

PRINTERS ASKED TO AMEND RULES

Publishers Want Agreement
With Union to Give Unre-
stricted Arbitration.

NO AGREEMENT REACHED

Representative Kellogg of Newspa-
per Association Holds Confer-
ence With Typographical
Men, Now in Session.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16.—A long
conference today between Harry N.
Kellogg, of Chicago, representing the
American Newspaper Publishers' Asso-
ciation, and the arbitration committee
of the International Typographical
Union, now in convention here, ended
without an agreement as to the new
arbitration contract, which will be
voted upon by the convention Friday.
In behalf of the Publishers' Asso-
ciation, Kellogg asked for unrestricted
arbitration. The proposed agreement
to replace the contract which will ex-
pire May 1, 1912, provides for arbitra-
tion of only those issues not affected
by the international law of the Union.
President Lynch, of the Union has
sanctioned the tentative agreement as
it now stands.

Piece Work May Be Permitted.

Kellogg, who is chairman of the spe-
cial standing committee of the Pub-
lishers' Association, will endeavor to
obtain a recommendation of the
referendum vote of May 17 prohibi-
ting piecework.

Some of the delegates favor such
provision recommending that all work
be done on a time basis, but removing
the mandatory clause. It is expected
that a vote on this question also will
be taken Friday.

Coast Urged for Meeting.

Several of the delegates who made
the nominating committee of the Pub-
lishers' Association, will endeavor to
obtain a recommendation of the
referendum vote of May 17 prohibi-
ting piecework.

Kellogg made a brief address to the
convention regarding the arbitration
agreement while that subject was un-
der consideration.

"I wish to ask you to give us an ar-
bitration agreement which shall be
absolutely without restriction," he said.
"You have just now a striking example
in the agreement reached by the great
nations of the world, in which the
restrictive clause is removed. We
think it is not too much to ask."

Miss Louise LaRue and Miss Maud
Younger addressed the convention in
behalf of women's suffrage.

FIGHT CAUSE OF TANGLE

Vancouver Holds Soldiers and Post
Arrests City Officers.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 16.—(Spe-
cial.)—A soldier, Harry Miles, stationed
at the Vancouver Barracks, is in the
City Jail, while Frank Gillett, special city
officer, who arrested him, has been
placed in the guardhouse at the post, as
a result of a fight at the merry-go-
round grounds on Fifth and Columbia
streets.

Gillett and Miles got into an argument
last night and came to blows. Miles
was arrested and placed under \$500
bonds.

Upon reporting to the barracks, Miles
told that he had been arrested by Gillett,
who is a soldier on furlough, a guard
of soldiers was sent down to the police
station and Officer Gillett was placed
under arrest. Miles forfeited his bail and
was again arrested for contempt of court.

ASYLUM CRUELTY ALLEGED

Illinois Attendants Accused of Blind-
ing and Choking Women.

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.—Seven attendants
charged with cruelty in the treatment
of patients in Cook County institutions
have been suspended and formal
complaint has been filed against them with
the Civil Service Commission, as a re-
sult of President Bartan's investigation,
begun yesterday.

The reports accuse Pearl Miller, an
attendant at the detention hospital, of
binding a wet towel around a woman
patient's neck and choking the victim
until she died at the mouth. This means
it is said to have been used when the
patient refused to eat.

One report says a woman patient was
bound to a bench for seven days while
the attendants read newspapers and
played cards.

Clark County Gets Tax Hearing.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 16.—(Spe-
cial.)—The State Board of Equalization
will hear any complaint in regard to
state taxes which Clark County may
have on September 6, according to a
letter received from the State Tax
Commission by A. F. Davis, Assessor
of Clark County. The board declares
that a full hearing will be accorded
every county, as the board wishes to
hear if any section thinks it has been
paying more than its just share of the
state taxes.

ATWOOD FLIES ON

Attempt to Carry Passenger
Ends in Near-Accident.

AVIATOR SAFE IN TOLEDO

Leaving Stevens Behind, Record-
Seeker Continues on Way—Trip
of 133 Miles Is Made in 2:56
Hours, Actual Flying Time.

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 16.—Five hundred
and twenty miles from his starting
point, Harry N. Atwood, the Boston
aviator, who is attempting to break
the long distance airplane record by
flying from St. Louis to New York,
alighted in Toledo tonight after com-
pleting the third day of his trip with
a spectacular flight 2000 feet above the
city.

He covered the 133 miles from Elk-
hart to Toledo with only one stop, in
actual flying time of two hours and
56 minutes. Starting from Elkhart at
8:04 this morning he was compelled to
stop at Pettisville, O., for more than
five hours because he had run out of
gasoline.

Tracks Guide Birdman.

Continuing his journey, guided by
the tracks of the Lake Shore & Michi-
gan Railway, he arrived in Toledo at
1:02 P. M.

Between some of the stations, At-
wood beat the scheduled time for or-
dinary trains. In the last lap of the
day's run he whipped up such a speed
as hardly to be visible for longer than
a minute at any one angle. The 33
miles from Pettisville into Toledo were
run in 50 minutes, including a delay
for starting and time lost in circling
around the city in search of a land-
ing place.

Acroplane Hits Tree.

While attempting to rise at Pettis-
ville with Leo Stevens, of New York, as
a passenger, the wings of Atwood's
machine brushed against tree tops and
both men were almost dashed out.
Stevens was knocked against a fence
but he escaped injury. It was neces-
sary to abandon the passenger-carry-
ing project.

Atwood is now 745 miles from New
York. With 520 miles already traveled,
he will, if he arrives in New York
today, have covered 1265 miles as
computed by railroad mileage.

Atwood asserts he will be entitled to
considerably more distance than this, as
he covered 50 or miles in circling over
en route.

POSTOFFICE TO AID FAIR

San Francisco Exposition to Be Ad-
vertised on Canceled Stamps.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-
ington, Aug. 16.—Several of the com-
mercial organizations of the state of
Washington have written to Senator
Jones in favor of having the postmas-
ters throughout the country, and par-
ticularly on the Pacific Coast, use can-
celled stamps to advertise the Pan-
ama-Pacific International Exposition to
be held at San Francisco in 1915. The
Senator therefore took up the subject
with the Postmaster-General and has
been informed that while the office at
San Francisco will have the privilege
of using one of these stamps, the per-
mission cannot be granted to the other
offices.

The Postmaster-General, in 1901, is-
sued an order authorizing the use of

postmarking dies to advertise expositions
which were held for National pur-
poses and for which Congress had made
an appropriation and since that time
this order has been invoked for use in
the several expositions held in this
country. While Congress did not make
any appropriation for the exhibition to
be held at San Francisco, it did take
action regarding the exhibition, and the
Department therefore has stretched the
point and authorized the postmas-
ter at the exposition city to use one of
these dies at his office.

One reason the Department offered
to Senator Jones as to why it was im-
possible to supply all offices with these
dies was the price, which is \$14.60
each.

MOB AIDS BEATEN WIFE

ANGRY SPRINGFIELD FOLK AT-
TACK HUSBAND.

Police Save Charles Hardt When He
Strikes Frail Wife and Waves
Meat Ax at Man.

SPRINGFIELD, Or., Aug. 16.—(Special.)
—A crowd that gathered in front of the
meat market of Charles Hardt, who
was beating his wife within, turned
into an angry mob at about 7 o'clock
tonight, and had not the police removed
the man to the City Jail promptly, he
would have been seriously handled.

Persons passing for a moment
which is on a prominent corner in Main
street, heard the cries of the wife, as
she was kicked and bruised by Hardt,
who was partly under the influence of
liquor. The man was also pounding her
with his fists, and before she was re-
cued she was badly mauled.

One of the crowd who started to in-
terfere was repulsed for a moment when
Hardt grabbed a huge meat ax and
threatened to kill any one who inter-
fered with him. He was soon over-
powered and carried into the street by
the mob. Officer Glendenning reached
him and he was locked up in the City
Jail. Then followed a hasty trial on the
charge of assault and battery, while the
crowd waited outside.

Tomorrow Hardt will be tried on the
charge of assault with intent to kill, as
it is said he also threatened to kill his
wife, who is a small woman. He has
beaten her before. Tonight she was
cared for at the home of Al Perkins.

SUICIDE IS OREGON WOMAN

Messages Are Sent to Friends Before
Snakecharmer Takes Life.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 16.—(Special.)—
Grace Moreland, a snake charmer with
a carnival company, who committed
suicide here late last night in the
Hotel Ibis, claimed that she had been
lambasted, or, where relatives are said
to reside. The coroner's jury today
found that the young woman, who was
but 29 years of age, killed herself by
taking chloroform. Her grandmother,
Mrs. Loretta Dally, is a resident of
Portland and the body is being held
pending instructions from her.

Dependancy over the recent death
of R. J. O'Donnell, a balloonist, is said
to have been the cause of Miss More-
land's suicide. It is claimed that O'Don-
nell, who was a well-known balloonist,
spoke of O'Donnell, apparently her
lover, since his untimely death. After
attending a dance at the White City
here last night, Miss Moreland went
to her room at the Ibis and took the
deadly drug. Her body was found
several hours later.

Two letters were left by the woman,
one to Professor Miller of the carnival
company, asking him to dispose of her
personal belongings so that her body
could be "laid beneath the soil," as she
was tired of "this accursed life." The
second was to George Patrick, prison
guard, Presidio, San Francisco, bid-
ding him good-bye.

CELLS AWAIT POULTRYMEN

Thirteen Gotham Merchants Sen-
tenced for Restraint of Trade.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—Thirteen mem-
bers of the New York Live Poultry
Commission Merchants' Association were
sentenced to three months' im-
prisonment and fined \$500 each today
for conspiracy in restraint of trade.
The members of the so-called poultry
trust were found guilty last night after
a trial lasting 61 days. All are resi-
dents of this city or vicinity.

Execution of the sentence was de-
ferred until Monday to permit the de-
fendants to appeal.

John W. Gates' Body Arrives.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—Bearing the
body of John W. Gates, the Kaiser
Wilhelm der Grosse today sailed from
Cherbourg for New York. Accompanying
the body are Mrs. Gates and her son,
Charles G. Gates. The funeral will be
held here next Wednesday.

SECRETARY OF WAR FAVORS NEW LOCKS

Army Engineers Reject Pro-
posal to Buy Existing
Oregon City Works.

COST DEEMED EXCESSIVE

Adoption of Major McIndoe's Plan,
Entailing Outlay of \$659,000,
Regarded as Better—River
Will Remain Open.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-
ington, Aug. 16.—The Secretary of War
will soon approve the report of the
Army engineers recommending the con-
struction of the new canal and locks
on the east side of the Willamette
River at Oregon City, at an estimated
cost of \$754,000, and immediate steps
will be taken by the Government to ac-
quire the necessary right of way. It is
estimated that four years will be re-
quired to build the canal after the
right of way is obtained.

The Army engineers have agreed
with the opinion expressed some time
ago by Major McIndoe that it is better
and cheaper to build a canal on the
east side of the river than to acquire
the existing west side canal now owned
by the Portland Railway, Light &
Power Company, and rebuild and en-
large it.

New Canal Cheaper.

Not only is it found cheaper to build
the new canal, but by the adoption of
this plan the Willamette will be kept
open to continuous navigation during
the time the canal and locks are under
construction, whereas navigation would
have to be suspended for from 18
months to three years if the west side
canal should be rebuilt.

It is estimated that engineering work
on the proposed canal and locks would
cost \$254,000, and that \$120,000 addition-
al would have to be spent on right of
way. This is very much cheaper than
the cost of purchasing and rebuilding
the old canal, for the engineers esti-
mate that a total expenditure of
\$1,142,500 would be necessary to make
this canal suitable for all commerce.

The engineers propose to construct a
canal with locks 45 feet wide and 300
feet long, with a navigable depth of six
feet. This is the same depth as the
channel below the Willamette Falls.

Free Navigation Made Possible.

While the cost of the proposed new
canal and locks is \$154,000 greater than
the amount originally estimated, the
Army engineers are of the opinion
that work should be undertaken in the
interest of free navigation. Oregon has
appropriated \$300,000, and Congress has
appropriated a like amount, of which
\$5000 has been expended in surveys and
estimates. Therefore it will require an
additional appropriation by Congress
of \$159,000 before the canal can be com-
pleted, but with \$600,000 immediately
available, no further appropriation by
Congress will be necessary before 1915,
in the view of the engineers, who are
of the opinion that Oregon, having ap-
propriated \$300,000, has borne its fair
share of the cost, and they recommend
that the proper time be appointed, and
appropriate the necessary remainder.

In the opinion of the engineers, the
price asked by the Portland Railway,
Light & Power Company for its canal is
excessive and if the Secretary of War
approves the new canal project, they
recommend that the offer of this old
canal be formally rejected. This will be
done. It is estimated that it will cost
\$10,900 a year to maintain the canal
and locks after completion.

THIRD MATE IS DEFIANT

Santa Rosa Officer Would Go to Jail
to Test Inquiry's Authority.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16.—E. J.
Thomas, third mate of the steamer
Santa Rosa, who was in charge of the
vessel at the time of the wreck off
Point Arguello, through his attorney,
served notice on Inspector Bulger today
that he would go to jail for contempt
if necessary to test the power of the
steamboat inspection department to
compel him to testify.

Thomas, with Captain J. O. Farla, is
charged with unskillfulness and negli-
gence. Farla is under trial separately
and Thomas has been subpoenaed to
testify.

For the reason that Inspector Bolles
was ill and unable to attend, the case
was postponed until Monday.

DROPPED REVOLVER KILLS

Texas, Searching Pockets for Penny,
Accidentally Slays Newswoman.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—While search-
ing his pockets for a cent with which
to purchase a newspaper from Mrs.
Rose Malchiorre, a Park Row news-
woman, James C. Henderson, aged 76,
of San Antonio, Tex., accidentally drew
forth a revolver, which fell to the side-
walk and was discharged, killing the
woman instantly. It is claimed that
he was carrying only with carry-
ing a concealed weapon.

Although he declared it was an ac-
cident, and witnesses agreed with him,
Henderson was technically charged
with homicide. He was held to await
the coroner's inquest.

OCEAN RECORD IS BROKEN

Olympic Crosses Atlantic Westward
in 5 Days 12 Hours, 20 Minutes.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—The White
Star steamer, Olympic, which docked
this morning, brought a new record
to port, having clipped off 46 minutes
from her previous best time from
Queensstown.

She sailed at 1:50 P. M. on August
10 and her running time was five days
12 hours and 20 minutes. Her time on
her last westward trip in July was
five days, 13 hours and six minutes.

Australian Cardinal Dies Suddenly.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Aug. 16.—Cardi-
nal Moran died suddenly today. He
was found on the floor of his bedroom
in Manly Place in a state of collapse.
Death followed an attack of syncope.

Mercantile Men Choose Spokane.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 16.—The Na-
tional Association of Mercantile Agen-
cies, in sixth annual convention here
today, named Spokane, Wash., as the
next convention city. The old officers
were re-elected.

EVELYN THAW PLEADS

LUNACY COMMISSION FOR HUS-
BAND SOUGHT.

Court Admits Wife's Petition for Re-
lease of Mate and Hearing
Will Follow Soon.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 16.—Asking for a
lunacy commission for Harry K. Thaw,
now confined in the Matteawan Hos-
pital, New York, a petition was filed
in Common Pleas Court here today
in behalf of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, his
wife. Judge Davis admitted the peti-
tion after some discussion as to
whether a Pennsylvania court had
jurisdiction.

Attorney Francis Rawle, of Phila-
delphia, who filed the petition, asked
for a rule to show cause why the Com-
mission should not be appointed, but
this was refused as the attorney could
not tell the court the names of the
persons who have charge of Thaw's
case in this country. A hearing will
take place after the interested parties
have been notified.

PORTUGAL QUAKE-SHAKEN

Damage Great, Some Injured—Tidal
Wave Causes Panic.

LISBON, Aug. 16.—A series of earth-
quake shocks, gradually increasing in
violence, were felt in Southern Portu-
gal last night.

At Mortela, Albufeira and other
points near the coast, considerable
damage was done and some persons
were injured. At Lagos the distur-
bances were accompanied by a tidal
wave which caused a panic.
