The statistics of Canada provide for an  
 annual grant on account of mail subsidies  
 and steamship subsidies of the sum of  
 \$275,000. The special grants on this same  
 account for the year ending March 31, 1912,  
 will aggregate \$1,732,200, or more than  
 \$2,000,000 in all.

Sydney, Australia, is becoming the wool
