

PEREGRINUS JUST BEGINS LIFE NEW

James Casey, Arrested More Than 800 Times, Becomes Respectable Farmer.

REFORM SEEMS STABLE

Kindness of Jailers and Andy Vaughn at Rockpile Put Derelict on New Track and He Stays—Son Encouraged.

From a prison trusty and an in-and-out-of-jail career of many years' standing to a self-respecting and industrious citizen is the transformation of James Casey, known to every policeman in the city in the last six months.

Just a little kindly interest and assistance on the part of his keepers is all that has been supplied from outside Casey's own determination has supplied the rest. The former trusty, who for years did not sleep two consecutive nights out of jail, is now virtually manager of a big firm down the river, where he works like a beaver. Once in a while he comes to the city, but returns as sober as he left.

Casey's transformation began four months ago when Judge Maxwell tried the novel experiment of giving him 60 days and sending him on his honor to report at the rockpile. He appeared promptly with his commitment and served his time without a murmur.

Father and Son Apart. Tradition is that Casey was rounding out his 50th and odd year when he was taken to the rockpile. Before his arrest he was a well-to-do farmer, but an expert mechanic and is said to have been in the city for years, during which time he has been in the standard contrivances. He has a son, an excellent mechanic, working in this city, but for seven years, during which time the old man kept away from the son's neighborhood. Their first meeting in those years took place a few days ago, when the now well-dressed farmer dropped in for a little chat and renewed the long-interrupted acquaintance.

To "Andy" Vaughn, assistant superintendent at the Linton quarry, belongs all of the credit that is not Casey's own. Vaughn has long been a friend of the ancient derelict, and was much impressed when Casey came to him for work without a guard. When the old man's time was about to expire, Vaughn looked around and found him a place at a big farm near Linton, where an elderly woman and her daughters needed some one to look after things.

Good Behavior Lasts. Casey was given a few days' trial, and did so well that the place was made permanent. He has now been at work two months, in which period he has made several visits to the city, returning every time in the best of condition. The old fellow wears better clothes and eats better than he has for years, and the drooping lines about his mouth are disappearing. His remarkable mechanical ability has made him a valuable hand about the farm, where he stands in high favor.

"Jim is as busy as a bee," said Vaughn yesterday. "He sometimes comes over to the quarry to visit us, but he does not stay long and always, well, I must hurry back, as I have this and that to attend to."

"Keep up the good work, Dad," said the son when he grasped the hand of his long-stranded father, the other day. "If you can make it stick, there'll be a place for the hop for you when you have made good."

And Casey, whose only friends for years have been policemen and the derelicts of the North End, is working earnestly and honestly for that job.

TRIMMED! CRY CITIZENS

Street Pipeline Costs Four Times the Real Price, They Assert.

Complaint that the city paid four times as much for its three-inch drain line, laid along Thurman street from fourteenth to twenty-first streets, as the actual value of the pipe, has been made by a letter signed by seven property owners along the street, and filed with city Auditor Barber yesterday. The letter was a high price paid, but 40 feet of the pipe was crushed by the steamrollers used in paving the street. It is further asserted that the pipe, which is made of cast iron, should have been bought for \$13, and paid 60 cents a foot for six-inch pipe which an individual could have bought for 15 cents a foot. The three-inch pipe is alleged to have cost the city 12 cents a foot, when it could have been bought by any one else for 3 cents a foot.

Another complaint is that the top of the street was not thoroughly cooked before it was paved. The property owners complaining are the Bridge & Beach Manufacturing Company, Portland Artificial Ice Company, W. E. Harris, W. H. Harris, H. W. Price, John Burke and A. and M. Delongie.

MONTH'S GRACE GRANTED

Railroad Commission Given 30 Days to Plead in Connections Case.

Clyde B. Atchison, of the Oregon Railroad Commission, appeared in the United States Court yesterday and was given 30 days in which to plead further to the suit brought by the Harriman brothers against the commission to restrain it from enforcing certain orders issued recently.

By an order the Railroad Commission is to enforce the Harriman order to restrain the United States Court. In an opinion last Monday, Judge Overton sustained the demurrer of the railroad system to the complaint, holding that the attempted enforcement of the order involved interstate commerce, and for that reason exceeded the jurisdiction of the state government.

LIFE FEARS FOR SPOUSE

Over Woman Writes That Husband May Be in Danger.

Mrs. E. F. Reynolds, of 2320 Emerson street, Denver, Colo., has written a letter to Mayor Ruesslight urging that a man named Henry B. Reynolds for her, and that she fears he will be killed by

persons wishing to get his life insurance. She says: "Will you or some official of Portland, please find Henry B. Reynolds for me, and see his daughter, that went to Oswattamie State Hospital and took Mr. Reynolds away without my consent. Mr. Reynolds has been blind for five years, and the last year was in such a bad condition that I had to have him placed in the asylum at Oswattamie."

"When they thought that he was a little better they took him away without my knowing where he is or what they are going to do with him, and unknown to the public, which I firmly believe. He has a life insurance policy. I think they intend to get rid of him and then they will get the insurance. I am his wife and have been for 18 years, and I think it a dirty mean trick to steal Mr. Reynolds and take him to Portland without my consent, besides they have no home or any place to take care of him. I can take care of him myself, and it is a pleasure to me because I am lonely and lonesome without him. I have written four or five times, but they will not answer me. Mr. Reynolds is 5 feet 3 inches tall, has blue eyes, curly hair and is quite bald headed. Now please let me know as soon as you can because I am going to use the law on them, when I get them located. The last address was 447 Seventh street, but I have written them and they will not answer."

\$2000 FUND SOUGHT

SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION PLANS CANVASS.

State Organization Aims to Have Uniform Graded Classes Taught by Trained Teachers.

A comprehensive campaign among the business men of Portland, to raise \$2000 for the Oregon State Sunday School Association will be opened Monday, August 14, and will continue four days and a half.

The fund for the canvassers at the Young Men's Christian Association and the Young Women's Christian Association at noon the following Friday.

Thomas B. Ellivey, of New Orleans, secretary of the state association in Louisiana, will direct the campaign. Mr. Ellivey has been in Portland for about a week, planning for the movement, and final arrangements were made yesterday afternoon at a meeting of prominent members of the Oregon Sunday School Association in the office of Rev. C. A. Phipps, general secretary.

Committees will be appointed to take charge of soliciting among the business men. Representatives from the various state and county associations will pay official visits to all the Sunday schools in Portland next Sunday, to stir up enthusiasm in the campaign, and the Monday following the association expects to have 25 business men of the city lined up on the different committees to carry on the solicitation.

The aim of the State Sunday School Association is to obtain uniform organization in the Sunday schools of the state and to arrange for uniform graded lessons and for trained teachers in the Sunday schools. The fund for which the coming campaign will be prosecuted will be applied to the work of organization.

CARMEN'S PICNIC SHINES

Billy Oldman, Veteran Motorman, Predicts Fair Day for Fete.

Billy Oldman, who has been 22 years in service on Portland streetcar lines, is in great demand these days. Billy, who is the veteran in service on the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, started in as a hostler in 1888, soon after that becoming a driver on one of the old horsecars. And ever since that time Billy has been watchful of the weather. Streetcar men are now appealing to him and pleading for good weather on next Thursday, when they hold their annual picnic on the Oaks. As the carmen have planned the balloon ascensions and an open-air vaudeville, they want the best of weather.

"So far indications are good," Billy has told the men who have made inquiries. "When I was driving horsecars I used to be able to tell the weather a long time ahead. The horses seemed to know when it was going to rain or storm, and I could tell by the way they worked what was going to happen. Since I've been handling the 'bikes' I find that the cattle, too, though not as long in advance. Before a rain the current seems sluggish, and the cars don't pick up as they should. BAD REALTY MEN WARNED

Portland Association Plans to Rid City of Crooked Dealers.

Tentative plans for a general campaign by the Realty Board against unscrupulous real estate dealers who hurt the profession by dishonest practices, were laid yesterday at a meeting of the board.

The board, which is composed of representatives of the various real estate associations, was introduced by V. Vincent Jones asking that the board open fire on the unscrupulous dealers, but the resolution failed to pass on account of some objections raised.

It was argued by President Chapin, of the board, that it would not be proper for the board to go outside its membership to do investigating, and that it was not in a position to interfere with the practices of dealers not members. This led to arguments which resulted in the failure of the board to pass the resolutions of Mr. Jones.

BRISTOL RESIDENT SEES OPENING FOR MORE TRADE.
E. Mannering Lewis Asserts Panama Canal Completion Will Mean Much for Pacific Coast.

E. Mannering Lewis, of Bristol, England, freight agent for the Port of Bristol, was in Portland yesterday investigating harbor and trade conditions, as one of the heralds of the increasing commerce on the Pacific Coast that will follow the opening of the Panama Canal. Mr. Lewis visited the Chamber of Commerce and secured literature on the commercial and industrial conditions of the state, and conferred with F. W. Mulvey, chairman of the Municipal Dock Commission, and with several business men of Portland, before leaving yesterday afternoon for Seattle and Vancouver, B. C., whence he will return by way of Canada to England.

His trip on the Pacific Coast has included all of the important cities as far south as San Diego. Mr. Lewis is greatly interested in the development of the Western Coast, this being his first visit, and was earnest in his prediction of a marvelous future for the West in commercial and industrial lines when the completion of the canal shall have opened the shorter routes to the European trade centers.

The Port of Bristol, which Mr. Lewis represents, plans to establish a line of steamers between Bristol and Vancouver, B. C., and the Pacific Coast ports. Bristol has made enormous growth in harbor improvements, its commercial enterprises are backed by a population of 400,000, and a great volume of trade goes to its docks every year. Mr. Lewis says that Portland has long been an objective point of shipowners and shippers in England, and that the completion of the Panama Canal will turn their attention more direct upon this city.

"From what I have seen thus far," said Mr. Lewis, "you have a most wonderful city, admirably located."
