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PROPERTY OWNER PROTESTS.

J. Woods Smith, who was assessed \$2000 for the hard surfacing of Halcyon street, between Nineteenth and Twenty-fourth, filed a protest with City Auditor Barbur yesterday, saying that the street was not properly graded between East Twenty-second and Twenty-fourth, so that a "jump-off" of six or eight feet had been left. He complains also that the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company has not been assessed for its share of the improvement. When this street was about to be improved, the company tore up its tracks and put them on Broadway. Its franchise has been extended to 1915, and Smith insists that it be required to bear its part of the improvement.

FIVE-CENT FARE TO MILWAUKEE.

Ex-Portland-bound Milwaukee Road five-cent fare to and from Portland in a short time, said Mayor Streib yesterday. It may come as the result of the recent hearing had before the State Railroad Commission. The street railway company has offered to place a special Milwaukee car on the run, on which five-cent fares will be charged, which will be operated between the Oregon City cars. Fares on the Oregon City cars will remain as at present, 10 cents to Portland.

MRS. MORAN'S FUNERAL HELD.

Funeral services for Mrs. Catherine K. Moran, wife of Thomas Moran, were held yesterday afternoon from the Holy Rosary Church, on East Third street. Interment was in St. Mary's cemetery. Mrs. Moran was 59 years of age, and had lived in East Portland since 1871. Solemn high mass was celebrated at 2 o'clock. Besides her husband, Mrs. Moran is survived by five children.

SNIDERMAN MAY BE BROUGHT BACK.

An effort will be made by the District Attorney's office to bring Max Sniderman back to Portland from Worcester, Mass., where he is alleged to have gone to escape a debt of \$175 which he owed to Naudy Solomon, a jeweler in Portland. Request for extradition papers was sent to Governor West yesterday. Sniderman is alleged to have secured a judgment from Solomon for \$175, on which he was to pay installments.

TOWNSEND RETURNS TO TOWN.

B. D. Townsend, special assistant to the United States Attorney-General, returned yesterday from Tacoma, where he had been examining witnesses before the Federal grand jury in connection with a number of Alaska cases. While in Seattle, Mr. Townsend met Secretary of the Interior Fisher. It is possible Mr. Townsend may join Mr. Fisher in Alaska next week.

KENTON FIGHTS STREET DELAY.

Delays in the improvement of four streets at Kenton, for which Edwood Wilson received the contract, will be resisted by property owners and residents of that district. A large delegation from the Kenton Fish Club will appear before the street committee to insist that there shall be no further postponements of work on the four streets. S. L. Woodward, member of the Kenton Fish Club, and of the committee having the improvement of the streets in hand, said yesterday that the property owners interested were in question paved without further delay. They have petitioned for the improvement of 15 streets, he said, and Mr. Wilson bid in four of these, but there is a disposition to delay the proceeding.

FREIGHT DEPOT REPORT DUE TOMORROW.

A report from the committee, to which was referred the freight depot and freight facilities for the East Side, is due at this meeting. Dan Kollaher, Rev. George B. Van Waters, and George Black are members of the committee. Several months ago the subject was referred to them by General Manager O'Brien of the O-W. R. & N., who said he would build a freight depot, lay tracks and make fills if streets are vacated or if the company is given the exclusive use of the streets.

RIVER HEARING PUT OFF

PORTLAND TO FIGHT FOR OPENING OF UPPER COLUMBIA.

When United States Engineers Consider Project in December Portland Men Will Attend.

The Chamber of Commerce was notified yesterday that, through the efforts of Senator Pollock of Washington, the hearing of the proposal to open the Columbia River for navigation above the mouth of the Snake River, which was to be brought before the Board of United States Engineers on River and Harbor Improvement, August 22, has been deferred until early in December.

This arrangement will give better opportunity for the commercial organizations of the state to align their forces to back the plan. The trustees of the Chamber of Commerce are to trip over the meeting yesterday to make extra effort to send a large representation to Washington at that time.

While this hearing is on the Rivers and Harbors Congress will be in session in Washington, with many delegates from Oregon and Washington. Oregon is one of the heaviest contributors to the congress, and the activity of the delegates from here is expected to be a big factor in the decision of the question before the Government engineers. The Canadian shipping interests are also assured, the Chamber having received information from Premier Laurier that he is heartily in sympathy with the efforts to open the Columbia to shipping from Canada to its mouth.

The trustees also voted to join the Commercial Club in a forthcoming California delegates to the Astoria Centennial, who will be in Portland Saturday, and an appropriation was voted for the purpose. Plans for the entertainment include an auto trip over the city and a dinner at the Commercial Club at 6 o'clock, followed by an informal reception.

Reports were received that rates had been secured on boats and railroads for the joint excursion of the Chamber of Commerce and the Commercial Club to Astoria on Monday, August 25. Round-trip tickets by rail can be secured for \$2.50. The rates by boat have not yet been made public.
