San Francisco Police Shaken Up, Lid Keepers Being Sent to the Suburbs.

MAYOR ARRANGES UPSET

Reorganization Means Shifting of 400 of Rank and File in Preparation for "Liberal Policy" of the Administration.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—(Special.)—The regime of the Paris of America and the administration along liberal lines today casts its shadow before it in the greatest shifting of officers and men that the police department of San Francisco ever has known.

Mildred in See's Flat With Consent of Both Parents, Says Woman.

DANNER MYSTERY DEEP

Witness Declares He Talked With Father of "Hazel," Who Brought Suit Against Prophet, Who Sought Compromise, He Says.

CHICAGO, July 6.—Mrs. Felicia Rees, mother of Mona Rees, concluded her testimony in the See trial today and Mrs. Rees' mother, Mrs. Mildred Bridges, followed her on the witness stand.

Mrs. Rees said that Stephen Bridges, who alleges that See mistreated his daughter, was at one time appointed president of the Absolute Life cult, his duties being of a business nature.

Mrs. Bridges testified that she was responsible for Mildred, but that the girl was left at See's flat with the consent of her father.

John F. Rosen testified that he talked with George Danner about filing the suit and that after it had been filed he was called on the telephone by Francis J. Callahan, one of the attorneys for the defense.

Without hesitation, Mrs. Rees answered: "Yes, the same as my father, mother and brother have kissed me."

"You let him kiss you without question, didn't you?" "He never kissed me unless there was occasion for it—for instance, in saying goodby."

MAINE PROOFS LACKING

EXPERT BOARD TO STUDY BATTLESHIP'S HULL.

Chief of Engineers in Charge of Raising, Thinks Origin May Never Be Disclosed.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—A board of naval experts is being selected by the Navy Department to study the hull of the battleship Maine, in Havana harbor, as the water is pumped from the cofferdam now surrounding the wreck.

The Navy Department officers are confident that the examination will prove the correctness of the findings of the Sampson board, which decided that the explosion which sank the Maine was caused by a torpedo or mine and that the explosion of the ship's magazines followed.
