

TRANSCONTINENTAL CONTEST IS BEING ARRANGED.

W. G. Grant, of New York, in Portland Mapping Out Course for Proposed Speed Event.

W. G. Grant, of New York City, holder of all world's coaching records for fours and tandem on the road and track, is a Portland visitor mapping out a route and plans for a race across the continent between an automobile and relays of coaching horses.
