

SINCLAIR AND WIFE CHAT ON DIVORCE

As Papers Are Being Prepared, Author, Spouse and Affinity Enjoy Talk.

ABSOLUTE DECREE SOUGHT

Harry Kemp, Poet, Named as Co-respondent in Case of Utopian Apostle, Meets With Writer. Wife May Go on Stage Soon.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The marital difficulties of Upton Sinclair and Meta Fuller Sinclair, who have been married 11 years, reached a climax today when the author brought suit for absolute divorce, naming Harry Kemp, the poet, as co-respondent.

While the papers were being prepared by Mr. Sinclair's attorney for service upon his wife today, she and her husband and the co-respondent poet sat in the assembly room of a large Broadway hotel and quietly discussed with reporters the problem of marital relations and Utopia in general.

The author and his wife frequently addressed each other in endearing terms and in a most matter-of-fact way Mr. Sinclair told his wife that his attorney would call later in the day, as he did, with the formal papers.

Mrs. Sinclair Won't Contest.

Mrs. Sinclair was asked if she would fight the divorce proceedings.

"No," she said, "I have not yet consulted a lawyer, but my present intention is not to defend the suit."

When informed of the statutory grounds which the New York law required for the granting of a divorce, she said:

"It does not seem to me that divorce should be a disgrace, even divorce obtained upon such grounds as you say must be shown in this state. I believe that an individual is justified in pursuing his or her ideal."

Conservative Husband Misfortune.

"I have the misfortune," she continued, "to have a conservative husband. He is conservative by instinct and nature and radical merely by choice. A monogamist ought to be able to act the part of a husband; in other words, he ought to have some time to devote to his wife."

"He should not be so absorbed in his work that the true proportions of human relationship fade into insignificance beside his work."

Mrs. Sinclair said she expected to go away for a rest and added that Mr. Kemp would not accompany her. She said, however, that both of them might later go on tour. Mr. Sinclair said he was going to his home in Arden, Del.

FARMERS CLASH IN DUEL

Siskiyou Men Shoot on Sight and One Is Injured Fatally.

HORN BROOK, CAL., Aug. 28.—As the result of a duel fought in the county road near here yesterday, George Miller is suffering from gunshot wounds that will probably prove fatal, and William A. Wright is a prisoner, having surrendered to the sheriff.

Miller is a prominent citizen of Siskiyou County. They have been antagonists for some time, the trouble growing out of law suits.

"It was a case of shoot first," said Wright, "and I beat him to it."

After the shooting Wright went home and sent word to the brother of the wounded man, telling him where he could find Miller. The wounded man had one eye torn away and a bullet in the shoulder. Both men have been taken to Yreka.

TROOPS SENT TO AFRICA

Moroccan Situation Causes Spain to Take Action.

MADRID, Aug. 28.—Dispatches today from Las Palmas, Canary Islands, say 500 Spanish soldiers are making preparations to embark tomorrow on the transport Admiral Lobo, to occupy Saint Croix la Mineira, on the Moroccan coast, to the south of Agadir, where the arrival last July of the German warship Panther had caused a serious international dispute over Morocco.

The news reporting the movement of a Spanish force to Southern Morocco has not yet been elucidated, but should be confirmed it is expected further to complicate the Moroccan problem, over which negotiations are in progress by Jules Cambon, the French Ambassador at Berlin, and Herr von Kiderlin-Wechter, the German Foreign Secretary.

TWO SEAMEN MEET DEATH

Accident on Board Battleship Ohio Kills Enlisted Duo.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Word reached the Navy Department today that two seamen, William A. Creech and Wilson D. Mickey, had been killed on the battleship Ohio as the result of an accident to the anchor gear. The Ohio is in Tangle Sound, Chesapeake Bay, preparatory to participating in the target practice of the Atlantic fleet.

The official report gave no other details of the accident. Creech was a native of Barnwell, S. C., was 24 years old, and had been in the Naval service a little more than four years.

Mickey, the other victim, was from Illinois, Pa., was 25 years old, and had been in the Navy six years.

SHOOTING CHARGE HOLDS

Decoy Letter Cause of Trouble for Assailant and Assailed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—Patrick J. Farrelly was held to answer today on a charge of having shot James Holland at the city prison, after firing the latter from Los Angeles by means of a decoy letter purporting to have been written by Mrs. Farrelly.

Holland has recovered from the wound inflicted by Farrelly and has been taken to a hospital. He is now being treated by a physician.

THEATER HELD FIT

Fire Laws Not Violated at Canonsburg, Says Official.

WHOLE VILLAGE MOURNS

Survivors of Moving Picture Panic Tell Story of Mad Rush Down Crowded Stairs—Most of Victims Are Children.

CANONSBURG, Pa., Aug. 28.—After carefully examining the opera-house where 24 persons met death Saturday night in the mad rush down the stairs when some one shouted "Fire," James N. Patterson, deputy fire inspector, announced this afternoon that the owner of the building and manager of the theater, had not violated the law in any way.

The fire escapes were found in perfect condition and the stairway where the victims met their fate was wide enough for all demands of the law, he said.

Notwithstanding this exoneration from Patterson, there are many who declare that the theater had been known to be unfit for public exhibitions for some time. Evidence of this sort may be presented at the coroner's inquest, which will be held Thursday or Friday next.

Public Functions Being Abandoned.

Canonsburg will be in mourning for days to come. All public and social functions have been abandoned, a number of dances and church festivals arranged for this week having been postponed. Even the baseball games of the church league have been canceled for the season.

One of the most thrilling incidents of the disaster is described by Nellie Gibbs, 16 years old. When taken from the pile at the door she was clinging to the lifeless form of her baby sister.

At the first alarm the oldest girl caught the child by the hand. In the rush for the steps the little one stumbled and fell. Nellie stopped to pick her up.

The girl's fall was fatal and both were swept to the bottom. Crushed under the heavy mass of humanity, the girl held tightly to her sister, feeling all the while that she was dying and not knowing how soon her own end would come. She said she prayed all the time and finally lost consciousness.

White Ribbons Flutter.

Little white ribbons fluttered from many homes in Canonsburg today. Nearly two-thirds of the victims of the panic were children, and local undertakers have had to order a special consignment of children's coffins from Pittsburgh. Many of the funerals were held today.

Early in the day it was said that Coroner Heffernan had ordered the arrest of a man supposed to have been the first to cry "Fire!" The name of the person under suspicion, however, was not made public.

Mrs. Minnie Lemon, who it was feared would lose her reason as the result of her experiences in the panic, is slowly recovering her reason today at the Canonsburg Hospital. Physicians now expect a complete recovery.

ARSON CASES ARE SET

FOUR SUSPECTS ARRAIGNED IN CHICAGO FOR FIRES.

Prisoners Are Accused of Having Set Fire to Fifty Buildings and Causing \$1,000,000 Loss.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—David Korshak, alleged head of an arson ring, which is said to have set fire to 50 buildings in Chicago in the past year, causing a property loss of \$1,000,000, was arraigned before Municipal Judge Dickler today and charged with arson and conspiracy to day and the hearing of his case continued until September 28.

Max Felschmidt, Israel Schaffner and Ellis Rubenstein, charged with arson in connection with the alleged conspiracy, also were arraigned and their cases set for hearing September 14.

The police still are searching for Benjamin F. Fink, said to be an official of the Northwestern Can Company, and a former policeman who are alleged to have been implicated in a North Side incendiary fire, which resulted in a loss of \$200,000.

Land Sale Alleged Unlawful.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—Harvey Allen was placed in the County Jail upon the alleged charge of selling some property at Merlin to John Woolfolk, of this place, when the real estate belonged to a Dr. Holton. Allen had left the state and was at Crescent City, Cal., but the officers traced him down and a Deputy Sheriff went after him. He will be tried at the term of court which convenes September 24.

SWEPE HERESS IS ELOPEMENT BRIDE

Niece of Kansas City Millionaire, Thought Killed by Dr. Hyde, Is Wedded.

SHE ALLEGED VICTIM, TOO

Daughter of Murdered Man's Brother Who Inherits Part of \$3,000,000 Estate Slips Away to Marry Salesman.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—Miss Lucy Lee Swope, heiress to a share of \$3,000,000, niece of Colonel Thomas H. Swope, the murdered Kansas City millionaire, eloped yesterday with W. B. Byrne, a traveling salesman of Denver. The couple went to Pueblo, where they were married, and returned here last evening.

Not only was Miss Swope one of the main witnesses against Dr. B. C. Hyde, who is accused of the Swope murder, but she was an alleged victim of the physician, she having been attacked with the strange illness from which her uncle died four days after her arrival from Europe. Dr. Hyde at that time was at New York, accompanied Miss Swope to her home and treated her in the early stages of her illness, which Dr. Hyde said was typhoid fever.

She is the daughter of Mrs. Logan O. Swope, and with ten nephews and nieces inherited part of the \$3,000,000 estate of Colonel Swope. Mrs. Logan O. Swope, sister-in-law of the man murdered, is the mother of seven children.

In the trial of Dr. Hyde the prosecution attempted to prove that Miss Swope (now Mrs. Byrne) was the victim of Dr. Hyde, attorneys for the state alleging that the physician gave her on the train a glass of water in which typhoid germs had been placed.

Dr. Hyde is free under \$25,000 bonds, pending his second trial, and recently visited Seattle with his attorney in quest of evidence in his behalf. The second trial of the physician has been set for October, and it is believed that Mrs. Byrne will be called on then to testify against the alleged murderer of her wealthy uncle.

WEST WILL ADVERTISE

"GOVERNOR'S SPECIAL" WILL TRAVEL IN EAST.

Train Will Start From Omaha on October 20 and Land Shows Will Be Visited.

POCATELLO, Idaho, Aug. 28.—(Special.)—Interested in the work being pushed steadily forward by various development leagues and commercial organizations throughout the West, Governor of Western and Northwestern states, headed by James H. Brady, ex-Governor of Idaho, expect to make a tour through the Eastern States and a Winter to "boost" the West.

The tour will be made on a special train, which will not only carry half a dozen or more Western Governors, but four five exhibit cars to "show" the people of the East the products of Western and Northwestern states; resources of the soil, rivers, lakes, mines, forests and factories. It will be known as the "Western Governors' Special."

The chief executives of the following states, several of whom are already booked to go, will be invited to accompany the party: Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Utah, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Nebraska, Dakota, South Dakota and Minnesota.

Back of this tour are the development leagues, commercial clubs and the like, which are working for the betterment of the states represented. Ex-Governor Brady heads an organization devoted to the development of the Western States, and it is those who are joining him in the movement are interested in development leagues which represent the Northwest states and regions.

The plan for the "Western Governors' Special" is to leave Omaha October 20. The train will consist of four five cars containing exhibits of Western and Northwestern products, sleeping cars and diners. The special will visit land shows and exhibitions in the East including Pittsburgh, New York City and Chicago, returning to St. Paul about December 17, where the Northwestern Land Products Show will be in progress. This is the show which is given under the auspices of the Northwestern Development League and the Governors will be on hand to emphasize the importance of this exposition.

Count Max G. Seckendorff, Newspaper Correspondent, Passes Away.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Count Max G. Seckendorff, a well-known newspaper correspondent and writer, died today at the home relatives at Frankfurt-on-the-Main, Germany, at the age of 58, according to cable messages received here today. He was the representative in this country of the Wolff Continental News Agency of Germany, and was, for a number of years, the head of the New York Tribune Bureau in this city.

He was well known in political and diplomatic circles. He was born in Brussels, Belgium, and served in the German army during the Franco-Prussian war. He was a member of the German Empire and was a pleasure and business trip. His wife and one of his daughters were with him.

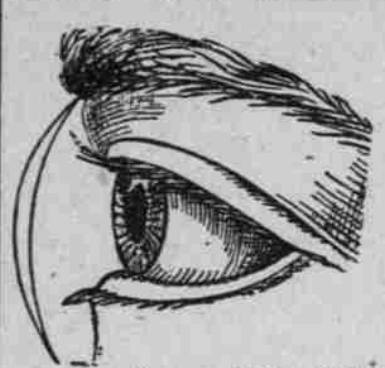
MANY STATES TO SEE TAFT

BIG DIRIGIBLE IS FINISHED

Akron, O., Craft to Start on Ocean Voyage October 22.

AKRON, O., Aug. 28.—Melvin Vaniman's balloon, with which he and five others will attempt to fly across the Atlantic Ocean, October 22, will be shipped from Akron to Atlantic City today, having just been completed in a local rubber factory. The airship will be christened the Akron.

The Akron is the only dirigible of the first class ever built this side of the Atlantic. It is 268 feet long, or about 30 feet longer than the America, which was lost in the ocean as a sequel to the Walter Wellman expedition of last year. Filled with pure hydrogen it will have an atmospheric displacement of 350,000 cubic feet, and a gross lifting power of 26,000 pounds. With the car and engines attached, it will have a net capacity of 12,000 pounds, or about 80 persons.

The Akron is made of 2200 pieces of tough fabric. Each propeller will be driven by a gasoline engine of 100-horsepower. The gas bag is cigar-shaped, with an extreme diameter of 45 feet.

MOTORMAN MISSES SIGNAL

Accident Occurs on Oregon City Line When Bell Works Badly.

OREGON CITY, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—The bell cord on the train from which John Hogan Flinane, a stenographer of this city, fell and sustained a fatal injury near Park place Sunday afternoon, was not connected with the car in front was the declaration today by several persons who witnessed the accident. They said the car ran several hundred yards from the scene of the accident, although the conductor and several passengers tried every way possible to signal to the motorman. The car had been stopped immediately the life of Flinane could not have been saved, but it is asserted that the failure to have the bell cord attached might have resulted disastrously under other circumstances. Coroner Wilson, after making an examination, said that it would not be necessary to hold an inquest.

Mr. Flinane had suffered recently from fainting spells and persons who saw the accident said that he had recently been seized with one of these when he jumped from the car. He was brought to this city and died while being attended by Dr. Strickland.

Wallawa Lake is becoming quite a fishing resort.
