## SCIENCE WINNING **CONSUMPTION WAR**

Dr. W. J. Butler, Chicago Savant, Declares Modern Methods Check Disease.

SERUM TEST IS UPHELD

Prevalence of Tuberculosis in Indlana Shown-Humans May Contract Bovine Disease-Oregon Society Elects Today.

Through the use of modern methods of medical practice and co-operation of the people with the medical world, tu-berculosis in the United States is gradually losing its hold, declares Dr. W. J. Butler, professor of medicine at the Chicago College of Medicine and Surgery, who led a general discussion of tuberculosis at yesterday's session of the annual meeting of the Oregon State Medical Association at the Com-

mercial Club.

The day was devoted exclusively to the consideration of tuberonlosis. Fig-ures were introduced to show the rav-ages of tuberculosis and the methods of prevention were discussed by world-wide authorities.

Dr. Butler, who is a recognized authority, said that the way of fighting the disease at present is to put more stress on preventing the disease and not so much en curing it. He said the serum diagnosis which has been invented is an accurate test and is doing to the contract of the said that the said that the said the serum diagnosis which has been invented in the contract of the said that th more good than probably all the other inventions combined,

### Test Found Valuable.

This test makes it possible to de-tect subsecutors in its early stages and with it detected its prevention from development is usually not a difficult task. Even if it is not possible in all cases to cure the disease, it is possible cases to cure the disease. to prevent the person from becoming to prevent the person from becoming a source of general distribution.

Dr. Butler said it is up to the people to determine when they desire the eradication of tuberculosis, that the medical world has done its part and the people must now recognize its danger and co-operate with doctors in the time the disease. Public opinion. fighting the disease. Public opinion, be said, has done more to help tuber-culosis get its present hold than any-

"Until comparatively recent years."
said Dr. Butler. "It had not been generally conceded that it was possible for a person to get tuberculosis from cattle. Recent experiments have shown that bovine and human tuber-culosis are undoubtedly much the same and a person can get the disease from drinking the milk of an infected cow. In this manner the disease has been read at a most deplorable rate and we are glad to say that that source is rapidly being cut off."

### Disease Virulent in Beast.

At the morning session Dr. Mazyck At the morning session Dr. Manyck Ravenel spoke on the relation of the tuberculosis found in persons and that found in cattle. He said tests had been made on guines pigs and the disease of the milch cow had been found to be about 25 times as virulent as that of the human being. No experiment has been made on a person with bovine tubercu-losis bacilli as yet, because no one has been found who would take the risk. heen found who would take the risk.

In. Ravenel said persons are afraid to
take the chance openly of catching the
disease, yet they drink milk from the
infected cow and in that manner become

He urged better care of cattle and the protection of people from milk from in-fected cows. He declared all miles cows should be tested for tuberculosis and those found to be infected should be killed. Dr. Ravenel complimented Portland on its sanifary measures in connection with dairy conditions.

### Indiana Statistics Shown.

Dr. J. N. Hurty, state health officer of Indiana, showed figures on tubercu-losis compiled in Indiana. These were displayed on cards and were made an important part of the discussion. One table with the caption, "Who Pays This Annual Bill?" was in the form of a charge account and read:

Money lost annually in educating those who die du completion of education from tuberculosis. I look in wages through sickness from tuberculosis a year. 
