

TOGO LOOKS LAST ON NIAGARA FALLS

Admiral Begins Unofficial Trip Across Canada—He Will Rest at Banff.

SECRETARY LEFT BEHIND

Count Is Expected to Reach Vancouver Sunday—He Will Go From There to Seattle, Where He Will Embark for Japan.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Aug. 22.—Admiral Count Togo took a last look yesterday at the roaring cataract which of all America's sights has impressed him most, and started last night on his transcontinental journey to Vancouver, B. C. He appeared in good health and spirits.

With the exception of an hour's stay tonight at Toronto, where he remained in his car, the distinguished Japanese will go direct to Banff, in the Canadian Rockies, and rest there 24 hours. He will continue his trip Friday and arrive at Vancouver Sunday.

He expects to spend Monday in Seattle, Wash., embarking there Tuesday for Japan. He will arrive in Yokohama September 4.

The Admiral bade good-bye here to his private secretary, S. Takagi, and Consul-General Midzuno, both of New York, and was accompanied only by Commander Taniguchi, his aide, and Commander Higashi, naval attaché of the Japanese embassy at Washington.

The trip through Canada will be an official and though Admiral Togo represents the United States on his way from Vancouver to Seattle, he will travel privately.

SOLDIER'S SCORE PERFECT

Lieutenant Rutherford Shoots 100 in Camp Perry Matches.

CAMP PERRY, O., Aug. 22.—The seventh day of the National shoot ended with hot contests in two matches. The President's and the individual contests, the winners of which will represent the National individual championship, and the Herrick, an eight-man team match, were the events.

In the President's and individual contest, Lieutenant A. Rutherford, of the United States Infantry, made a perfect score of 100. He kept this lead at the 500-yard slow fire, putting out a 48. Although he scored but 42 at the 600-yard mark, he had one point above the next best man.

Ohio's eight-man team in the Herrick trophy match, a contest at the 300, 350 and 400-yard ranges, with any military ammunition and 15-shot scores, led the 33 teams entered by a record score, lacking only five points of a possible 600 at the 300-yard range. Only one match was completed—the championship revolver team match, which was won by the first squadron of Colorado Cavalry with a total of 3876. The team of Squadron A, New York, made 1949.

SCHOOL FUND LOAN OUT

Farmers in State Quick to Borrow on First Mortgages.

SALISBURY, Or., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—Within 15 days the State Board received applications for over \$250,000 worth of school fund loans and as a result it has been necessary for the Board to again shut off applicants. This condition is the result of the fact that there is an immense demand for money throughout the state. All loans from the school fund are made on first mortgage farm lands and the loan cannot exceed one-third of the value of the property.

A limit of \$2500 is placed on the loans. The Board has been passing favorably on those loans which are for \$1000 and less, as a greater number of people will be served this way before passing to those applications which are for larger amounts. It probably will be several months before the Board will announce itself as ready to receive further applications.

MIKE LYNCH IS FINED \$100

President Lindsay Penalizes Tacoma Ballplayer for Forfeiture.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—Upon receipt of a letter from Jack McCarthy's report last night concerning the withdrawal of the Tacoma team from the field and forfeiture of the game to Spokane, President Lindsay fined Manager Lynch \$100 for the forfeiture of the game. The fine must be paid within seven days.

The directors will be called together in a few days to decide upon additional penalty. Under the league constitution, in addition to the fine imposed upon Manager Lynch the board of directors of the league can at their discretion impose a fine of \$200 upon the Tacoma club.

HAINS' PARDON IS ASKED

Jurors Who Convicted Army Officer Petition Governor Dix.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—The jurors who convicted Captain C. Hains, United States Army, of the murder of W. E. Anna, three years ago this month, it was learned yesterday, sent a petition to Governor Dix asking the pardon of Hains, who is now serving from eight to 16 years at Sing Sing.

The petition recalls that the jury at the time of the trial recommended clemency by the court, realizing that the provocation of Hains was great.

BEACH COURT EXILES BOY

Nye Creek Theft Laid to Portland Lad, Who Is Ordered Home.

NEWPORT, Or., Aug. 22.—Robbery of a Nye Beach shooting gallery Friday night was traced to Ernest Wells, of Portland, 14 years old. All the stolen goods were recovered, with the exception of agates worth \$12.

The case was taken before Justice of the Peace Berry, who, after giving Wells a lecture, ordered the boy's grandmother, who is here with him, to take him home within three days. The case will be laid before the Portland Juvenile Court.

WIRELESS AGENTS START FOR PRISON

George S. Parker Will Serve One-Year Term in Cell at McNeil's Island.

OTHER CHARGES ARE MADE

Smuggling of Diamonds From Vancouver, B. C., Said to Have Been Traced to Salesman of United Wireless Securities.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—Christopher Columbus Wilson, Francis X. Butler and William W. Tompkins will start today for jail, where they will serve sentences for misusing the mails in defrauding investors in stock of the United Wireless Company.

Wilson and Butler will start for Atlanta, Ga., where they will serve two-year terms respectively in the Federal prison. Tompkins will go to Blackwell's Island for a year.

The mandate of the United States Circuit Court confirming the judgment of the trial court was recorded yesterday.

After the filing of the mandate, United States Marshal Henkel was advised by the court that Tompkins' sentence had been changed to imprisonment for a year and a day at Atlanta. Under the Federal parole law, Tompkins is eligible for release after serving a third of his sentence.

George S. Parker, the fourth of the Wireless men sentenced to prison terms, has decided to begin his term at McNeil Island, in Washington state, rather than await the appeal pending.

POSTMASTER MERRICK NAMES PAYING TELLER FOR POSTAL BANK.

Postmaster Merrick yesterday designated George H. Carr, chief paying teller of the money order department in the Portland Postoffice, to have charge of the new postal savings bank.

Mr. Carr has been in the local Postoffice for ten years. He entered the service in 1899 after his discharge from Company L of the Second Oregon Volunteer Infantry. He remained in the department until 1904 when he was transferred to the reclamation department as chief clerk of the Umatilla reclamation project. In 1908 he returned to the Portland Postoffice.

Mr. Carr is a native of England and has lived in Portland since 1882.

In his case. He will be taken to the Pacific Coast Friday.

Parker was sales agent of the stock of the United Wireless Company. He is reputed to be wealthy. When he serves the year's term at McNeil Island he may be confronted with an indictment now pending charging smuggling of diamonds and jewelry into this country from Vancouver.

UNWRITTEN LAW FREES

Asotin Cowboy Is Cleared by Coroner's Jury.

ASOTIN, Wash., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—Press Montgomery, the Joseph Creek cowboy who Saturday afternoon shot and instantly killed Loren Hawks, a neighbor, whom he asserts was the despoiler of his home, has pleaded the unwritten law in justification of his act and was acquitted by the jury impaneled by Coroner Merchant, the verdict being justifiable homicide.

Saturday morning Montgomery met Hawks and charged him with having broken up his home, and he asserted that Hawks confessed, and further informed him that he and Mrs. Montgomery were planning to elope. He then compelled Hawks to accompany him to his home, where he made him face Mrs. Montgomery, who vigorously denied the accusation. Hawks then volunteered to leave the country, provided Montgomery would not make the affair public, but this Montgomery refused to do, but agreed that he would take his family and leave instead.

Hawks left and Montgomery started for Paradise, 35 miles distant. After going a short distance he returned and hid in the brush. In a few minutes Hawks returned to the Montgomery home.

Montgomery then shot Hawks three times in the back, killing him instantly.

MOOSE HAVE FREE FIGHT

Los Angeles Delegates Start Near Riot in Convention.

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 22.—In a scene of wild confusion bordering on a riot, during which one man fainted, and which was finally ended by extinguishing the lights in the convention theater, the Los Angeles delegation to the National Convention of the Loyal Order of Moose yesterday disrupted the session and prevented the nomination of officers.

The Los Angeles delegation demanded that the constitution be amended to allow the nomination and election of officers at the closing sessions, to enable the delegates to become better acquainted with candidates.

An effort to procure the amendment may be made later in the week. The excitement lasted fully an hour. The Los Angeles delegation, an extremely large one, is determined, it is said, to delay nominations in the interest of William Alderson of Los Angeles, their candidate for supreme vice dictator.

During the pandemonium, James Lennon, twice candidate for supreme dictator, stood on his seat and nominated himself for office. In order to avoid a violation of the rules a recess was taken.

YOUNG MAN THOUGHT DEAD

Search of Vicinity of Oregon Guard Camp Proves Futile.

OREGON CITY, Or., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—After three days of fruitless search, George Miles, 25 years old, son of Deputy Sheriff Miles, of Clackamas County, who disappeared last Monday at the camp of the Oregon National Guard at Columbia Beach, is believed to be dead. The young man's father, accompanied by Captain Hidy, of Company G and five men of the same company, returned last night from where they combed the vicinity of the camp without finding any trace of Miles.

Young Miles was last seen near the Lewis and Clark River and it is believed that he may have been drowned.

Cashier Gilbert Daniels of the defunct Commercial Bank were arraigned yesterday before Judge Donald McMaster of the Superior Court and pleaded not guilty to the charge of having received deposits in their bank when they knew it to be insolvent.

Neither Phillips or Daniels were represented by counsel, and when after reading of the indictment they were asked for their plea they answered "Not guilty." Phillips and Daniels were arrested July 29 by Sheriff Crease upon information filed by Prosecuting Attorney Tempe. The day when their trial will be held has not been fixed. They were allowed to leave upon the bail of \$10,000, or \$5000 on each count.

CUBAN EDITORS EXILED

PRESIDENT GOMEZ PUNISHES ATTACKS ON GOVERNMENT.

Action of Executive in Deporting Newspaper Men to Spain Sets Whole Island in Ferment.

HAVANA, Aug. 22.—The deportation to Spain Sunday night of Jose Maria Villaverde, managing editor of the Conservative organ, Cuba, and his nephew, Samuel Villaverde, a member of the editorial staff of the Cuba, has created great excitement throughout the island and everywhere is the universal topic of conversation.

Supporters of the administration cite in defense of the action of President Gomez a resolution adopted at an international conference held at Hamburg in 1894, to which it is alleged all the powers subscribed, declaring it the absolute right of any ruler summarily to deport any foreigner whose conduct shall be considered detrimental to the interests of a country. They also point out as a precedent the deportation of Jose Penabaz Barboza, an Italian adventurer, charged with sedition, by order of the late President Palma.

The opponents of the administration, however, declare there is nothing analogous in the two controversies. The Spanish Minister is standing aloof from the controversy. He has made no representations to his home government, desiring first to ascertain the facts and also to decide whether the Cuban government is acting within its international rights.

The impression seems to prevail that the administration proceeded with the deportation of the Villaverdes after sounding the Spanish Minister. El Dia, the anti-administration paper, the editor of which, Armando Andres, recently exchanged shots with President Gomez's son, signed, denounces the action of the President as a colossal outrage without the least warrant in law.

The sons of Villaverde, who are Cuban born, today announced their intention of continuing the publication of the Cuba and of pursuing the policy of their father, who has persistently attacked the government.
