MONEY SOUGHT FOR SCHOOL.

Withers, pastor of the Zion Baptist
 Church (colored) of Minneapolis, sub-
 mitted his credentials to the Chamber

 National Training School for Women,
 in Washington, D. C. This school is
 similar to the Hampton Institute, and
 was founded by Booker T. Washington, and
 gives courses in domestic science,
 manual training and preparatory col-
 lege work for colored women. Mr.
 Withers is one of a large committee
 of solicitors who are traveling in the
 United States endeavoring to raise
 funds for the institution. He will re-
 main in this city until next Sunday.

EXAMINATION DATE SET.

An examination for Chief Inspector of Elec-
 tricity will be held at 2 A. M. September
 14. The dates of the September 14
 Service examinations were posted yes-
 terday by Secretary Tupper at the City
 Hall. To take the examination for this
 position five years' experience is re-
 quired. The relative weight which the
 various subjects will have in de-
 termining the result of the examina-
 tion is as follows: 30 per cent for
 the use of electricity in buildings for
 lighting and power, 40 per cent for
 electrical wiring and apparatus, 30 per
 cent for practical questions. The exam-
 ination for Chief Inspector will be held at 9
 A. M. September 26. The examination for
 chief of the Fire Department will be
 held at 9 A. M. September 27. The
 weight of examination subjects for this
 place will be as follows: Arithmetic, 5;
 penmanship, 5; general knowledge of
 duties, 20; experience, 70.

BELMONT IMPROVEMENT PROCEEDS.

The improvement of Belmont street,
 between East Sixty-second and East
 Sixty-third streets, at Mount Tabor,
 by the Pacific Bridge Company, is pro-
 gressing. The deep cut on the south
 side of the street, averaging from
 five to 25 feet for nearly the entire
 distance of the improvement, has been
 completed, and the Portland Railway,
 Light & Power Company is relaying
 its tracks with steel rails. Cement
 sidewalks are also being laid. The
 street bank on the north side of the
 street caused by the deep cut leaves the
 houses on an embankment. It is expected
 that the improvement will be com-
 pleted in September. The connecting
 streets at the end of the improvement
 at East Sixty-third and East Sixty-
 fourth streets are to be paved also.
 East Yamhill street is under process
 of improvement as far as Montavilla.

SALOON BRINGS PROTEST

Property Owners Near Kikikiat and
 Eliza Streets Object.

A vigorous protest to Mayor Rush-
 light against the establishment of a
 saloon at 700 Union avenue, North,
 between Kikikiat and Eliza streets, was
 made yesterday by a large number of
 property-owners living in that section
 of the city. A petition that the license
 be revoked is signed by 28 citizens.
 In this petition the statement is made
 that the liquor license committee of the
 Council, composed of Councilmen Wat-
 kins, Wallace, Daly, Joy, Menefee, Mon-
 tagne and Clyde, surreptitiously granted
 to Cunningham & McNally a transfer of
 license from their location at 11 Union
 avenue to the new location. The first
 they knew of the change was when
 they saw the saloon fixtures going in,
 they say. It is asserted that these men
 were given a transfer on August 9 from
 East Sixth and Morrison streets to 11
 Union avenue, but that the saloon was
 maintained there only a short time,
 when the other change was made.
 The new location for the saloon is
 said to be near the edge of the Tenth
 ward, nearly all of which is dry. The
 property-owners say that they protest
 against having a saloon put near
 where the saloon is to be, because it is
 in a residence section, and that the
 stable was not put in. They will wait
 upon the Council at its next meeting.

 are to be run from various points, such
 as Seattle, Tacoma and Portland, and
 it is planned to make Scandinavian day

TUBER WAR TWO-SIDED

Plaintiff and Defendant Seek Dam-
 ages Over Potato Shipment.

A consignment of potatoes sent by
 the McKinley Mitchell Company to the
 Frank Woolley Company has been the
 bone of contention for a three-day
 trial before Judge Henry McGinn in the
 Circuit Court. The case was con-
 cluded yesterday afternoon.
 Both the plaintiff and the defendant
 are seeking damages. The Woolley com-
 pany as plaintiff contending that the
 McKinley company contracted to send
 first-class potatoes and instead sent in-
 ferior tubers which had to be rejected.
 The McKinley company responds that
 because the potatoes were rejected a
 loss of \$15,000 was sustained by it. The
 Woolley company wants \$15,000 dam-
 ages alleging that potatoes were inferior
 and not suitable for the potatoes were

Heavy Autos Must Have Tires of
 Specified Width—Traction En-
 gines Barred From Streets.

The auto truck and its ability to
 tear up hard-surfaced streets is caus-
 ing the City Council worry. An ordi-
 nance recently was passed providing
 that no auto truck having iron or
 steel tires be run over the city streets,
 and that none be loaded heavier than
 a specified weight.

Councilman Burgard will introduce
 at the next meeting of the Council an
 amendment to that ordinance, provid-
 ing that steel tires may be used on
 automobiles up to five tons capacity,
 but that for auto trucks of from two
 and one-half to five tons capacity the
 rear tires must not be less than seven
 and one-half inches in width and the
 front tires not less than five and one-
 half inches in width.

For auto trucks of two and one-half
 tons capacity the proposed ordinance
 provides that the rear tires must be
 not less than five inches wide and
 the front tires not less than three and
 one-half inches in width.

The ordinance also will prohibit auto
