

COREY RIDICULES STORY OF DIVORCE

No Cloud Mars Sky of Married Happiness, Steel Man Says, Emphatically.

MAYBELLE COMING LATER

England, He Says, Is Greater Business Center Than New York, and He Will Make His Home in Europe Hereafter.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—William Ellis Corey, returning from Europe, denies with emphasis that there is a cloud in his marital sky. He and his present wife, who was Maybelle Gilman, the actress, are happy together. They do not intend to part and have had no talk on that subject, he says. It has been rumored in London that Corey would seek a reconciliation with the first Mrs. Corey and that he and his second wife had agreed on a separation, due largely to his falling fortune and the fact that society refuses to accord to the second wife the recognition her social ambition craves. "All this," said Corey, "when the cable message was shown to him, is perfect rot. How much a report got started I cannot understand. Mrs. Corey and I have not separated and we are not going to separate. We are as devoted to each other as we were on the day of our marriage. There is not a cloud in our domestic sky."

Mrs. Corey said "Goodbye."

"Why did Mrs. Corey not accompany you to New York?" was asked. "Mrs. Corey will be in New York the latter part of October or the first of November. We expect to stay in New York until March, when we will go back to Paris. To show you how ridiculous this story is, I will tell you that Mrs. Corey accompanied me to the steamship when I left and our parting was all it should have been."

"Do you expect to make this country your home?" "No, I do not," Mr. Corey answered positively. "I expect to make my home abroad. I believe that England is a greater business center than New York. I will pay occasional visits to America, but shall consider my home in Europe."

"Both Yarns Are Rot."

"I came to America this time to attend to personal business matters that required my presence. There is no more truth in that story about my being made head of a copper trust on condition that I abandon Mrs. Corey than there is in the other yarn. Both are rot."

Until his arrival Mr. Corey had not heard of George W. Perkins' altruistic plan to help the United States solve its industrial problems. When told of Perkins' intention to surrender more of his time in order to devote it to this end, Mr. Corey's sides shook with laughter.

"That is very amusing," he said. "Corey does not look like a man who is in domestic difficulties. His eyes are bright, his voice is strong and has a laughing, good-natured ring to it."

WINNIPEG WELCOMES TOGO

Dominion, Province and City Greet Admiral, Traveling Informally.

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 23.—Admiral Togo reached Winnipeg this afternoon and was met by representatives of the Dominion and Provincial governments, the City Council and Sir William Whyte, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, over which line the Admiral is traveling.

Admiral Togo remained only an hour here. He is traveling informally and on special attention will be paid him while he is in Canada.

Cutters to Patrol Harbor.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—At the request of the British and French governments, the revenue cutter service has ordered two of its ships, the Arcata and the Scout, from Port Townsend, Wash., to Seattle, to patrol the harbor there when Admiral Togo sails for Japan on the steamer Tamba Maru.

TWO END LIFE TOGETHER

Daughter Losing Position, She and Mother Embrace, Take Gas.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 23.—Mrs. Lydia Garber, aged 41, was found dead today, locked in each other's arms on the floor of the bathroom in their home. Notes left by the mother, coupled with a statement by Mrs. Garber's brother, indicated that the two women sought death because the daughter had been forced to give up her position in the County Recorder's office on account of ill health.

The bodies, clad only in night clothing, were found by the brother after he had broken in the door of the bathroom. The gas had been turned on some time last night and every opening closed.

KENTUCKY TOBACCO SHORT

Crop May Be Only 50,000,000 Pounds, Five-Sixths Behind.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Aug. 23.—The Kentucky tobacco crop, which was last year estimated to be 300,000,000 pounds, will not amount to more than 50,000,000 this year, it is believed.

The great shortage is due to the worst drought in years; to hail storms and to failure of hundreds of farmers to plant tobacco this year on account of the large amount of the peeled crop of other years still unsold.

Descriptions Are Circulated.

Descriptions of the stranger are being distributed in this connection. Artists are relating singular stories of intimations with works of art and the manias for statues and portraits of madmen who would plot to obtain possession of works which they could not buy.

Support for the theory that "Mona Lisa" was carried away by someone whose head had been turned by the beautiful face was found tonight in the admission of M. Leprieux, the curator of the art museum, that during the last year love letters addressed to "Mona Lisa" have been received frequently at the Louvre.

MEXICAN ASKS GUARD

COLONEL CELSO VEGA CAUTIONS AT SAN DIEGO.

Civil and Military Official at Ensenada, Family and Secretary, on Way to Capital.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Aug. 23.—Colonel Celso Vega, with his private secretary and household, arrived in San Diego early today from Ensenada, where for the last nine years he has been the civil and military administrator of the Northern District of Lower California. He was met at a hotel by his successor, General Manuel Gordillo Escudero, who will go to Ensenada this evening by steamer.

Plain clothes men were active in the crowd at the wharf this morning as a result of a request from Colonel Vega that police protection be given him while in San Diego. One Mexican, armed with a heavy revolver, was arrested shortly before Colonel Vega stepped ashore and hurried to jail.

Colonel Vega and his family and secretary left San Diego at 2 o'clock this afternoon for Los Angeles, after a visit to Tia Juana with General Escudero. From Los Angeles he will go direct to the City of Mexico, where he says he will reside.

TARIFF FIGHT IS 3-SIDED

Separate Programmes May Block Legislation.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Democrats, "progressive" Republicans and regular Republicans will have individual programmes for tariff revision when Congress reconvenes in December. This was made clear today.

All three elements in the Senate will be engaged in a battle on the general subject of revision. The trend of the fight will depend largely upon the report of the Tariff Board and the recommendations of the President in connection with that report.

The regular Republicans do not expect much actual tariff revision at the coming session, because of the wide divergence of opinion in the Senate. They contend that failure is likely to follow attempts to bring together the regular and "progressive" Republicans or the "progressives" and the Democrats.

Neither the Democrats nor the "progressive" Republicans, whose alliance swept revision legislation through the Senate until the combination was broken on the cotton bill, are willing to predict a renewal of that alliance in December.

Senator Martin, of Virginia, Democratic leader of the Senate, said today that if the President's recommendation should be for larger reduction, and many regular "standpat" Republicans failed to support the recommendation, the situation would tend to line up the Democrats and Republican insurgents.

The regular Republicans have expressed the fear that the Tariff Board's recommendations may be too radical for their acceptance. They contend that most of the measures resulting from the present Republican and Democratic alliance are likely to fall in conference on the ground that the Democrats desire to fight the next National campaign on the Payne-Aldrich tariff law.

The regulars also depend on the Presidential veto to put a quistion on any measure that would be satisfactory to Democrats and insurgents.

JEWES BAITED IN WALES

HOODLUMS, NOT PEOPLE IN GENERAL, ARE BLAMED.

Looting on Large Scale, as Aftermath of Strike Riots, Prevented by Troops.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—The authorities here are embarrassed and annoyed by outbreaks attributed to hoodlums, against Jews in Monmouthshire, on the Welsh border, and in other near-by points in Wales. The rioting and looting of Jewish shops were on an extensive scale, and it is admitted that it would have been worse if it had not been for the troops that were summoned from Cardiff. The occurrences were repeated last night in Ebbw Vale, Tregegar, Rhymney and Bryn Mawr. Many persons were injured in charges by soldiers and large numbers were arrested.

The Jews who suffered attacks were among the most respected of the townspeople; they indignantly deny the charges of demanding high rents and, so far as can be ascertained, the complaints against them of exacting exorbitant prices are unfounded.

In the opinion of Jewish residents in London the riots at Tregegar and other Welsh mining towns were indirectly, if not directly, due to the strike ferment, and they believe once labor troubles have vanished the present anti-Jewish feeling will die a natural death.

Those who hold this opinion are none the less anxious, because there are 100,000 Jews resident in London and many thousands in various parts of the kingdom, and the Jews heretofore have regarded themselves as safe from persecution in Great Britain.

BABES TO BE CHECKED

Chicago Judge Plans Room for Tots of Mothers on Stand.

CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—A room where mothers summoned as witnesses may check their babies while they are in court is to be established at the Maxwell-street police station, since situated in the heart of Chicago's Ghetto. Municipal Judge Gemmill suggested the idea and the police have approved it and the "baby check room" will be opened in charge of a police matron in a few days.

A woman with seven children appeared as a witness in court today and her efforts to care for the children and testify at the same time led Judge Gemmill to suggest the check room.

National Guard Bills Arriving.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 23.—(Special.)—Bills for the Summer camp of the Oregon National Guard are coming into the office of the Secretary of State. For all of the companies in the Third Infantry with the exception of Companies G and I, the cost was \$500, and for Battery A the cost was \$120.

JURY IS COMPLETE

12 Men Now Hold Fate of Accused Wife-Slayer.

BEATTIE LOOKS HAGGARD

Virginian's Aged Father Embraces Prisoner Before Latter Is Locked Up in Tiny Jail—Defendant's Health Good.

CHESTERFIELD COURT HOUSE, Va., Aug. 23.—The jury which will decide whether Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., of Richmond, shall go to the electric chair for wife murder was completed today. The commonwealth will call its first witness tomorrow.

The prisoner was locked up for the night in the small jail here and will not be returned to the Richmond jail during the trial. His gray-haired father embraced him and then went home in a dusty public conveyance, surrounded by curious persons.

In charging the jurors, all but three of whom are farmers, Judge Watson set forth the law of Virginia as applicable to homicide. As the indictment covers all degrees, from first degree murder to involuntary manslaughter, he explained that the defendant might be found guilty accordingly.

Judge Instructs Jury.

"If you find him guilty of murder in the first degree," said the court, "you will say so and nothing more, in which event the punishment shall be death. But if you find him guilty of murder in the second degree you shall so and shall fix his punishment in the penitentiary at not less than five nor more than 15 years."

Young Beattie went over the list of names and scanned the faces in the jurors' box again and again.

Beattie Is Haggard.

Beattie appeared somewhat haggard today, but sat stolidly as the taleman was examined. It was satisfyingly hot in the little courtroom, and the prisoner's aged father showed discomfort.

Court was called to order at 12:15. Beattie, silent and with set face, took his seat by the side of his lawyers. His father, as was the case on Monday, sat on his right. Almost immediately the additional veniremen were called and their examination began.

Beattie was the only one of the trio held in connection with the case to be brought here. Beulah, his wife, and Paul Beattie, the defendant's cousin, similarly held, were kept in their cells in the Richmond jail.

As usual, Henry Beattie spent an unbroken night of sleep and dressed carefully for the trip to Chesterfield. He looked worried and a bit pale, but wore the same air of confidence that impressed spectators when he pleaded not guilty at his arraignment on Monday.

REST DAY INSISTED UPON

Labor Commissioner Makes Complaint Against Hotelkeeper.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 23.—With the Los Angeles complaint in police court against Mrs. S. L. Bower, proprietress of a fashionable hotel, charging her with having employed a servant girl for several months without allowing her a day of rest each week, H. H. Lyon, assistant deputy commissioner of the State Bureau of Labor Statistics, has started a crusade under a law passed by the Legislature in 1893, which requires that "one day of rest be given every employee in every line of work, every week."

Though passed 18 years ago, yesterday's complaint is the first filed under this law. Lyon will not file more complaints until the one against Mrs. Bower has been disposed of. The law makes provision for emergency cases, but according to Lyon is very strict in all other respects and says he will do his best to enforce it.

Periodicals to Go by Fast Freight.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Arrangements having been perfected by the postoffice department for the transmission of second-class mail, consisting of magazines and periodicals, by fast freight beginning September 1, an order was issued today formally authorizing the change.

La Grande Invites Colonists.

LA GRANDE, Or., Aug. 23.—(Special.)—La Grande and Union County will appeal to Middle Western residents to whom they have sent literature to come to Grande Ronde Valley in the 30 days the colonist rates will be in effect to study farming conditions here. Letters will be sent by the Commercial Club of this city, and will be addressed to men in the Middle West known to be contemplating a trip to Oregon or Washington this fall.

WIFE DEAD, MATE BLAMED

Coroner's Jury Holds Husband Auto Driver to Blame for Two Deaths.

BERKELEY, Cal., Aug. 23.—The Coroner's jury which investigated the deaths of Mrs. Charles S. Petersen and Mrs. J. H. Todd, who were killed recently when an automobile driven by Petersen, husband of one of the victims, struck a car, recommended today that Petersen be arrested for manslaughter. Petersen is in a hospital suffering from injuries received at the time the others were killed. He will be arrested as soon as he is able to leave the hospital.
