Bears Use Government Figures in Raiding Market.

RAIL STOCKS ARE FIRM

Prices on Active List Fall Two Points-Government Movements and Poreign Politics Are Factors in Trading.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 .- The Government erop report issued yesterday was used as a weapon for another attack on stock market values today. Prices fell 2 or more points in the active list, with greater leases clea-where. The decline, while often precipitate, was not of the recent demoralized character. where. The decline, while often precipitate, was not of the recent democralized character. Prices have yielded with more or less steadiness for a fortnight, losses in some standard stocks during that period extending to 15 points. The causes probably lie deeper than crop conditions. The activities of the Federal Government, coupled with political conditions abroad, may properly be regarded as the more potent factors in the case. Aside from movements in the market, an interesting item of the day was the July report of unfilled tonnage of the limited States Steel Corporation. The figures show an increase of 125,000 tons over June, with a much larger gain over May and accounted in part for the comparative steadiness of steel during the greater part of the day, despite the enormous offerings of that stock, which amounted to 175,000 shares out of a total of 1,050,000. In the last hour the list made general recoveries from the low point on what appeared to be steady absorption, together with extensive short covering. The buying showed more deliberation than any recent similar movement with especial fromness in United States Steel, Great Northern pacific, Southern Pacific and Reading. The greater part of the gain was held at the close, which was steady.
