FIVE TAKE \$1000 LOOT

ROBBERS STEAL AUTO AFTER RANSACKING JEWELRY SHOP.
Thieves, Unable to Manage Car, Abandon It and Escape After Daring Crime.

Five robbers stole jewelry valued at over \$1000 from the store of J. H. Meisner at 419 Hawthorne avenue, yesterday morning, and the same men, it is believed, attempted to escape with their loot by stealing an automobile from the garage of W. J. Clemens, at 694 Grand avenue, in plain sight of many early risers. The attempt was a failure, because the thieves seemed to be drunk and ignorant of handling automobiles.

Careful "looting" seems to have preceded the robbery of the jewelry store. A tin shop next to the store was entered and a safe was opened. The thieves men gained entrance to the loft. They entered the jewelry store, where they stole 23 watches, six chains, a pair of bracelets and 15 rings. Most of the loot had been left for repairs.

From evidence gathered by Detectives Snow and Moloney, the robbery must have been committed after 3 o'clock yesterday morning. Mr. Clemens' garage was entered between 5 and 6 o'clock. The thieves broke open the door of the garage and it seems that they ran the car about a block away by gravity. Then they cranked the engine and mounted, being observed by several persons, who suspected nothing but a joy-ride party. The thieves had gone but a block when the car became unmanageable, and ran into the fence in front of the home of R. D. Inman. It sustained damage to the extent of \$150. Mr. Clemens has offered a reward of \$50 for the discovery of the thieves.

Report of the theft of the automobile had not reached Captain of Detectives Moore when Detectives Snow and Mo-

loney were sent to investigate the robbery of the jewelry store, and it is believed that they worked without knowledge of the theft, and to lift and identify the foreman of the Crystal Ice Company, who reported seeing five men and who dressed in men's clothing and who were carrying a full set of tools and a woman of the neighborhood saw two men slinking southward on Grand avenue at 3 o'clock yesterday morning.

WELLS-FARGO DROPS SUIT
Check for Taxes That Were Protested Received by County.

County Assessor Sigler levied an assessment against the Wells-Fargo Company addition, but the company demurred, contending that the value of these properties was included in the assessment made by the State Tax Commission. Wallace McCamant was employed as attorney and the case went into the courts, the county contending that the state assessment did not include the Portland real estate.

BARRETT TAFT'S DEPUTY

PAN-AMERICAN HEAD TO OPEN ASTORIA CENTENNIAL.
Federal Official to Replace Secretary Fisher at Ceremony—Fete to Begin August 10.

John Barrett received a telegram yesterday from President Taft asking that he represent the Nation's chief in opening the Astoria Centennial celebration August 10. This Mr. Barrett has consented to do.

Secretary of the Interior Fisher was to have represented the President at the opening of the Astoria celebration, but Mr. Barrett received an intimation some time ago that he might not be able to be present. Secretary Fisher asked Mr. Barrett if he could delay his program sufficiently to be present at Astoria when the centennial opens. This Mr. Barrett consented to do, provided it was the wish of President Taft.

Mr. Barrett left last night for Astoria where he will be the guest of the chamber of commerce today.

He will attend a banquet at Astoria tonight after which he will leave for Tacoma where he will be entertained by the chamber of commerce there Monday. He will go to Seattle Tuesday and return to Astoria August 19 to represent President Taft at the opening of the centennial. From Astoria he will go to Vancouver, B. C., and thence to Washington making many stops on the way.
