\$100,000 IS OUTLAY

Machinery Plant to Begin Building at Once.

INDUSTRIAL BODY SCORES

Commercial Club Bureau Successful in Bringing Industry to Portland. Oregon Development Factor in Manufacture of Product.

Construction of a plant for the manufacture and distribution of irrigation and road-building machinery has been started on property adjoining the North Bank tracks at the foot of Seventeenth street, by the Wylie Brothers Company, who propose to spend \$100,000 in the development of their industry in this city within the next two years.

Establishment of the enterprise in Portland was accomplished through the industrial bureau of the Commercial Club, of which R. W. Raymond is the manager. Mr. Raymond had been corresponding with members of the firm in Chicago and Oklahoma City for nearly a year previous to making an agreement.

J. S. Wylie, who will be manager of the Portland house, arrived here last Friday, but previous to his coming he had completed negotiations for the purchase of the property upon which their plant will be situated, and at once put a force of men to work. A small building already is on the ground, but this will be made 120x160 feet of brick and concrete, one story high.

Seven carloads of machinery are on the way and 50 additional cars have been ordered to make the plant complete.

A corps of 12 traveling salesmen will be employed, all with headquarters in this city. Four of these men already are at work. On the same train that brought Mr. Wylie to the city, 14 skilled mechanics who are at work in the new plant also came. When completed the establishment will employ about 40 men. The company also will do a general jobbing trade. Temporary offices have been opened in the Merchants' Trust building. An office also will be established at the plant.

The principal business of the company will be fabrication of steel work for irrigation enterprises.

Mr. Wylie has planned to spend \$50,000 here at once and expects to have his place in complete operation in less than six weeks. The company has set aside \$100,000 for the development of the business in Portland.

This industry will be only one of its kind in America, carrying a complete line of contractors' machinery. The company expects to become the supply depot for all railroad, road and irrigation contractors in the Northwest. On account of the great amount of development in these three lines now under way in Oregon and other states of the Northwest, they expect the business to be successful from the start.

PIONEER OF 1854 BURIED

Funeral of Justus M. Strowbridge Held at Family Home.

Dr. John H. Boyd, the new pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, officiated Monday at the funeral of Justus M. Strowbridge, a pioneer of 1854, who died Saturday. The services were held at the residence, 405 East Twenty-first street, and at the grave in Riverview Cemetery. The services at the grave were private. Mrs. Max Shillick sang at the residence, "There's a Beautiful Isle Somewhere."

Mr. Strowbridge was born near Danville, Pa., August 22, 1832. When 17 years old he started with his brother, William, for the California gold fields. After reaching Placerville he worked for two and a half years in the mines. He came to Oregon in 1854. In 1876 he built two business blocks at First and Alder and Second and Yamhill streets. He was a member of the Volunteer Fire Department and prominent in Portland in early days. His widow, Mrs. Alice Strowbridge, and daughter, Mrs. H. M. Calk, survive him.

FOURTH TAKES FIRST TOLL

Cracker Held by Old Man Explodes in Soldier's Eye.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 4.—(Special.)—When "Dad" Knight, 65 years old, held in his hand a 4-inch luted cracker last night, the first he had ever fired, he unwittingly caused the first Fourth of July accident in Vancouver.

Patrick Casey, a private in F Company, of the Engineer Corps at the Vancouver Army post, came along in time to hear Knight declare that he had never shot a firecracker in his life, and was going to try the experience. When the old man forgot to toss the lited explosive away in his excitement, Casey stepped up to his outstretched hand to make him drop it before he was hurt. Just as he did so the cracker exploded in the soldier's right eye.

Casey was taken to the Military Hospital at the Barracks. He will probably lose his eye.

Governor Sells Land to State.

SALEM, Or., July 4.—(Special.)—The Capitol Building Commission today authorized the issuance of a warrant for \$3500, payable to Governor West, for his property directly opposite the capitol grounds, which is a part of the site which will be used for the additional capitol building. The board has already paid \$13,000 for property in the same block belonging to Phil Metcalf.

NEW RULES STRICT

Slover Issues Stringent Orders to Police.

PROWLERS ARE SOUGHT

Vigilance of Department Is Focused on Men Who Are Gully of Frightening Women and Children in Outlying Neighborhoods.

Starting a campaign against persons who have been frightening women and children, the first official act of Chief of Police Slover Monday was to issue an order strengthening all former orders against the miscreants, and assigning four motorcycle police to a special detail to be ready to go out upon calls at a moment's notice. Officers of the first night shift were given the first official order, which instructs officers and patrolmen, whether on or off duty, to report with name of informant all cases of this nature.

The order which was read to the first night shift, follows: "Since the murder of the Hill family at Ardenwald there seems to have sprung up a number of fiends who insult women and children and are a menace to the entire city. I want the very best efforts there are in every officer in the police department to apprehend these men. Whether on duty or off duty spare no pains nor expense to get them. Any officer on whom matter on what relief or where or when he can get a description or a clue to any of these animals, must see the parties concerned and get a full description, the telephone number and name of the informant and such other information as he can."

"Any officer may press any citizen into service to help in an emergency. Officer Simms will report at 12 noon. Officer Evans at 2 in the afternoon. Officers Royle and Parker at 4:30 for eight hours' duty."

Peter Olsen, a logger, aged 50, was arrested by Patrolman Martin at the corner of Union avenue and Knott street last night at 8 o'clock and charged with enticing children to accompany him.

MOOSE DISPUTE IN COURT

Ex-Secretary Sued For \$1445 by Lodge Organizer.

The taking of testimony was commenced before Judge Kavanaugh Monday in the case of Roy B. Hopkins against W. L. Fulmer, ex-secretary of the Portland Lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose, in which the plaintiff is seeking to recover \$1445.

Hopkins came to Portland last summer to organize a lodge of the Moose and employed Fulmer as an assistant in obtaining members at the rate of \$150 for every application. Hopkins received the balance of every 15 application fee, with the exception of \$1, which went to Supreme Organizer Davis, of Pittsburgh, Pa.

Fulmer, who was acting as temporary secretary October 12, is said to have appropriated money which came in as dues, on instructions from Supreme Organizer Davis after a controversy developed in the lodge over the handling

of the funds by Hopkins. He retained control until the charter closed October 29, and then turned the money over to George N. Davis, a Moose official, and his attorney in the case.

Fulmer declared in his answer that only 213 applications were received subsequent to October 13. Hopkins asserts that there were 249. The hearing was adjourned until tomorrow morning.

IRISH LEADER SPEAKS

Interest Is Fostered for Teaching of Irish History.

Irish Nationalism was the keynote of the address delivered last night at the Woodmen of the World Hall by Professor Michael G. Rohan, of Marquette University. Professor Rohan is thoroughly conversant with his subject, is a scholarly speaker and is imbued with an intense patriotism for Ireland. The strong hold he obtained upon the sympathies of his hearers was manifested by the applause that followed each period of his address.

Stereoscopic views were shown illustrating important events in Irish history, and giving a glimpse of various national customs and of the famous scenic parts of the island.

Professor Rohan is touring the Pacific Coast delivering his lectures under the auspices of the Ancient Order of Hibernians for the purpose of arousing interest in the history and condition of Ireland, and to further a movement to have a course of Irish history added to the curriculum of the schools. From Portland he will travel southward, and will lecture in San Francisco, Los Angeles and other cities of Southern California.

CHARGE AWAITS CONVICT

Walla Walla Prisoner Identified as Seattle Murderer.

SEATTLE, July 4.—Alexander Feld, alias Jack Boudowski, alias Jack Schultz, a prisoner in the Walla Walla penitentiary serving a five to 12 year sentence for attempted murder in Lewis County on June 5, 1911, has been identified as the murderer of Nikofor Federoff, a Russian, in a hotel in this city February 11, 1910.

Feld, Federoff and Emil Caly were members of a band of thieves who bound, gagged and robbed John B. Smith, a Klappan County rancher. The gang came to Seattle, quarreled over the spoils and Feld killed Federoff. Caly was sent to Walla Walla prison for robbing Smith and the police were still looking for Feld when he turned up in Walla Walla. When he is released from prison he will be brought here on a charge of murder.

NEW YORK TESTS MINDS

First Mental Clinic Held to Find Incipient Cases.

NEW YORK, July 4.—New York's first free clinic for mental diseases opened today at the Long Island State Hospital for the Insane. The purpose is to discover cases of incipient insanity in time to prevent their development into incurable mental diseases.

This movement was started about eight months ago by the committee on mental hygiene by the State Charities Aid Association.

Man Drowned Is Belief.

Guy Taylor, aged 34, who disappeared from the steamer Elmore at the Ash-street dock Saturday evening is believed to have been drowned from the steamer Hassalo that night. Taylor left the Elmore, spending the night about the city and returned to visit one of his friends on the Hassalo.

WOMAN MAYORWINS

Town Pump Needs Fixing So Men Have to Meet With Her.

VICTORY NOT COMPLETE

Antagonistic Councilmen, Who Attend Session for First Time Since Mrs. Wilson Took Office, Turn Down Her Appointments.

HUNNEWELL, Kan., July 4.—At last the City Council has met with Mrs. Ella Wilson, the Mayor. Last night was the first regular meeting the Aldermen have attended since she was selected the head of the city government, April 1. The meeting tonight could hardly be called a victory for the Mayor. Only two details of official business were transacted. The resignation of Alderman W. L. Lewis was accepted and a

resolution for the repairing of the town pump was passed. This last bit of legislation was practically forced on the Council. Six of the last Council said the pump had fallen into a bad state of repair. It just had to be fixed.

Every appointment the Mayor asked the Council to confirm was turned down. Mayor Wilson says she is determined to have her selections in office and she will continue to present her names for confirmation at every meeting of the Council henceforth.

After the meeting Mrs. Wilson reiterated her statement that she would fight the Council to a finish.
