After the last of the state's witnesses had keen heard Cantwell cited authorties and argued to show that Midred Bridges was not abducted, but that she went to See of her own will during the absence of her parents in California, leaving the home of a Mrs. Wheeler, in whose care she had been left, of her own free will and with the permission of her mother.
