WASHINGTON, June 29.—(Special.)

Government Orders Plans for Lake Washington Project.

SEATTLE, Wash, June 28.—(Special)—Secretary of War Stimson to-day directed the engineering department of his office to prepare at once plans and specifications for the con-struction of Laks Washington canal locks, to cost \$2,275,000 and to call for bids therefor at the earliest possible This action of the Secretary of War

brings to a successful conclusion the fight which has been carried en for more than 20 years to assure construction of a canal system between Puget Sound and Lake Washington, and which at all times has been quite as bitterly opposed as it was championed. The decision disposes of matter, which has been pending in one form or another since the initial legislation or another since the initial legislation relating to the project of a ship canal connecting the waters of Puget Sound with Lake Washington by the act of September 19, 1890. It is believed it will not take more than three months to get the plans and specifications into condition and sufficiently advanced to call for bids for actual look construction. There is nearly \$200,000 on hand with which to much the preliminary with which to push the preliminary work, and it is believed that no trou-his will be experienced in getting an allotment of at least \$1,900,000 from the next Congress.

But the improvement of the crew has been rapid, and some of the experts said tonight that Yale had the fastest crew since one of its producessors. If years ago, satablished the course record of minutes 16 seconds for the four miles.

Veterans in Crew.
