Seattle Quotation Is Lifted to 32 Cents-Green Fruits Scarce and in Demand.

SEATTLE. Aug. 8—(Special.)—Washington creamory butter is still held at 316 32 cents a pound. After holding the market to 80 cents to price last week, when some dealers declared that they were offered 32 cents after noon meeting, setting a precedent on the street. Heretofore one dealer has dominated the market for Washington creamery butter, and his lead in setting after week and in setting a prices was generally followed. The exchange has decided to agree on prices at the soon meeting and the evening session of a few butter-makers to set prices will probably be discontinued.


