastor of the First Church, of Seattle, delivered the sermon before a large congregation.

The service was in charge of Rev. T. H. Walker, who acted as moderator. Rev. D. L. Kiehl read the scriptural lesson and Dr. J. R. Wilson made the charge to the pastor and Rev. William Persons to the people. A special musical offering was given in Shelley's "The Lord is My Shepherd," by the choir.

Dr. Matthews chose as his subject "The Church on the March," declaring that the church derived its authority from Christ, who said after the resurrection to his disciples that he came in all authority and that they should carry the gospel everywhere. Dr. Matthews then sketched the duty of the church in carrying out this command, declaring that the darkened countries must be reached through their national consciences.

"Christ took no step without the aid of the Holy Ghost," said Dr. Matthews. After the resurrection he appeared before his disciples and told them he was invested with all authority. He did not say simply "I am invested with authority," but, "with all authority." The disciples did not fully comprehend his meaning. I do not think we do fully. Then if all authority was invested in him, he had the right and power to have the church execute the plan formed in the beginning. Has the church any authority? It has all authority.

"Some persons say that in this Bible is contained the word of God. This is not so. It is the word of God, and on this point the Presbyterian church stands distinct, and the man who takes any other position is a blasphemer. The Bible is the complete word of God and on this one statement rests the whole theological discussions of today.

"China must be converted, not through the people, but through the national conscience. The awakening of this conscience through that nation's edicts against the opium habit and gambling. Japan has had its conscience worked upon and she has been quick to see the big commercial value of the religion of Christ. But she has tabooed the spiritual value and she must be made to see she must secure the spiritual, and also India and the other countries must be awakened through their national conscience."

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AMERICAN YACHT IS WINNER

Harry Payne Whitney's and R. W. Emmons' Boat Swift at Kiel.

KIEL, Germany, June 27.—The American yacht Biblet, owned by Harry Payne Whitney, of the New York Yacht Club, and R. W. Emmons, of the Eastern Yacht Club, today won the fourth of the series of the international races for Sander class yachts.

The American yachts Beaver and Irma took second and third places ahead of the German yachts Tilly XIV, and Wasee Seebund in the order named.

The race was a windward and return. The Biblet ran away from the field, and finished over five minutes before the Beaver. Three German vessels being non-winners, are now excluded from the other races of the series. If the Biblet wins tomorrow's race she will capture the Emperor's cup. Otherwise a sixth race will be necessary.

There was a reception on board the Louisiana, Rear-Admiral Bager's flagship, this afternoon. It was attended by 700 persons, including German and American naval officers, military officers and other persons who were here for Kiel week and to see the visiting American battleship.

BASEBALL BOND IN VIEW

Central League Head Would Make Minors Deposit \$1000.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., June 27.—Dr. F. R. Carson, president of the Central Baseball League, has a plan by which he believes minor league baseball can be made a greater success.

At a meeting of the Central League magnates here today, he will announce that at the meeting of the National Board of Arbitration in October, he will

suggest sweeping changes and reforms in the rules governing the lesser lights in the world of baseball. According to President Carson, the minors are gradually drifting to destruction and unless a radical change is brought about it will be only a question of a year before practically every minor league organization below class A will be financially wrecked.

President Carson's most radical change would be to amend the rules of the National Association so as to make it mandatory for every clubowning in class B baseball to deposit \$1000 with the National Commission to attest to his financial ability to take charge of and conduct a baseball club, the sum to be deposited by class C and D leagues to be somewhat smaller.

BILLIARD MATCH IS KEEN

George Spears and Low Shaw Give Interesting Exhibition.

George Spears, Minneapolis billiard crack, averaged 18 in a 300-point match at 13.2 ball line yesterday in a special match with Low Shaw in one of the best exhibitions ever witnessed in Portland. Spears' high runs were 89, 61 and 63. Shaw scored but 109, although running 59 and 43 in different innings.

Spears and Shaw will play tonight at Albany, Thursday at Eugene, Friday at Grants Pass and Saturday at Medford.

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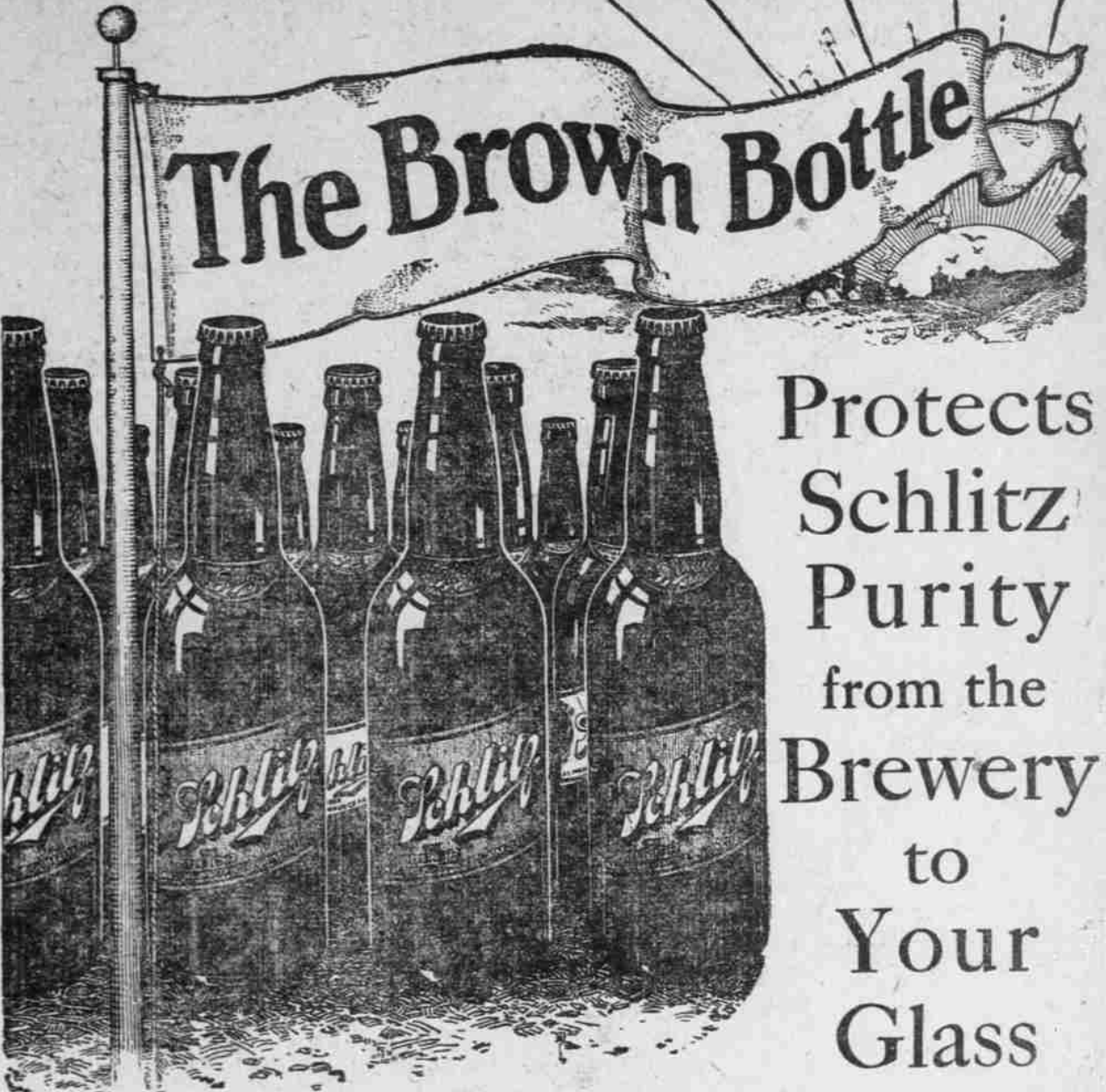
