As manager of the Portland team Vig-neux was a popular favorite, but in 1960 he met with a severe accident which handicapped his work and no doubt had much to do with the poor showing of Portland's first Pacific Coast League team. The following year Vigneux re-signed the management and entered busi-mess in Portland. opening a cafe on Washington street near Fourth. Later he opened a larger and handsomer place at the corner of Sixth and Washington streets, and was doing a big business when he was attacked by paresis, which eventually resulted in the loss of his mind and his commitment to a sani-tarium.
