### OREGON JOINS MOVE

"See America First" Meeting Attracts Delegates.

### TOURIST INFLEX SOUGHT

Thousands of Dollars Spent Abroad Would Be Turned to West, Says C. C. Chapman—Dry Farms Interests Flourish.

"See America First," the big National convention to be held in Baltimore, January 25-27, 1912, to promote a movement for touring in the United States during the summer months instead of crossing to Europe, will attract a large delegation from the Pacific Coast, and especially from Portland, since the idea for the convention was first suggested by Tom Richardson, formerly of the Commercial Club, during one of his visits in the East. The congress at Baltimore is the first of its kind ever held in the United States.

"The value of such a convention to the West will be incalculable," said C. C. Chapman, manager of the Commercial Club, yesterday. "For it will mean a great flood of travel to the Pacific Coast during the summer months that has heretofore gone across the Atlantic. Enormous sums of money go out of the United States every year in tourist travel. If the tide of summer travel can be turned by promotion of the 'See America First' idea, a great part of this will be saved at home, and the Pacific Coast and the Northwest will reap their share of the benefit."

### GLACIER PEAK LURES

MANY JOIN MAZAMA CLUB IN Proposed Ascent.

### Fishing Will Be Feature of Excursion That Will Leave Portland August 2.

Ever since it was announced that Glacier Peak had been chosen for this year's outing of the Mazama, numerous applications have been received for the privilege of joining the party when it leaves Portland on August 2. Glacier Peak is in the Cascade range about 9 miles from Wenatchee, Wash. In the Washington Forest Reserve. While the ascent involves no difficult or dangerous trails, it affords an unusual opportunity to observe the glacial formations. The mountain is said to embrace more glaciers than any other mountain in the United States. The peak was chosen because of the comparative ease with which it is reached and for the sport furnished by the trout streams in the vicinity. The permanent camp of the Mazamas will be pitched about 10 miles from the base of the mountain. The equipment and supplies will be sent forward about a week before the party leaves Portland, so that everything will be ready for the mountaineers when they arrive there.

A special car will be provided for the party, leaving Portland at 10 o'clock on the morning of Wednesday, August 2. Wenatchee will be reached Thursday morning. From there the party will go by steamer up the Columbia to Chelan Falls. From Chelan Falls stages will carry the party to Stehakin, at the north end of Lake Chelan. This point will be reached Thursday night, where the party will set up camp and prepare for the walk to the permanent camp. The next day will be devoted to the Stehakin River canyon. This part of the trip is to be made in leisurely fashion to enable the excursionists to take advantage of the fishing. The walk on the following day will be over the new Government trail up Agnes Creek canyon. Reports are that the fishing here is exceptionally good, the absence of trails heretofore having prevented fishermen from reaching the desirable points. ### PIPE OPINION RETURNED

City Attorney Says Mains May Be Laid if Revenue is Assured.

The City Water Board has a right to construct mains yielding less than 8 per cent revenue, provided it has reason to believe they will, in a short time, yield that revenue according to an opinion expressed yesterday by City Attorney Grant. He says on this question:

"I do not believe the statute was intended to restrict the Water Board to the laying of mains only where a yield of 8 per cent income would be insured, but the directors, in adopting the amendment, intended that the Water Board should exercise its judgment in each case, and the determination of the Board will be conclusive on the question."
