SOUTH BEND MADE CENTER

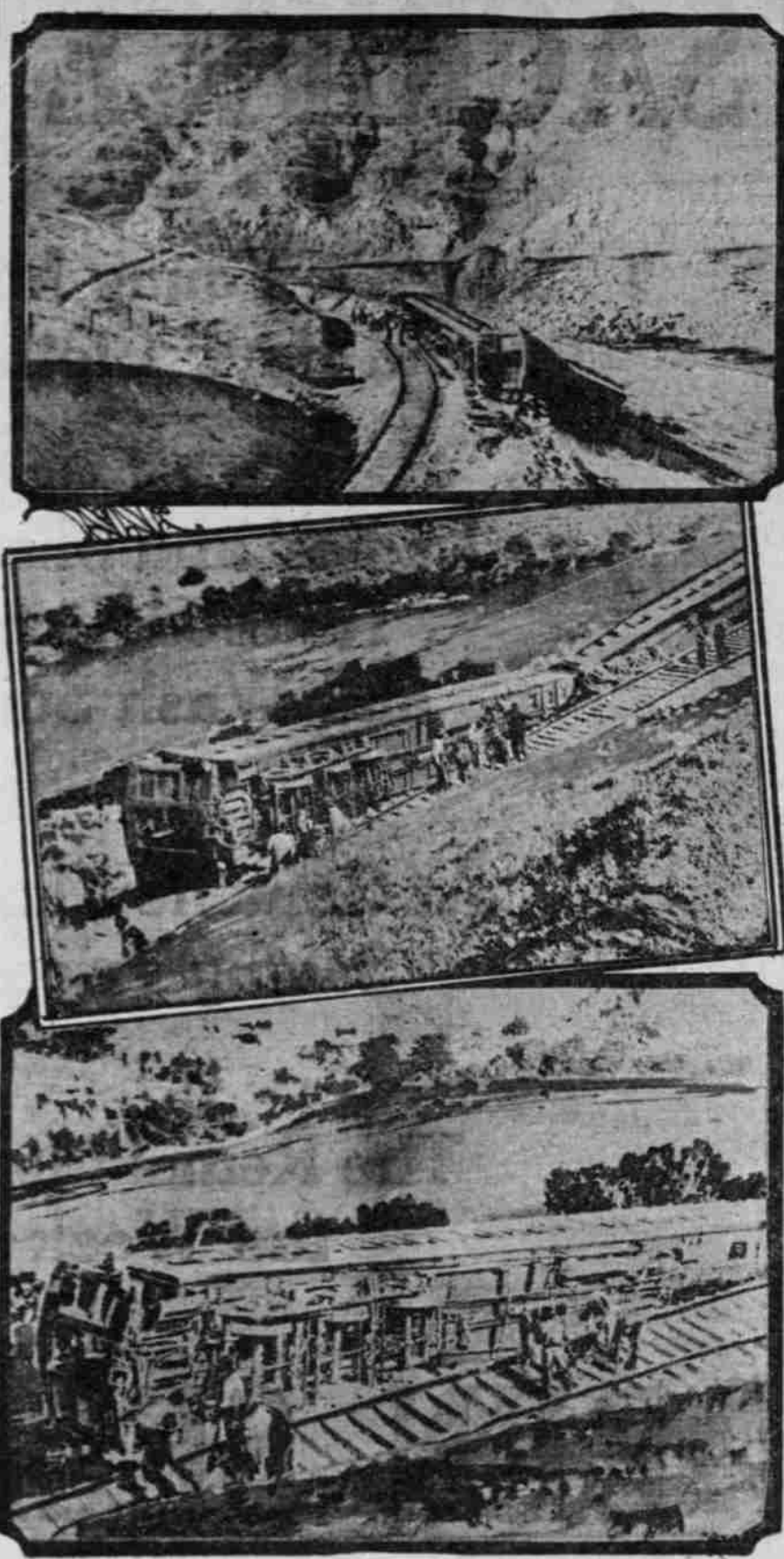
Canning Industry Promotion Soon to Mean Much for City.

Steps Taken to Avoid Forest Fires

SOUTH BEND, Wash., July 12.—(Special.)—Every possible effort is being made in the State of Washington to prevent the devastating forest fires which ravaged certain portions of the state last season and to this end, State Fire Warden J. R. Welby has given permission to the rangers employed by the Washington Forest Fire Association to grant permits for the burning of slashings and other refuse by settlers. This plan will make it much more convenient for settlers and, in many instances, the rangers can assist in the burnings and thus help to prevent the destruction of logging camps and green timber.

CHERRY YIELD IS HEAVY

Hood River Valley Crop Being Shipped to All Parts Now.

HOOD RIVER, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—Although the small amount of cherries grown in the Hood River Valley was cut short severely in a great portion of the community, the crop is yielding very heavily in some districts and the Applegrowers' Union has made a large number of small shipments. A branch 16 inches in length cut from a tree in the Maxwell orchards on the West Side last week, contained 168 large-sized cherries. The branch, which was taken from a Bing tree, weighed a little over two pounds.

CHERRY PACKING IS STUDIED

EUGENE, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—T. A. Seufert of The Dalles, an extensive cherry grower, is in Eugene to investigate the manner in which Lane County cherries are prepared for the confectionery trade. He has contracts covering large acreage near The Dalles and this year will have 4000 cases of the fruit to dispose of as against a usual crop of 40,000 cases. He hopes next year to "process" his cherries and ship them East in barrels as is done here.

DEVELOPMENT WORK VALUED

WARRENTON, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—At an open meeting under the auspices of the Warrenton Development League yesterday it was decided to begin a campaign to increase the membership roll immediately, with a view to sending a large delegation to the annual meeting of the Oregon Development League in Astoria, August 15 and 16. Last year this city sent two delegates to the annual meeting of the parent body at Salem, and the valuable information brought back, with practical data since received from the Portland Commercial Club, has been of great help.

INLAND IS IN DEAL

Northwestern Pacific Combine Believed in Making.

HILL'S CONTROL DUBIOUS

Authoritative Statement Out That Railroad Magnate Has Owned But 20 Per Cent of 100,000 Shares Since He Took Over Line.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 12.—(Special.)—Repeated rumors of a mammoth amalgamation of the Chicago & Northwestern and Northern Pacific lines into the Northwestern Pacific are being accompanied by rumors that the Spokane & Inland is to figure in the deal. Hill officials in Spokane deny this, although it has been known for some time that Hill's control of the Inland is rather a dubious one.

Now that the time has almost come for a severance of connections between the Northern Pacific and the Hill line, it would seem that the new Northern Pacific-Northwestern coalition could gain control of the Inland with ease, with 20 per cent of the stock already owned by the Northern Pacific and with enough of the stock in large blocks ready to be purchased.

COLLEGIAN KILLS HIMSELF

English Remittance Man, Pullman Student, Inhales Chloroform.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 12.—Kenneth Sharp, a young English remittance man whose family is said to be very wealthy, committed suicide last night in his room in a Seattle hotel by covering his head with blankets and inhaling chloroform. He had been a student in the State Agricultural College at Pullman, Wash., until the college term closed recently, when he came to Seattle. Sharp always was supplied with funds and did no work.

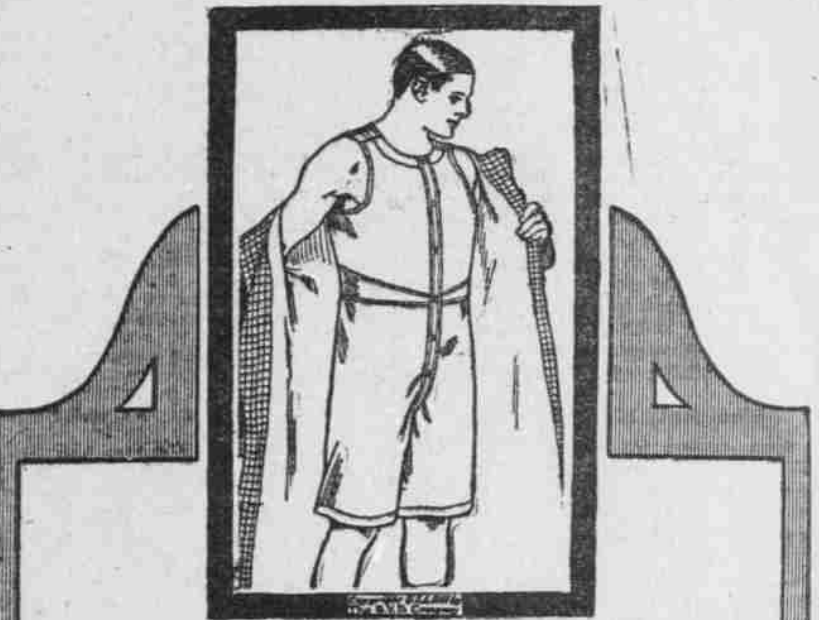
