CARS ARE DERAILED

O. W. R. & N. Freight Leaves Tracks Near Blalocks.

TRAFFIC HALTED LONG

Early Morning Accident Delays Mail and Passengers—Damage \$2000 When 25-Mile Train Heavily-Laden Is Wrecked.

While traveling at the rate of 25 miles an hour, 13 cars of a westbound O. W. R. & N. freight train were derailed one mile east of Blalocks at 6 o'clock yesterday morning. The accident was caused by a broken flange. Other freight and passenger traffic was delayed for several hours and the damage to the freight train equipment approximated \$2000.

Fast mail train No. 3, which was running four hours late, was east of the scene of the accident and did not reach Portland until late last night. The Chicago-Portland Express, due in this city at 12:45 o'clock P. M. yesterday, and the Spokane-Portland train No. 11, due here at 11:30 A. M. yesterday, were also east of the trouble. Passengers on these trains were transferred and reached Portland early last night. The Chicago-Portland special No. 17, delayed by the trouble, did not arrive in Portland until about midnight. Eastbound trains were also delayed by the accident.

Two cars of bridge steel and one car of heavy machinery were included in the wreckage, which made the task of clearing the track exceedingly difficult and slow.

Portland had no mail from points east of Chicago yesterday owing to the wreck. The fast mail train which should have reached Portland at 7 o'clock yesterday morning did not get into the Union Depot until nearly midnight. The foreman of the mail-train at the Postoffice said last night that if the mail had been segregated on the train as it should have been there would be little or no difficulty in getting it delivered. It depended, he said, entirely on the condition it was in when received.

Wife of Portland Attorney Passes Away at Vancouver.

Mrs. Marcella Bull Wintler, wife of Carl D. Wintler, an attorney of this city, and daughter of the late M. P. Bull, died yesterday in Vancouver, Wash., after five months' illness.

Mrs. Wintler was born in Pendleton, Ore., in 1878. She was married to Mr. Wintler in August, 1906. She is survived by her husband, a sister, Mrs. L. M. Stearns, of Oakland, Cal., and three brothers, M. A. Bull, of Moro, Or.; C. E. Bull, of Douglas, Ariz., and Munson Bull, of Oakland, Cal. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Building Tiff Ends

Inspector, Architect and Owners Settle Differences.

STRUCTURE TO GO AHEAD

Mayor Attends Conference That Brings Fight Over Belmont and Grand Avenue Hotel to Close—Permit Given.

All differences between Building Inspector Plummer and Architect D. L. Williams over the construction of the building at Belmont and Grand avenues were adjusted yesterday at a conference attended by Mayor Rushlight, the owners of the property, the architect and the Building Inspector. A permit for the constructing of the building was issued and the contractors are free to go ahead with the work.

Architect Williams said yesterday that the main difference between the Inspector and him was over the installation of a brick masonry wall on the first floor, where it was intended to rent the space without cutting it in size.

"We didn't want to put in that brick masonry wall," he said, as we wanted the space in one room to be 100 by 100 feet. The building code provides a different rule for tenement houses than for hotels. We are erecting a hotel building. The code provides that the brick wall may be omitted on the first floor. It was Mr. Plummer's contention that he had the right to require us to put it in. In his judgment it was best.

"As to the case against Contractor John S. Seed, when permits for the

retaining wall and the concrete basement work were applied for, Building Inspector Plummer intended to give only one permit, that for the retaining wall under the sidewalk. But one of his clerks made a mistake, and issued both permits, so that Contractor Seed went ahead with the entire foundation work.

"He was arrested and charged with putting in his footings on August 8, when, as a matter of fact, he had completed them July 11, almost a month before. We were not erecting a building illegally. All the work that has been done is in accordance with the city ordinance.
