DRUNK ATTACKS POLICE AND DOCTOR.
 Patrolmen Potter and Rupert, the force at the City Jail, and even City Physician Ziegler, were participants in a long-drawn-out fight with E. T. Williams, who objected to being arrested when stopped by Patrolman Potter, at Second and Salmon streets, early yesterday morning. The man was drunk and showed resistance. When turned over to Patrolman Rupert, who accompanied the patrol wagon, he became uncontrollable, being a man of large size. Rupert was compelled to use his club vigorously, and broke the prisoner's scalp. At the police station he continued the fight, and even attempted to attack Dr. Ziegler, who was called in to dress his wound. He was docile yesterday morning and received a suspended sentence in consideration of the discipline he had undergone.

\$1000 DAMAGES ASKED FROM CITY.

Thomas N. Stevenson has applied to the Mayor and City Council for \$1000 damages because of injuries received May 22 by a ladder truck. He says he was walking along Morrison street between Fourth and Fifth streets when the truck came along, the firemen being out exercising the horses. The hub of one of the rear wheels struck an iron post, snapping it off, and hurling it against him, knocking him unconscious. Stevenson says he was confined to his bed for two weeks, and to his room for six weeks. A physician's certificate, which accompanies his letter, says his spine was injured.

NEWSBOY RIAL CITIZEN.—Obligations of citizenship are early realized by Neil Ward, newsboy, 11 years old, living at Sixth and Lincoln streets, who appeared at the police station desk yesterday afternoon to report what he believed to be an infraction of a city ordinance. "Captain, I want to report to you that there is an awful bad place over at East Ninth and Grant streets and I think the police ought to see to it," he said. "It is a stable that is awful dirty and it might make somebody sick. I just happened to see it, and I thought I ought to come and tell you."

COURTHOUSE CONTRACTOR IN POLICE COURT.—N. Shannon, a contractor on the new Courthouse, was a defendant in the Municipal Court yesterday on a charge of assault and battery on Fred Christiansen, one of his employees. The laborer dropped a large marble slab, intended to face one of the pilasters in the lobby of the new building, and broke it, necessitating sending to California at great expense to replace it. Shannon ordered the man out of the building, and shoved him when he refused to go. Sentence was suspended.

DIVORCE ASKS PROTECTION.—Della Walker, who was recently a divorcee from Marvin A. Walker, filed a petition with the Circuit Court yesterday asking that Walker be kept away from where his divorced wife is living in Eugene, Or. She alleges he has appeared at her residence there several times and become violent. She also asks for more alimony than was allowed, contending that Walker made a false report to the court of the value of his property.

PLUMES ATTRACT THREE.—Four dozen willow plumes, valued at \$500, were stolen from the store of A. Hoffelick, 3514 Washington street, Monday night. Detectives Hellyer, Moloney, Endicott and Sloan were assigned to the first-run theaters on Monday to indicate the thief except a few fingerprints on glass. Bertillon Expert Hunter was called and has preserved the prints for identification of the thief if he is caught.

NOVIE AUTOMOBILE FINED.—With an antiquated automobile and no license to run it, Arthur Murphy caused a total blockage of Alder street Monday afternoon and paid \$5 for the offense in the Municipal Court yesterday. Murphy, totally inexperienced, came to grief when he drove his car into a maze of traffic opposite the Meier & Frank store, and damaged a buggy and horse standing by the curb.

ALLEGED SWINDLER JAILED

Man Indicted for Use of Mail for Fraud Taken at Denio.

Deputy United States Marshal Hamilton returned yesterday from Denio, Or., where he went to arrest J. E. Rounsaville, who was indicted by the grand jury in March on a charge of having used the mails for the purpose of fraud. Denio is in Malheur County on the boundary line between Oregon and Nevada.

The arrest of Rounsaville necessitated a trip of 1300 miles. The trip from Vale, Or., a distance of 207 miles, was made by wagon and lay through a barren waste, there being few farms in that region. Denio has the distinction of being farther from a railroad than any town in the United States. Rounsaville was held under \$3000 bond. Owing to inability to furnish this amount he was placed in the County Jail.

Deputy Hamilton stopped at Nyssa, Or., to arrest J. H. Bigelow at that place for improper use of the mails. Bigelow was indicted by the grand jury July 28. He gave bonds in the sum of \$500.
