TABOR HEIGHTS AFTER LARGER MAINS

It was the sense of the Tabor Heights Push Club at the meeting Wednesday night that larger water mains should be laid at Mount Tabor. The plan proposed by Mayor Ruzhlicht to have a complete new distribution system for the East Side was endorsed. The water question was discussed and it was argued that, even with the increased supply of the second Bull Run pipe, water cannot be delivered without larger distribution mains.

PACIFIC IMPROVEMENT COMPLETED

The Pacific street district improvement has been completed and the assessment is \$22,389. The streets improved are Pacific from Union avenue to East East Seventh; East Sixth from Holladay avenue to Oregon; East Seventh from Holladay avenue to Pacific; and East Ninth from Holladay avenue to Pacific street. These streets are east of Union avenue and the territory is immediately tributary to the new steel bridge. The next district to be paved lies between Union avenue and the river, covering the territory to the railroad bridge approach and Holladay avenue. The cost of improving this district will be \$100,000.

MILWAUKIE - STREET CONTRACT COMPLETED

W. H. Counsel, contractor for the improvement of Main street in Milwaukie, has completed the work except the crosswalks and a little surfacing. Assessment for the work is \$12,700. Main street is 60 feet wide and has been improved with crushed rock. Instead of wooden crosswalks concrete is used. Mr. Counsel is rushing the work on the improvement of Harrison street, which runs from Main street to Sandy street, near Ex-Mayor Shindler's home. Oak and Fourth streets are under contract. The crosswalks have been started to improve Sandy street as far as East Milwaukie or Minthorn district. Mayor Streib and the Council are working out system of street improvements which includes the principal streets of Milwaukie, the total cost of which will estimate \$100,000. It will require two years to complete the improvements planned.

CEGAR CRIBB STOCKED WITH TROUT

Edward Renfer, who recently stocked Cedar Creek near Sandy with Dolly Varden trout, finds that the trout are growing rapidly. Mr. Renfer put 4000 trout about two inches long in a stream in a place prepared for them a few weeks ago. They have grown on an average of half an inch. 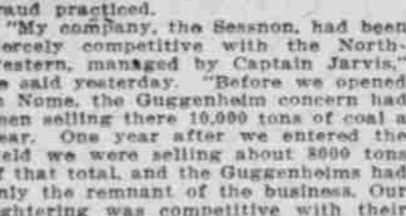
