

ATWOOD, N. Y. SK, NEARING ALBANY

Aviator Braves High Winds to Gain Goal in Final Sprint to Gotham.

WORLD RECORD IN SIGHT

Birdman to Equip Aero With Pontoon for Safety From Water in Last Dash Down Canyon of Hudson Today.

FORT PLAIN, N. Y., Aug. 22.—With 14 miles yet to go before he reaches Albany, his goal for the night on the sixth day of his flight from St. Louis to New York City, Henry N. Atwood, the aviator, arose in the air from this city shortly after 7 o'clock tonight after a short stop for gasoline. Though part of the flight will have to be made in the darkness, the daring birdman was confident that he would reach Albany and make a landing successfully.

When he alighted here Atwood had already covered 162 miles of the 158-mile leg from Belle Isle, near Syracuse, to Albany. He was not able to depart from Belle Isle until after 1 o'clock this afternoon, because of a high wind that made flying dangerous.

Wind Brings to Earth. After he got started Atwood flew steadily. The wind brought him to earth at Albany, but after waiting until 4:55 P. M. he again went into the air. At this time he was going to make a landing, but at the outskirts of the town he rose higher and was next reported at Herkimer, over which he passed at 6:24 P. M. He alighted at Fort Plain at 7 o'clock.

When Atwood reaches Albany he will have flown 112 miles from St. Louis. This not only will break all cross-country records in America, but will approach closely the world's record of 114 miles now held in Europe.

Atwood plans to leave Albany early tomorrow for the last leg of 142 miles to New York City. When the aviator, flying over the Hudson River, passes Rhinecliff, he will have 117 miles to his credit, which will break all records.

Aircraft to Have Pontoon. At Albany Atwood will provide his biplane with pontoon for use in case he has to land in the Hudson River or in the ocean after passing over New York.

The exact time of the aviator's appearance over New York will depend on his progress today. From Albany he believes he will make the 142 miles down the Hudson in 1 day, with one intermediate stop. He hopes to sail over New York in mid-afternoon, so that he may be plainly visible.

ARMY AERO TOWED BY AUTO. Air Car Comes to Grief When Birdman Try to Sail in Dark.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—The United States Army aeroplane in which Captain Chandler and Lieutenant Armstrong yesterday made the 40-mile dash to Frederick, Md., in 47 minutes, is today ignominiously dumped along on a truck behind an Army automobile on its way back to College Park.

An attempt was made by the two Army aviators late today to return to the starting point, but darkness overtook them and they were compelled to land on unfamiliar ground, and the machine was disabled.

GATES MOURNED IN TEXAS. City Administration of Fort Arthur to Hold Memorial.

PORT ARTHUR, Tex., Aug. 22.—While the funeral of John W. Gates is taking place in New York tomorrow, memorial services will be held in Port Arthur, participated in by the Elks Lodge, the city administration, Catholic and Protestant churches, more than 1000 employees of the Texas Company, 500 to 600 citizens of Port Arthur and several thousand others from Beaumont, Houston, Orange, Galveston and other Texas cities.

All places of business in Port Arthur will close for half a day and all flags in the city will fly at half mast.

Body Arrives in New York. NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—The body of the late John W. Gates, who died in Paris recently, arrived today on the steamship Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse. Mrs. Gates and her son, Charles G. Gates, accompanied the body.

The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at the Hotel Plaza. Many friends from Chicago and the West will attend the services, which will be conducted by Rev. Wallace Macmillan.

PROWLER STOPS BULLET. Paymaster of Construction Crew Fires Shot at Intruder.

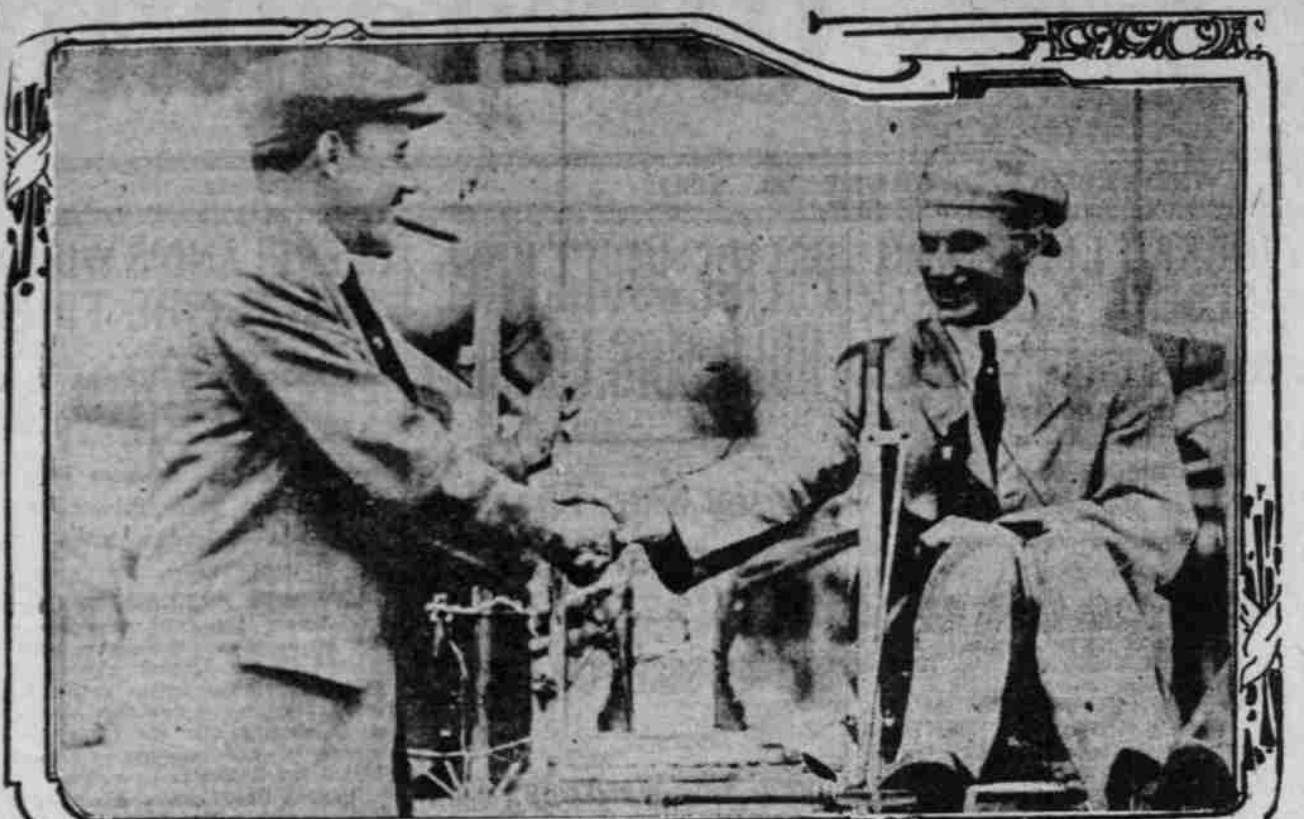
CENTRALIA, Wash., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—Only the quick work of Minor McQuig, paymaster of a construction gang at Ethel, saved him from being robbed of several thousand dollars in currency by a midnight prowler. McQuig was preparing to retire when he saw a man's face peering at him through a window. He jumped to the window and struck the man in the face, then, taking his revolver, he ran into the yard in his night clothes, emptying his weapon at the fleeing man.

McQuig is confident that one of his shots took effect. A trail of blood was found on the ground yesterday morning. Sheriff Urquhart is investigating the case.

Crawford Leaves \$48,000 Here. NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—The estate of F. Marion Crawford, the novelist, who died at Sorrento, Italy, April 9, 1909, is appraised in a report filed here today at \$48,000, and is divided among the author's widow and his four children. Crawford owned little property in this country outside the copyrights on his numerous books.

Lady Decies Orders Royal Pattern Duplicated.

SUCCESS YET TO BE SEEN

Society Frowns on Custom Through Which Ethel Roosevelt Tried in Vain to Break When Alexandra Held Power.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—(Special.)—Not to be behind Queen Mary in the artistic furnishing of her bedchamber, Lady Decies (formerly Vivian Gould) has given instructions to the nuns in charge of the technical schools at Westport, County Mayo, to produce for her a coverlet or "bedspread" pattern identical with that recently supplied to the Queen.

This community, which is distinguished for the artistic excellence of its needlework, enjoyed the patronage of Queen Victoria and Queen Alexandra, both of whom always insisted on having their patterns and designs exclusive, so that even their closest friends could not secure them. Miss Ethel Roosevelt, before her marriage, offered a big price for some lace border designs which had been made for Queen Alexandra, but failed to secure them. Whether Queen Mary is less exclusive in her views is not yet known, but in any case it is not looked upon as "just the thing" in society to follow so closely the royal fashions either in pattern or design.

Apparently Lady Decies desires to break through such conservative notions. But she is in a set to whom the worst that can be said of any action is that it is "bad form."

DEATH COMES IN SLEEP. Miss Alice Charles, 24, of Portland. Dies in Vancouver, B. C.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 22.—Miss Alice Charles, of Portland, Or., was found dead in bed in a Vancouver rooming-house today. Heart failure was given as the cause of death.

Miss Charles resided with her parents at 1164 Patton avenue. She was 24 years of age and was a student at the University of Oregon. She was employed by her father here in the city.

Three weeks ago Mr. Charles went to Vancouver on a business trip and his wife and daughter accompanied him to take a vacation. Her parents were in Vancouver when she died and will return with the body tomorrow, when arrangements will be made for the funeral.

OREGON VISIT PROMISED. Taft Tells Hawley He Will Stop at Salem and Eugene.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—(Special.)—President Taft promised Representative Hawley today that he would make a brief stop at Salem on his coast trip, and also asked Eugene, if possible, to arrange it.

Mr. Hawley called on the President while he was at the Senate just before his closing hours of Congress. "I like those Oregon folks," President Taft said to Mr. Hawley, "and want to see more of them."

Mr. and Mrs. Hawley will leave tomorrow night, going over the Great Northern and through Portland to Salem.

CAMORRISTS DON'T JIBE

MANY SUSPECTED OF PERJURY TO BE PROSECUTED.

Verbal Testimony of One Differs From Affidavit and Jurors Believe Him Insincere.

VITERBO, Italy, Aug. 22.—After much contradictory testimony had been given at the Camorra trial today, Judge Tullio, the King's procurator, announced that all witnesses suspected of perjury and of bearing false witness would be prosecuted when the Cuocollo trial was concluded.

Particular attention had been given to the testimony of Barbella, who swore that he had seen Giuseppe Salvi, a defendant, leave the Cuocollo home, after the assassination of Maria Cuocollo Cuocollo, whose murder followed that of her husband. The jury cross-examined the witness closely and he became confused. His written deposition was carefully examined and when the jurors noted many discrepancies between that and his verbal testimony, they decided that he was not sincere.

Judge Faraone testified that he was satisfied from private information that Lucia Anastasi, one of the state's witnesses, was a confidant of the Camorristi. Captain Fabroni denied that this was true.

LYNCHING ABETTOR HELD. Pennsylvania Judge Frowns on Mob Law for Negroes.

WESTCHESTER, Pa., Aug. 22.—Judge Butler, of the Chester County Court, refused to grant a writ of habeas corpus today in the case of George Stahl, 16 years old, who was arrested on the charge of murder in connection with the burning of Zack Walker, the negro, at Coatesville 10 days ago. In refusing to release the boy, Judge Butler denounced the lynching and declared that the mob had done a brutal deed and that its leaders should be severely punished.

Stahl's parents, who live in Marietta, Pa., instituted the habeas corpus proceedings.

FOOD MEN RAP COCAINE. National Convention at Duluth Seeks Way to Fight Evil.

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 22.—A tirade against the sale of drugstore drinks was the feature of the early part of today's session of the National Association of Pure Food Commissioners.

Dr. E. J. Crumline, of Kansas, admitted that the Kansas department had been unable to find cocaine in a certain suspected product which has a habit-forming tendency.

Commissioner Bailey, of Oregon, also reported a similar failure on the part of his department.

The Commissioner of Oklahoma, D. E. Barr, then threw some light on the subject. He said there were 25 substituted drinks sold by druggists in his state as the real article, all of which did contain cocaine with the exception of three.

BULLETS TRACED TO BOYS

Youngsters Shoot at Pigeons and Nearly Hit Medford Woman.

MEDFORD, Or., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—Investigation of the cause of a shower of bullets that struck the home of Mrs. L. M. Peterson the other day, several narrowly missing her, has brought out the fact that small boys with repeating rifles, shooting at pigeons on vacant lots, were responsible.

No arrests were made, but a warning has been issued and any juvenile caught carrying a rifle without a license will be promptly arrested.

Mrs. Peterson was sitting on her front porch when bullets began to whistle past her. One struck within a few feet of her and frightened her so much that she telephoned the police.

BRITISH STRIKE ARBITERS NAMED

Labor Leader Blames Home Secretary for Fomenting Bitter Feeling.

TROOPS NEEDED, IS REPLY

Churchill Declares Rioters at Llanelli Would Have Caused More Misery Than All of 50,000 Soldiers Employed.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—After receiving notice today of the appointment of the commission to inquire into the troubles between the British railways and their employees, Parliament adjourned until October 24. The discussion called forth a statement by James Ramsay MacDonald, chairman of the Labor party and a member of the House of Commons, that if the spirit shown on both sides during the course of the negotiations prevailed in future relations, the country had heard the last of railway strikes in this day and generation.

However, he was unable to resist making a heated denunciation of Home Secretary Churchill and the employment of soldiers during the strike. He declared that the department which had played the most diabolical part during the whole unrest was the Home Office.

Fighting Spirit Stirred. "Mr. Churchill's bulletins on the situation," he said, "were mischievous and inaccurate and the expressions of opinion therein were not sensible and the effect was to make the men more desirous of continuing the fighting than coming to a settlement. I hope we have heard the last of these fussy interferences by persons who do not understand the nature of the circumstances with which they are dealing, but who desire to find themselves in the newspapers day by day."

Mr. Churchill retorted that if the Llanelli rioters had been left to themselves they would have wrought more damage and misery in two or three hours than the whole 50,000 troops employed in strike duty. The Home Secretary maintained that the wholesale employment of soldiers was necessary.

Commission Is Satisfactory. The strike commission, as announced by the Government, is regarded as satisfactory to all concerned. The chairman is Sir David Harrel, who was Under Secretary for Ireland in 1893-1899. The members are represented by Sir Thomas R. Ellis, secretary of the Mine Owners' Association, and Sir Charles G. Beale, vice-chancellor of the University of Birmingham. The representatives of the men are Arthur Henderson, Labor member of Parliament for the Barnard Castle division of Durham, and John Burnett, chief labor correspondent of the Board of Trade.

In naming the commissioners Premier Asquith briefly congratulated the country that the clouds had lifted, adding amid cheers that the few words said in regard to the past at the present moment the better.
