PARKISON WITHIN CALL

PETITION CIRCULATOR SAID TO BE IN SAN JOSE.

Attorney Yanckwich Declares Client Intends to Fight Case and Will Appear When Wanted.

H. J. Parkison, who circulated the recent Oregon University referendum petitions, has not left California and intends to be in Oregon when the referendum cases come up for trial and will do his best to win the civil suits which are to be started.

Such was the declaration yesterday of Harry Yanckwich, attorney for Parkison. Mr. Yanckwich says Mr. Parkison is not afraid to return to Portland and will do so when the time comes. He says he can be found at present at 123 A Alum Rock avenue, San Jose, Cal. He says Mrs. Parkison has not gone to California, but is residing at 399 Sixteenth street, Portland.

"Mr. Parkison is representing a number of organizations of Oregon in this referendum proposition," said Attorney Yanckwich, "and he intends to fight it to a finish. I am his counsel, or rather we are associated counsels, and we have arranged to carry this fight through to the last."
"We are fighting for a principle and we have a strong backing of Oregon organizations. I am not at liberty to say what the backing is or what the principle is, but it is what we believe

is right and we are going to fight for it.

"The actual facts in the case are that Mr. Parkison was obtained by these organizations to get up these petitions and he engaged a number of men to circulate the petitions and obtain names. Of course if the circulators went away and turned in scintillous names, that could not be helped by Mr. Parkison and he and I will do all we can to help send those men to jail if they did that sort of work. We believe that we have enough names of legitimate taxpayers and voters to make our petitions good and we hope to win a victory over any civil action which might be presented.

"As to the criminal actions, they will be decided on their merit and Mr. Parkison will be on hand to give whatever testimony he can. We have nothing to hide. As to this proposition being a personal one with Mr. Parkison there is nothing in it excepting that he is representing organizations which have wide and strong influence and are contending for a principle which they believe is right and which Mr. Parkison believes is right.

"Mr. Parkison had to leave Portland. He has had so much business worry and his health was so bad that a rest was necessary. He is needed here in his business but we have to let him remain away awhile to regain his health.

"As to any statement that Mr. Parkison has left California and may not return to Portland to help out those who are in jail because of any scheme on his part, there is nothing to it. He can be found at any time at the address I have given. His wife is still in Portland and will continue to be here."

PLEA FOR DELAY MADE

CLEARING OF COLUMBIA AT SNAKE TO BE URGED.

Chamber of Commerce Committee Asks Engineers to Postpone Hearing Until Data Arrive.

Resolutions asking the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors at Washington, D. C., to postpone the date of hearing the appeals from the advance conclusions reached by the engineers who surveyed the Columbia River between the mouth of the Snake River and Wenatchee two years ago, were adopted by the Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon. The executive committee was instructed to prepare data and information to be presented to the board in an effort to show that improvement of the channel will be of material benefit.

Reports received by the Chamber of Commerce indicate that the report of the engineers who made the survey was based on the probable amount of local traffic that might be handled through the improved portion of the river and not on the effect it might have on an international water highway extending from Southern Canada to the Pacific Ocean, such as is proposed.

The Canadian government is considering joining the United States in the improvement of the Columbia to the end that it may be made navigable from Canadian territory to the sea. The engineers have set August 15 as the date for hearing the appeal of

GUARD SENT TO COAST

GENERAL FINZER ISSUES ORDERS TO STATE TROOPS.

National Guard to Observe How Regulars Man Fort Guns and Practice to Repel Foes.

Coast defense maneuvers in which the entire Oregon National Guard will participate are to be held early in August, orders directing the movement of Guard troops having been issued yesterday by Adjutant-General Finzer. The orders direct that the Third Regiment proceed August 7 to Columbia Beach where camp is to be established. With the Third Regiment will be the Ambulance Company and Battery A. The Fourth Regiment is directed to proceed to Fort Stevens.

All the troops will thus be in touch with the Army fortifications at the mouth of the Columbia River and the problems assigned will relate to repelling invasion by landing parties from the sea and defense of the Coast forts from the rear. The exercises are such as might have to be worked out in reality in the event of invasion from the Pacific.

Ten days will be spent in camp and during that period thorough instruction will be had in field work. A programme has already been mapped out. It provides one day for attendance at the Astoria Centennial.

SALMON RATES ARE CUT

Railroads to Set 70 Cents as Tariff to Eastern Points.

Reduced rates on salmon shipments from Coast terminals to all points eastward have been announced by the railroads, effective in 35 or 40 days. This will enable the rail carriers to compete with ocean transportation lines and will give the packers advantage of an earlier Eastern market.

The present rate is 85 cents for 100 pounds in shipments having a minimum rate of 40,000 pounds to all Eastern points.

The new rate will be 70 cents for 100 pounds with a minimum weight of 50,000 pounds a shipment to all points between the Missouri River and the Atlantic seaboard. The rate for 100 pounds of salmon will be 75 cents for 100 pounds, with the same minimum limit.

The old rate of 85 cents for 100 pounds will be maintained for those who want to ship in quantities of 40,000 pounds.
