

ATWOOD IS WITHIN 25 MILES OF GOAL

World's Distance Record Broken Before Defect in Engine Appears.

METAL BEARING IS WORN

Aviator on Way Down Hudson Dives Under Poughkeepsie Bridge. Flying Time for 1240 Miles Is 27 Hours 45 Minutes.

ATWOOD, N. Y., Aug. 24.—Another delay brought disappointment to thousands of people along the Lower Hudson River and in New York city today, when Harry S. Atwood, in his record-breaking aeroplane flight from St. Louis, failed to sail over New York and land at Sheepshead Bay, because of a defect in his engine, which compelled him to land here, within 25 miles of his destination.

Atwood expects to resume his trip tomorrow morning. He is 1240 miles from St. Louis tonight. His actual flying time for that distance, covered in 11 days, is 27 hours, 45 minutes. Despite his failure to land in New York, Atwood's flight of 109 miles down the Hudson gave him the world's longest distance record, formerly held by European aviators, by 75 miles. He covered the 109 miles from Castleton in two hours, 37 minutes. One hour and three minutes' flying brought him to Kingston, opposite Rhinecliff, which marks the breaking of the record by 12 miles.

After passing Rhinecliff, he swooped close to the water, flying under an arch of the Poughkeepsie bridge, less than 100 feet above the water.

Starting from Garrison at 11:35 A. M., Atwood purposed to make his last day for Sheepshead Bay. He had not gone far, however, when he discovered the bearing metal on his engine was knocking. Twenty-eight minutes later, and when only 25 miles out of New York, he descended here.

Atwood worked tonight on the disabled engine.

IRVINGTON CLUB ACTIVE

Committee Is Appointed to Increase Membership of Body.

At a special meeting at the Irvington Clubhouse last night, a committee of ten members of the club was appointed to conduct a campaign for membership, which the club hopes to end by counting every member of the Irvington district among its membership. It also was proposed to establish a kindergarten as a feature of the Irvington Club playground, and to secure a competent woman instructor to supervise the grounds and take charge of the kindergarten. A committee of two, consisting of Mrs. David Goodsell and Mrs. A. B. Wastell, was appointed to take up the work. Both committees have been appointed to meet and report the result of their work Thursday night at 8 o'clock.

It was decided to keep the grounds and the kindergarten open throughout the year and to make arrangements for carrying on the kindergarten work inside when the weather will not permit of its being carried on outside. The club owns the playground and pays all the costs out of the dues received from membership. At present it has 469 members, of which 153 are life members, by virtue of having paid \$100.

BROOKS' COMET BRIGHTENS

New Sky Body Seen With Opera Glasses at Geneva, N. Y.

GENEVA, N. Y., Aug. 24.—The new comet recently discovered by Dr. W. R. Brooks, director of observatory and professor of astronomy, Robert College, and named by him, the Brooks comet, has become so bright here as to be seen with opera glasses or small telescopes and will soon be visible to the unaided eye.

The comet is now in constellation Cygnus, about three degrees north of Alpha, the star in the Northern Cross, directly overhead early in the evening. Its motion is northwest. Dr. Brooks says the comet is coming nearer and will continue to grow brighter for several weeks.

LOAN HAS "DRY" CLAUSE

Seattle Man Not to Pay Mortgage if City Votes Prohibition.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 24.—(Special.)—"Not good if King County votes dry," Joe Hagot, of Woodinville, is a firm believer in the theory that the sale of liquor under proper control is to the financial benefit of the community, and he determined to take no chances. So, when he went to borrow \$1000 on his land, adjoining the Northern Pacific right of way in his town, from his friend, Vic Anderson, he insisted that the quoted sentence be written on the face of the mortgage.

The mortgage, with its extra condition, was put upon the County Auditor's records this morning.

MEN IN NO MOOD TO WAIT

(Continued From First Page.) Pacific, Central Pacific, Oregon Short Line, Houston & Texas Central, Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Company and San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad. Shop workers of the Illinois Central Railroad have also presented similar requests for recognition. President Kline, in outlining the position of the shopmen, said: "On June 6 last a committee of work-

ers on the Harriman lines met in Salt Lake City to form a federation of the members of the various mechanical crafts under railroad management. Several roads have already recognized similar federations, among them the Wabash road, the Gould lines and the Hawley lines.

"The organization was formed for protection and in the interest of economy and convenience. It should be easier to deal with one joint committee than with a dozen. The Harriman lines refused to recognize the federated body."

"That is all the men are asking. The question of wages is not involved. Since the federation was formed the men active in the movement have been discriminated against, and many have been laid off without just cause. I am informed. The situation is grave. I have received several telegrams from officers of different unions asking for permission to strike."

"I am doing all I can to settle the men's differences peacefully, and sincerely hope that oil may be poured on the troubled waters. We have had several conferences with railroad officials, and more will be held before anything is done."

Men Refuse to Wait.

Whatever prospects there were for a settlement became fainter tonight when Kline announced that the plans for meeting Vice-President Kruttschnitt in San Francisco practically had been abandoned. This statement was issued after he had received telegrams from President Franklin, of the Boilermakers' Union, and President Ryan, of the carmen's organization.

"I do not see how we can arrange to meet Mr. Kruttschnitt in San Francisco," said President Kline. "Both Mr. Ryan and Mr. Franklin believe that the time is too short. We may reach Mr. Kruttschnitt at Omaha in the morning by telegraph, but I do not know that it will do us any good."

DOCTOR IS 'MISTREATED'

COLD-AIR TREATMENT ADVOCATE DENIED IT BY WIFE.

Physician Explains Why Own Theory Was Not Employed When He Himself Had Pneumonia.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—That a physician cannot always be treated according to what he believes is the best method of handling a disease developed at the inquiry before Commissioners Bulger and Coleman today. The inquiry was the administration of Dr. Doty, Health Officer of the Port.

Dr. William P. Northrop, a specialist in diseases of children and who first advocated the cold-air treatment for pneumonia, was a witness. It had been testified by a woman immigrant that sick babies were carried out into the cold air and brought back dead.

Dr. Northrop said the advanced treatment for pneumonia was open air, and it would be better near snowbanks. "Doctor, you had pneumonia recently," asked Lawyer Dushkind. "Was the cold-air treatment used on you?"

"No," said the physician. "Why not?" asked the attorney. "I was married to my wife and she would not let me," was the reply. "But you tried it on others?"

"Is the best treatment," was the physician's reply. The witness said the cold-air treatment was used in measles and scarlet fever at the New York Foundling institution, with which he has been connected for years. He said no recognized medical authority had written advising this treatment for measles and scarlet fever.

Dr. Northrop thought segregation of patients into small groups was possible at Hoffman Island under existing conditions.

Forest Fire Hand Found Dead.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Aug. 24.—(Special.)—Walter Bonner, 55 years old, who had been employed by Charles Geasell, a farmer living at Forest, eight miles southeast of Chehalis, was found dead in bed today when called for breakfast. Coroner Sticklin will hold an autopsy. Bonner had been employed for the past two or three years at Nawakum Prairie and Napa-vine. He was supposed to have been a single man, but letters found indicate that he had a family.

Train Victim Identified.

COLFAX, Wash., Aug. 24.—J. Wilson today identified the man killed by the Sno. Portland to Spokane train, at Colfax Wednesday night, as James Mathews, of Newark, N. J. Wilson said he had been working as a harvester and rode the rods from Tekoa to Colfax where he was put off. Wilson said Mathews had been asleep several times en route to Colfax and no doubt fell asleep as the train left Colfax.

STORAGE EGGS WATCHED

FOOD KEPT FOR LATE-YEAR DEMAND, IS REPORT.

Health Commissioner at Chicago Tries to Find \$1-Per-Case Bad Henfruit in Icehouses.

CHICAGO, Aug. 24.—Commissioner of Health Young today began an investigation of a charge that large quantities of bad eggs are put in cold storage here for use later when the supply of fresh eggs is inadequate to meet the demand.

The receipts of fresh eggs are said to be much larger than at this time last year and they are sold to commission men at 17 cents a dozen. The price to consumers is from 25 to 30 cents a dozen. Well informed operators express the opinion that the supply of fresh eggs will be sufficient

to meet the demand during the next 90 days without drawing on the cold storage supply.

Dr. Benjamin Perry, chief food inspector of Chicago Health Department, said he had received information from a firm in Kansas City made a specialty of buying No. 3 eggs at \$1 a case for shipment to the Chicago market and the thousands of eggs unfit for food were held in cold storage.
