

CONGRESS LEAVES CAPITAL DESERTED

Democrats and Insurgents Exchange Felicitations in Closing Hours.

TAFT HAS HALF HOLIDAY

Bill for Memorial to North American Indians Reaches Vice-President's Desk Too Late, Just as His Gavel Falls.

WHAT LEADERS SAY OF SPECIAL CONGRESS SESSION.

Representative Mann, Republican leader in House—They (the Democrats) set out to show how they could handle legislation. They brought in tariff bills in grotesque form, with a plain avowal that they neither knew nor cared what the effect might be on the industries of the country. The special session has developed the broadness of President Taft's statesmanship.

Speaker Clark—We have set a good example for Democrats everywhere. We honestly and persistently endeavored to relieve the people of some of the burden of taxation, but the President would not have it. To use a sporting phrase, he "blocked the game."

Chairman Fitzgerald, of House Appropriations Committee—The appropriations committee—the appropriations of Congress during the extra session aggregated \$301,002. No session of Congress has ever run for so long a period and appropriated so little.

Vice-President Sherman—I am happy in the belief that a protracted and, at times, strenuous session, rather than generating ill-will or discord, has brought us all into closer touch with each other.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—The first session of the Sixty-second Congress ended today and immediately the departure of members began. President Taft left with the several hundred tired legislators and tonight official Washington was almost deserted.

Every outgoing train bore Senators and Representatives homeward after an extraordinary session that had stretched over 121 days and set the liveliest pace of any legislative session in recent years.

The adjournment was featureless, despite the strenuous activity that had gone before. The President vetoed the cotton tariff revision bill, just as he had vetoed its predecessors, the wool and the free list bills. The veto went only to the House, in accordance with custom, and there its reception was marked by Democratic laughter and Republican applause.

Democrats Hall Insurgents. Democratic Leader Underwood, amid a demonstration, formally thanked the few Republican members who voted with the Democrats to pass the tariff revision bills. Democrats ran across the aisles to shake hands with Republican insurgents. The cheering and shouting of desks on the Democratic side was protracted.

As soon as he could be heard, Mr. Underwood announced that as the Democrats did not have the two-thirds majority necessary to pass the bill over the veto, he would merely move the printing of the veto and accompanying papers and their reference to the ways and means committee, of which he is chairman. The House agreed to this fixed course.

With the committee the matter will rest until the whole subject of tariff revision is renewed at the regular session of Congress in December.

Usual Merry-making Missing. Everybody was in a happy mood in both houses, but the usual vaudeville proceedings that feature the few minutes following an adjournment of the House were missing. The nearest approach was the singing of "Auld Lang Syne" by a group of younger members, but their chords did not inspire a common chorus. The galleries in both the House and the Senate were crowded.

President Taft spent a half holiday at the Capitol, making it a social as well as a business affair. Occupying the President's room in the rear of the Senate chamber, he was greeted and cheered by Senators of all shades of political complexion, as well as by Representatives, who drifted over from the House to meet him.

The President busied himself later with the task of signing eleven-hour measures.

Bill Misses by Scratch. Senator Wood, of Oklahoma, precipitated the fastest legislative work of the closing hours. He asked for the passage of a bill authorizing Rodman Wamaker and others to construct in the entrance to New York harbor a permanent memorial to the North American Indians. The bill had passed the House, but the Senate took no action on it, but carried it away to the vaults. With fewer than 12 minutes remaining, a hurried search was made. The bill was found and sent back to the House by a messenger, who lost no time on the journey.

At 3 o'clock officially, or 3:02 by the correct time, while the Vice-President was in the midst of his farewell remarks to the Senate, the clerk of the House appeared in the door of the Senate with the bill, signed by Speaker Clark. The signal of the clerk and the fluttering of the completed bill at the head of the aisle did not stop the fall of the gavel, however, and the bill will rest unsigned by the Vice-President and the President until next December.

Free Philippines Advocated. In the closing hours of the session of the House, Representative Kinkead, of New Jersey, amid Democratic applause, made a speech, advocating Philippine independence, and said a Democratic Congress soon would carry out the promises of the United States to the islands.

Both Vice-President Sherman and Speaker Clark delivered valedictories, expressing appreciation, extending congratulations on the good work shown in a strenuous session and bespeaking health and happiness during the recess. The session record of measures introduced is 14,038 bills and 485 resolutions in the House and 2294 bills and

88 resolutions in the Senate. Only a few of these were passed.

"GROTESQUE," DECLARES MANN

Republican Leader Says Democrats Showed How They Can Bungle.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Republican Leader Mann, in a statement made today giving the minority view of the work of the extra session of the Democratic House, declared the net result was to strengthen the President and weaken the Democracy, and that the Democrats, "trying to put the President in a hole" in tariff revision legislation, had been "hoist with their own petard."

He added that in the House would have been wise if they had confined the special session to the consideration of the reciprocity bill. Instead of that they set out to show how they could bungle legislation. They prevented the passage of the constitutional amendment for direct election of Senators by insisting on coupling with it another amendment to the Constitution to deprive the General Government of one of its necessary powers.

"They fought against publicity of primary election expenditures until we strangled them into yielding. They nearly defeated statehood for Arizona by insisting Congress give practical approval to the recall of judges. They prepared tariff bills without knowledge either of form or of substance. They brought in tariff bills in grotesque form, with a plain avowal that they neither knew nor cared what the effect might be on the industries of the country, and planted themselves squarely on a platform against protection and in favor of a tariff for revenue only, without knowing what the effect of the revenue would be. They have declared in favor of large importations from abroad, regardless of whether we have idle factories and idle men who might produce similar goods."

"While entering on the domain of tariff legislation they have refused to consider other needed legislation. They declined to consider a bill fixing tolls on the Panama Canal, a matter of urgent importance. We were unable to force them to take up conservation legislation, especially bills to protect and utilize the resources of Alaska."

"The principal legislation which this session has enacted is the provision in the Canadian reciprocity bill admitting wood pulp and paper free from Canada. That provision in the law was drafted by me, and enacted exactly as I had drafted it. Their acceptance of that provision was the wisest thing the Democrats have done."

"GOOD EXAMPLE SET"—CLARK

Speaker Well Satisfied With Results Accruing to Democracy.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Speaker Clark today declared himself well pleased with the record of the Democratic House in the special Congress session. He added:

"We have set a good example to Democrats everywhere. Sneered at for years as a party of mere negation and as being utterly lacking in ability for constructive statesmanship, we passed through the House more constructive legislation, and better, than has passed through any House in the same length of time in 20 years. We have set the pace in that regard for future Houses."

"We redeemed every promise made in order to carry the elections in 1910. We have economized; we passed the reciprocity bill, the wool tariff bill, the free list bill, the cotton bill with the Senate's amendments, which included the iron and steel schedule and the chemical schedule; we submitted for ratification the constitutional amendment providing for popular election of Senators of the United States; we passed a bill for the publication of campaign expenses before the election; we liberalized the rules, making the committee elective by the House; we adopted a resolution to admit New Mexico and Arizona; and we passed a large number of other bills of more or less importance. It is a record of which we may well be proud, and on which we will equate the country in 1912."

"Notwithstanding the fact that our Cabinet Ministers were on the floor of the House lobbying in favor of the veto with the publication of the arguments and patronage of the Administration to help them influence votes, 22 insurgent Republicans had the courage and manhood to override the President's veto."

"We honestly and persistently endeavored to relieve the people of some of their burden of taxation, but the President would not have it. To use a sporting phrase, he blocked the game. On these issues we appeal to the country, feeling absolutely certain that as we have stood manfully for the best interests of the people, the people will stand by us."

'NAGGING' LAWS DEcriED

R. E. STRAHORN, OF O.-W. R. & N. LEADS FOR RAILROADS.

Spokane Man Says Agitation Will Frighten Capital and Industry. Harriman Outlook Deemed Bad.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—Introduced as "the sphinx of the railroad world," R. E. Strahorn, vice-president of the O.-W. R. & N., today, speaking before the Chamber of Commerce, bitterly assailed the political movement for railroad regulation, which, he said, would frighten away capital and stop industry. One per cent of the population was responsible for the agitation, Mr. Strahorn declared, and these he classed as "fanatics and cheap politicians."

The railroad builder urged the Spokane Chamber of Commerce and every other commercial organization to adopt, before the next session of Congress and of the State Legislature, resolutions decrying the growing spirit of railroad regulation and "nagging" bills, his own characterization.

"With a shrinkage of \$1,000,000 a month in gross receipts through the freight rate decision and facing an insistent demand for an annual increase of \$10,000,000 a year in wages, the outlook is not bright for the Harriman road," he said.

"We are trying to make the most of it, but are pleading for some sympathy. No railroad is making more than 3 1/2 per cent on its dividends. But their stock is watered, the people say. Well, whose business is not watered? Is there any harm in that? Anyone should be allowed to count the equity they have built up by their own efforts, aside from their tangible assets."

"I have helped to bring more millions into this country than any man here had any idea of. All I want is to be able to bring more money into this country and develop it further. All I ask you to do is to help in creating a healthy public sympathy for any institution, not omitting railways."

EVIL IS ATTACKED

Insurance Commissioners to Make War on Deceit.

POORER PEOPLE LOSERS

Class of Health and Accident Companies That Avoids Equitable Adjustments Grilled in Milwaukee Convention.

MILWAUKEE, Aug. 22.—Several industrial, health and accident insurance companies were severely criticized by President Burton, of Virginia, in his annual address today before the 42d National convention of State Insurance Commissioners.

President Burton said that an investigation by a committee of 14 of the companies doing a health and accident business resulted in disclosures that were shocking in the extreme.

"Instead of basing the adjustment of claims on equitable principles," said Mr. Burton, "some of the companies examined resorted to every form of trickery and deceit and even forgery and left in order to escape their honest obligations. This was all the more outrageous in view of the fact that these frauds were perpetrated on the poorer classes, who, in the very nature of things, should have every possible protection."

"As the committee which made the investigation had no report nearly ready, I shall not anticipate the remedies it will suggest for the conditions there disclosed, except to say that it is incumbent on us to root out this evil without mercy."

President Burton pointed to the success of the uniform bill for the regulation of fraternal companies, commonly known as the "Mile bill," which he said had been adopted by 13 states.

He also spoke in advocacy of civil service in connection with insurance bureaus.

LAFFERTY MAKES REPLY

Willamette Tribe and Chief Multnomah Legendary, Anyway.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 22.—Replying to the communication of Hon. Frederick V. Holman, recently printed in the Oregonian, challenging the historical accuracy of my Astoria Centennial speech, I have today sent to Mr. Holman the following letter, which I hope you will publish:

Dear Sir: Out of the 20 facts stated in my Astoria Centennial speech, you doubt the accuracy of two and request the source of my information. You say you never heard of a Williamette tribe of Indians and that there was not, so far as you know, any Chief Multnomah.

Now, if I was in error as to two statements out of 20, my speech would still grade 90 as a historical paper, which is not so bad for a beginner. But I insist that I was right and that you were wrong, as I shall endeavor to show.

You state that you, as president of the Historical Society, and upon the strength of that statement I shall be glad to print your letter in the Congressional Record. But you failed to state that you are chief counsel for one of the allied public service corporations that are seeking to belittle me at this time. I shall overlook that, however, and commend your letter, or "can it," as it may suit you best, in the records of the Nation.

If there was not a Williamette tribe of

Indians, many people will be indebted to you for enlightening them on that subject. Representative Hawley, formerly president of the Williamette University, was one of the authorities for the fact that there was such a tribe and he reiterated that statement to me today. Since many people have been told that I am a liar, I will here state that if Mr. Hawley will deny that he so stated to me today, I will resign from office. As I recall it now, Lewis and Clark stated in their daybook that these Indians were called both Multnomah and Williamette. You say they were called Multnomah, but you think there was no Chief Multnomah. In history, at least, there was a Chief Multnomah, and that is all I claimed in my speech. The chief of the Multnomahs, National convention of Oregon, would naturally come to be called Chief Multnomah. Years after the tribe passed away, the Indian legend of Oregon, Chief Multnomah, is a conspicuous character. Every school-boy and girl has seen his picture. It would be just as mean of you to try to make the children believe that there is no Santa Claus as to try to convince the people that there was no Chief Multnomah. History, as well as legend, shows that there was an Indian that answers the description I gave and I shall continue to call him Chief Multnomah, unless you can furnish better evidence than you so far have advanced that another name was more appropriate.
