

TOGO VISITS TOMB AT MOUNT VERNON

Japanese, Admiral Stands at Salute in Resting Place of Washington.

TOKEN GIVEN REVERENTLY

Invocation in Mother Tongue Accompanied Wreath of Roses. Trip From Washington Is Made in President's Yacht.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Reverently and with a brief invocation in Japanese, Admiral Count Togo placed a wreath of roses on the tomb of Washington at Mount Vernon Sunday. A group of a dozen, among whom were the Japanese Ambassador, Acting Secretary of the Navy, Wintthrop, and Rear Admiral and Chandler Hale, Third Assistant Secretary of State, watched the diminutive Oriental enter the mausoleum and stand solemnly at attention. He spoke softly, but audibly, for a moment and then set down the wreath.

Trip Made in Mayflower.

The guest of the Nation, Admiral Togo, made the trip from the City of Mount Vernon on the President's yacht, the Mayflower. As Admiral Togo and his wife, Liette, and Commander Taniguchi, and the Japanese Ambassador mounted the gangway, a company of marines on shore presented arms, while every man on board the Mayflower stood at attention, the bugles blowing a salute. The marine band then played a few strains of the Japanese national anthem and the ship weighed anchor.

Admiral Salutes Deceased.

The Admiral was led through the numerous rooms. He bowed and saluted when he saw the bed in which Washington died. He paused before Washington's sword and read the inscription. One of the party pointed out the wine and liquor case which once figured in the hospitality of Mount Vernon. "Pretty generous," commented a Navy officer, and the little Japanese smiled quickly in appreciation. On the Mount Vernon autograph book the Admiral wrote with a firm hand in English: "Admiral Count Togo, August 6, 1911." Admiral Togo was the guest of the Japanese Ambassador last night.

TWO TERMS PROVE ENOUGH

Delegate Wickersham, of Alaska, Will Not Run Again.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 7.—Delegate Wickersham of Alaska, who arrived here yesterday to visit his son, said today that he would not again run for Congress, and that he had engaged with two terms. His son, Lieutenant D. S. Wickersham, is in charge of the Navy recruiting station here.

Referring to conditions in Alaska, Delegate Wickersham said:

"Capital is getting a monopoly on the great undeveloped resources of Alaska—the natural wealth of the country which should be enjoyed by all of the people instead of by favored interests.

"In spite of these conditions, Alaska, with her 564,354 population had a trade last year with the United States which amounted to \$52,000,000. Twenty million dollars of Alaskan gold was sent to the United States last year to purchase food and clothing, and \$12,000,000 worth of fish was exported. Alaska last year had a bigger cash trade per capita with the United States than any other of the possessions of our country."

IRRIGATION'S FATHER DEAD

Joseph Parry Mourned by Five Widows and 69 Grandchildren.

OGDEN, Utah, Aug. 7.—Joseph Parry, the "Father of Irrigation" and the founder of the asphaltum business in the Intermountain region, died suddenly here tonight. He was one of the original pioneers of the state, having crossed the plains with one of the Mormon wagon trains.

He was one of 23 children, 14 of whom together with five widows, survive him. He had 48 grandchildren and 21 great-grandchildren.

AT THE THEATERS

NO better test of the popularity of

Max Figman as a laughter-provoking comedian and the Heilig Theater as an enjoyable place of amusement on a Summer night could be asked for than the well-balanced and finely staged presentation there Sunday night of the comedy, "The Man on the Box," with Mr. Figman in his various roles of actor, groom, suitor and all-around joker.

So much anticipation had been awakened that the theater was crowded and many persons were turned away for lack of seating accommodations. It looks as if Mr. Figman has caught the popular fancy as a "Summer" comedian and that the month's business at the Heilig, in a series of light, smiling comedies, will be a profitable one to him and enjoyable to the audience.

The part of Lieutenant Robert Worburton, lately resigned from the United States Army, fits Mr. Figman just as a kid glove fits the hand. Mr. Figman is funny almost to the point of being eccentric. His speech is crisp, his gestures and facial changes comical, and as Worburton he looks as if he is playing. To be sure, he has often appeared as Worburton, but the part must have become a portion of himself. Mr. Figman's triumph was in a large measure due to the excellent support he received, particularly from Miss Lolita Robertson, who in private life is Mrs. Figman.

The plot is simple: Worburton had crossed from Europe in the same steamer with Miss Betty Annesley, played by Miss Lolita Robertson, and after he had shaved his beard and otherwise beautified himself, attends a house party, and in a moment of frolic jumps on what he thinks is his sister's couch and pair, but finds that he is on the "wrong box." Miss Annesley is one of the passengers, there is a police station story and he accepts a job as her groom, just to be near her. All sorts of amusing mixups occur.

Mr. Figman's support deserves commendation and the dainty characterization by Miss Jane Urban is one of the bright moments of the comedy. Much care has been lavished on the last scene and the latter, with nearly all the men in scarlet hunting coats, is a bright one.

"The Man on the Box" will be at the Heilig all week, with matinees Wednesday and Saturday afternoons.

VALLEY'S FUTURE GREAT

Dr. James Withycombe Says That by Following Scientific Agricultural Methods, Farmers Can Double Revenues.

"Better farming methods, smaller and better cultivated farms and the production of wheat, field peas, hogs, draft

horses and poultry will make the Columbia River Basin one of the most prosperous sections of the state," said Dr. James Withycombe, director of the Agricultural Experiment Station at Corvallis while in Portland Sunday.

Dr. Withycombe has just returned from Moro, Sherman County, where he passed several days inspecting the work of the branch experiment station of 25 acres at that point. He is very enthusiastic over the agricultural possibilities of the county, provided the farmers apply improved methods to the cultivation of their crops. Sherman County, he declared, will produce this year about 1,500,000 bushels of grain, or 60 per cent of a normal crop.

"This year Winter wheat (Turkish red), grown under field conditions, yielded 22 bushels an acre, although the season was one of the driest in the history of the country," said Dr. Withycombe, discussing the results of the experiment station demonstrations at Moro.

Methods Proved by Test.

"To show the difference in farming methods, the wheat crop in another field, directly across the road from the experiment station field was so poor that it will not be harvested. The failure of this crop was due to the poor system of farming employed and failure to conserve the moisture. The wheat in the experiment station farm at Moro was the only wheat I saw in Sherman County that was long enough to bind."

The Moro station has 550 experimental plots used for variety tests, in which are included 75 varieties of wheat, corn, sorghum, Kaffir corn and emmer. The station has a field of black emmer that promises to yield 35 bushels an acre. This crop makes splendid feed for swine, cattle and horses. There are also 150 acres in connection with the station where crops are grown under strictly farming conditions.

The most gratifying experiments of the year were with the field pea. While not yet threshed, a conservative estimate fixes the yield of the crop at between 15 and 20 bushels an acre. Taking the minimum estimate, this means a little more than 200 pounds of pork an acre, worth at the present market price, \$14. This is a fine result, considering the expenses of harvesting, as the hogs attend to gathering the crop and will leave the land in better condition for wheat production than a bare Summer fallow.

Revenues Could Be Doubled.

"There are splendid opportunities for farming in the Columbia River Basin along different lines from those heretofore followed. The farmers of that section should no longer depend wholly on wheat. While wheat should and always will be the dominant crop, yet hogs, draft horses and poultry should be important factors in the agriculture of the section. I am quite sure if the farmers of Sherman County will take up the line of farming I have suggested, their revenues will be double what they are now receiving from their land."

"For instance, the horses on the farm should be bred mares. Each mare could raise a first-class colt each year and still assist in the farm work virtually as well as a gelding. This would give the farmer young horses to sell all the time and provide an important revenue for the farm. By growing field peas in rotation with wheat, Sherman County can be made one of the greatest hog countries in the West. It is also an ideal country for poultry. The poultry on each farm should be made to supply the necessary revenue for both the house and the family."

"With the proper application of these farming methods, there is no reason why the farmers of Sherman County should not be exceptionally prosperous."

MAN IS BETRAYED AS SPY BY WOMAN

Army Private Said to Be Austrian Count According to Letters Made Public.

AMERICAN SECRET SOUGHT

Anita Dyer Tells Recruiting Officers at Indianapolis She Is Engaged to United States Soldier Here to Steal.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 7.—Because of an affidavit furnished by Miss Anita Dyer, formerly of Philpot, Ky., Captain James Watson, in charge of the local Army recruiting office, has asked the War Department to arrest Private George, said to be of the 13th Coast Artillery, stationed at Fort Totten, New York, charging him with being a spy in the employ of the Austrian government.

The alleged exposure of Peters, who, according to the informants is Count Windach-Graetz, of Prague, Bohemia, was made by Miss Pearl Dyer, while trying to obtain his release from the artillery corps through the local recruiting station. Miss Dyer says she and Peters are engaged.

Girl Gives Up Letters.

Miss Dyer has turned over to the authorities letters from Peters which Captain Watson says are in accordance with her statements.

Several days ago Miss Dyer appeared at the local recruiting station and inquired about obtaining the release of Peters from the service. At the time according to Captain Watson, she said he was her brother, and by her manner attracted suspicion to herself.

Local police were called out on the case last Friday by the Army officers and Miss Dyer was summoned to headquarters.

At first she refused to answer questions in regard to Peters, but under a rapid fire of questions broke down and said that Peters was an Austrian spy, sent to America to obtain, if possible, the manner of manufacturing dynamite, a powerful explosive known only to the United States Army and used to appraise American fortifications. She made an affidavit to her story.

Peters Not Afraid.

In the correspondence turned over to the police are a number of letters written to the girl in Kentucky by Peters in which he outlined his plans for obtaining the information desired by his government.

In another letter, which is said to have been written to Miss Dyer since she came to Indianapolis about three months ago, in answer to her pleading to him to give up his dangerous work, Peters said that he was in no peril, as he had a number of aides who would come to his assistance if he needed them.

ICEBERG JARS LINER

CREW FIGHTS WITH SANDBAGS TO KEEP OUT WATER.

Inrush Buries One of Crew, but Mates Save Him—Woman Among Injured—Vessel Keeps On.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—The Anchor Line steamer Columbia, which collided with an iceberg on August 2, reached New York today from Glasgow under her own steam. Many yards of canvas covered the hole made in her bow by the iceberg, but her officers said the damage was entirely above the water line.

The accident occurred about 120 miles off Newfoundland. Close examination of the Columbia at her dock tonight revealed greater damage than at first was reported. Her hold was flooded with hundreds of tons of water, her plates crumpled for several feet, her port anchor was carried away and several persons aboard were suffering from injuries. Among them was Mrs. Elizabeth Ogilvie, an elderly woman bound for her daughter's home in Pittsburgh. Mrs. Ogilvie's head was cut when she was hurled to the deck.

Captain Mitchell explained that the vessel was stopped in the fog when he heard the echo of his fog horn from the berg. After the impact, he said, water poured into the forward hold to a depth of nine feet. The pumps were set going and the crew was put to stemming the larval with sand bags and other makeshifts.

Passengers and crew were in many instances thrown to the floor. Tom Murray, the forecastle lookout was buried under the tide which poured down upon the vessel's deck. When his shipmates dug him out he was senseless.

Tables in the dining saloon were swept bare of the evening meal and stewards were sent sprawling. The passengers showed little symptoms of panic. They went to the deck to gain a view of the iceberg. Several of them said it towered more than 100 feet above them and was a quarter of a mile in length. The fog prevented accurate estimate of its extent however.

Hop Spider Menaces Lane Crop.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 7.—(Special)—The red spider hop pest has appeared in Lane County, according to J. W. Beary, manager of extensive hop fields in this county. He estimates his crop at half of its size last year.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 7.—Chief of Police Sebastian tonight instructed his entire force to assist in the search for a missing woman, who was last seen in the city of Las Vegas, Nev., who has been missing for five days. Relatives of the missing woman are at loss to account for her disappearance.
