

LA FOLLETTE WOOL BILL LOOMING UP

Senate Democrats Plan First to Give United Support to House Measure.

COMPROMISE IS LIKELY

Sharp Modification of Wisconsin Senator's Bill May Be Demanded as Condition—Caucus Does Not Act Officially.

WASHINGTON, July 26.—Solid support of the House wool tariff revision bill was pledged in caucus tonight by the Democrats of the Senate. A resolution setting forth the Democratic attitude, offered by Senator Culbertson of Texas, was adopted without a dissenting voice, although the conference lasted through the greater part of two evenings and was signalled by protracted debate.

At tonight's meeting, it is understood, the discussion was devoted largely to the discovery of some parliamentary method of resuscitating the La Follette wool bill if the House measure is voted down.

La Follette's Bill Doomed.
The La Follette bill will be offered as a substitute for the House measure when a vote on the latter is demanded, and it is conceded it will be killed.

Then, if the House bill meets a similar fate, an effort, it is said, will be made to reconsider the vote on the House bill, which, if successful, will be followed promptly by reintroducing the La Follette measure as a substitute. By coalition of the insurgent Republicans and Democrats, the La Follette substitute then is to be passed.

TOWN OF TALENT HAS FIRE

Lack of Wind Averts Serious Early Morning Conflagration.

ASHLAND, Or., July 26.—(Special.)—The thriving town of Talent, five miles north of here, was threatened by fire last night, when two of its business buildings burned to the ground. The fire originated in the building owned by James Garvin and L. B. Thurber, and was used as a pool and card room down stairs and a dancing hall on the upper floor. The Talent Hotel, about 30 feet off, caught and both buildings burned to the ground. The Rogers building in the rear was badly scorched but was saved by water.

Prompt action on the buildings across the street saved the town from a very serious conflagration. Garvin & Thurber's loss is about \$6000; partly covered by insurance. Some of the bedding and furniture from the lower floor of the hotel was saved. Loss about \$2000, with \$600 insurance. The moist condition of everything, following the storm of Monday, and the fact that there was no wind saved the town. Talent is without adequate fire protection and the citizens are clamoring for a water system.

WOMAN HIKER TAKEN ILL

Wife of Retired Naval Surgeon Compelled to Halt on Long Trip.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 26.—(Special.)—A letter received from the mountaineers who are engaged in a 15-mile walk in the Cascade Mountains, will include the ascent of Mount Adams and Goat Rocks, brings news that on the third day out, July 18, Mrs. LeMotte, wife of a retired naval surgeon, was taken ill. Dr. and Mrs. LeMotte were left behind when the party moved on the next day. Last Friday one of the six packers was taken ill, and men were sent with him and horses sent for to take him to Lewis.

A pleasant incident of one of the camps occurred when the leader apologized for taking the party eight miles farther than they need have gone by a shorter trail. He was shouted down by the mountaineers, who said a little thing like eight miles was not worth mentioning. The weather has been hot and the mosquitoes bad. Letters sent to Trout Lake, Skamania County, will reach the mountaineers when they arrive there on August 1, after ascending Mount Adams.

PASTOR'S CELERY IS BEST

Sherwood Minister Reaps Profit in Cultivating Three Acres.

SHERWOOD, Or., July 26.—(Special.)—Rev. J. C. Cowman, pastor of the Congregational church here, has a side line which is more profitable from a worldly point of view than preaching.

Seven years ago he started in a small way to raise celery, and it was predicted he could not compete with the foreigner, who was putting an inferior grade on the market at 35 to 40 cents a dozen, but he proved the contrary by selling his entire product at 90 cents a dozen.

He now has three acres planted in celery and made his first shipment for this year to the Portland market yesterday.

Missing New York Beauty Is Working in Philadelphia.

\$1000 REWARD WITHDRAWN

Family of Rich New York Girl Who Prefers Work to Luxurious Idleness Gets Message Saying She Has Good Job.

NEW YORK, July 26.—(Special.)—The family of Louise Swan, the beautiful girl of 19 years who disappeared from her home here more than a week ago, received an unsigned message today which led them to feel that their daughter was safe, and a reward of \$1000 for finding her was withdrawn by her father, William Swan.

Miss Swan is noted for her beauty. Her family is wealthy and she has been surrounded by luxuries all her life. However, she frequently complained that she had no taste for the life of a wealthy do-nothing, and wanted to earn her own living. When she was scolded for wanting to remain through the evening at a seashore, she had committed suicide, and her mother was prostrated by grief. It was feared for a time that the shock of her daughter's disappearance would kill Mrs. Swan. Miss Swan took little money with her when she went away.

WIFE STERNLY REBUKED

Frenchman Wins \$50,000 Airship Race in Great Britain.

CROWD GIVES HIM OVATION

Successful Aviator Makes 1010-Mile Circuit in 22 Hours 28 Minutes. Vedrine Is Second Man to Reach Brooklands.

BROOKLANDS, Eng., July 26.—A. Beaumont won the \$50,000 prize offered by the London Daily Mail for the circuit of Great Britain race of 1010 miles. The Frenchman finished here at 2:07 o'clock this afternoon, making a splendid "volplane" from a height of 1000 feet.

Beaumont's total actual flying time was 22 hours, 28 minutes and that of Vedrine, who was second, was 23 hours 39 minutes.

Vedrine reached the goal at 2:17 o'clock. Both Frenchmen received an enthusiastic reception from a huge crowd. Beaumont, on alighting, was seized by admirers and carried shoulder high to his tent.

The conditions of the race provided that contestants were to go the entire distance in the same machine, equipped with the same mechanical parts used at the outset.

HINDU HATES AMERICA

EX-BRITISH SOLDIER WRITES INSULTING TO TAFT.

Man From India Who Shot Five in Chicago Would Kill Everybody With White Face.

CHICAGO, July 26.—While the police were planning to send him to an asylum for the criminal insane, N. Hausa, a Hindu and former member of the British army, who wounded five persons and caused a panic in Chicago's crowded downtown streets yesterday by discharging a rifle at the passing throng, sat in a cell at Central station today and jeered at his guards.

Indifferent to the fate of his victims, the mail-smiled when told one of the wounded men might die.

"I bought the rifle to kill all the bad people in Chicago," he said. "I hate all your American faces. You have been cruel to me and I want to kill everybody."

Hausa came to this country from India four years ago. A letter addressed to President Taft was found in his pocket, and evidently was written a few hours before he ran amuck in Chicago's streets. It was scribbled in lead pencil and began:

"His Highness, the President Taft of the United States of America, Washington, D. C. Your Highness, dear, dead, deaf, dumb and blind President."

The text is incoherent and refers to May 24 as the most important date in the world. Dr. P. L. Prentiss, chief of the local immigration inspectors, has begun an investigation with a view to having Hausa deported.
