## CALL FOR AID IS OUT

Though Logging Company's Hold-  
ings Are Hit, Employees Are Slow  
to Respond—Captain Toose  
May Order Guard to Fight.DALLAS, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—A  
serious forest fire is raging in the J. K.  
Spaulding Logging company's timber  
holdings three miles north of Black  
Rock in this county. The fire was first  
discovered this morning and was gain-  
ing headway rapidly.It already extends about one half mile  
in length and has burned over a con-  
siderable area. Grave fears are enter-  
tained regarding its progress, unless the wind  
now blowing, ceases soon, the fire will  
get beyond control.Though the call for help in fighting  
this fire was sent out early today very  
few responses to the call, the employees  
of the Spaulding Logging company and  
other logging companies with a  
camp at Black Rock being slow to  
turn out in this emergency. Finally  
pressure was brought to bear upon them  
and about 50 men were moved to the  
vicinity of the fire at noon.A call came in to Captain Walter L.  
Toose Jr., commanding Company H,  
Fourth Infantry, Oregon National  
Guard, stationed here, asking if this  
company could be moved to the scene  
of danger to aid in checking the rapid  
advance of the flames, due to the fact  
that persons authorized to give orders  
in such a case could not be reached by  
telephone. The company did not go out  
though being held in readiness to move  
at a moment's notice.The Salem, Fall City and Western  
Railway Company is holding a special  
train ready to move the troops to  
Black Rock at any moment. Captain  
Toose has notified those in charge of  
the firefighting at Black Rock, that  
if necessary demand, he will, upon re-  
quest of the County Judges, order the  
company out on his own responsibility,  
unless the wind changes soon, the of-  
fer of Captain Toose probably will be  
accepted before morning, for the situa-  
tion is serious.

port police have reported to the Paris  
headquarters that, on Wednesday last,  
two men carrying two frame canvases  
separated by a wooden pane, sailed  
aboard the Kaiser Wilhelm II for New  
York. They think that possibly the  
panel concealed the painting "Mona  
Lisa."The authorities in Paris have been  
informed.

## MAN ON LOG DEFIES RAPIDS

Indians Declare Feat On River in  
Michigan Meant Death.SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Aug. 28.—  
While 5000 persons looked on, James  
Pollock, a riverman, of Tower, Mich.,  
shot St. Marie River Rapids yesterday  
on a log. For his feat he received \$25.  
In a canoe with Indian guides, Pollock  
was taken to the head of the rapids.  
Six minutes later, after having been  
whirled about the thousand gigantic  
boulders and often obscured from view,  
he emerged from the rapids without a  
scratch.Pollock is the first man to shoot the  
rapids on a log. The rapids are a mile  
and a half long.When he started, expert Indian  
guides, who have shot the rapids in  
canoes for years, declared Pollock

## COUCEIRO PLOTS BUSILY

Captain's Activities Make Danger of  
Present Government Imminent,  
as He Is Organizing Dis-  
contented Factions.LISBON, Aug. 28.—(Special.)—That  
the Republican government of Portu-  
gal is maintaining 50,000 troops infrontier entails a steady drain, all the  
more alarming because there is no re-  
liance on the military attachment to  
republicanism when it comes to a cru-  
cial test.Secret societies are at work, with  
their operating centers in Galicia. As  
before, they work on so strict a prin-  
ciple that not more than three people  
know of their implication at any time.  
But Couceiro holds the levers that  
control them all. He is under fifty,  
and tireless. That is where he has the  
advantage over d'Aimada, the chief  
agent of Dom Miguel, who is about  
sixty and has evidently led a lively life  
in the Austrian army.Against them are counter secret so-  
cieties supporting, more or less, the  
Republican regime. On both sides  
treachery is punished swiftly and se-  
cretly with assassination. The knife  
is constantly being wielded in the dark-  
ness and seldom does the smiter stumble  
in his escape. So it may be seen  
how perilous is the plight of Portugal,  
and how the Pretender, Dom Miguel,  
has the best chance of victory. Man-  
uel is not a likely winner in the strug-  
gle. But in the end, Couceiro probably  
will be the most disappointed man, for  
he is building his schemes on idealism  
and idealism is not a hardy plant in  
the soil of Portugal at this time.

## WOMAN SCULPTOR WINS

COVETED PRIX DE ROME GOES  
TO PARIS TEACHER.PARIS, Aug. 28.—(Special.)—For the  
first time in the history of French art,  
and since the institution of the famous  
Prix de Rome, a woman student has  
won the coveted honor over the heads  
of her male competitors. The success-  
ful laureate is Mile. Legerie Antoinette  
Heuvelmans, whose success in  
sculpture was noticed two years ago,  
when she obtained the second Grand  
Prix.Something is surely changed when a  
young woman can obtain such a recom-  
pense, and "feminism" in France has  
scored a distinct triumph. Some of  
the laureates in Mile. Legerie's class  
were allowed to follow the  
classes, and they had the right to get  
instruction from the best teachers. But  
it was never dreamed that a woman  
who can work a counter revolution  
successfully is just across the frontier  
in Galicia, planning, organizing, wait-  
ing for the moment when he can strike  
a blow that marks him off from the  
braggart but unstable Portuguese.Idealist, soldier, administrator, man  
of action, Couceiro has inherited from  
a British mother that northern granite  
streak that marks him off from the  
braggart but unstable Portuguese.Until he joined the plotters their  
schemes were feather-brained fulfill-  
ments, flattered away in absurd mis-  
sions to the north of Portugal. Now, though  
Couceiro has the worst material in  
Europe and very little money, he is  
systematically organizing the 10,000 or  
so exiles at Santiago de Compostella,  
Tuy, Vigo, Orense, Verin and Ponte-  
vedra, and working the underground  
of Galicia and the present clique of  
the frontier in the anti-Republican  
north of Portugal. That is why the  
Republican government is cared today  
they know there is a brain behind  
the movement.

## King's Flight Disguises.

Not that Couceiro is enamored of  
the monarchy. His position is pecu-  
liar. For the treachery of his fel-  
low officers on the night of the rebel-  
lion and the flight of the King, he is  
convinced he could have repressed the  
revolutionaries. For a time he did  
withstand the Republicans, but when  
he heard King Manuel had fled he  
broke his sword across his knee, and  
said in disgust, "Then I will no longer  
fight for a poltroon."The Republicans, knowing his  
worth and admiring his fighting quali-  
ties, offered him an army post almost  
at the top, but he declined the bribe.  
He is not against a republic, as  
such; he is against the present clique  
who constitute in his opinion as ugly  
a despotism as ever disgraced the re-  
cords of monarchy. Some on both sides  
consider him quite right, but he is the  
pick of the rebel camp, both in  
brains and character.He can't be bought, but he is likely  
to be deceived. For a time, after he  
declined high office, he lived as a  
teacher of English. Then, after con-  
ferences with the agents of the exiles  
in the city, he agreed to the rebel  
cause, and he is now at the head of  
their undertaking. On the success of a counter revo-  
lution the nation should be consulted.  
If they declare for a republic, he is  
good; they shall have a real republic  
with liberty for all parties, not an  
oligarchy bent on extinguishing its  
opponents. On the other hand, if the  
country wants the Pretender, Dom  
Miguel, then Dom Miguel it shall be.  
When it comes to the return of Dom  
Miguel as a possible success, he shrugs  
his shoulders and acquiesces, but with  
an ill-grace, for the memory of the  
flight to England is bitter still.

## Departure Is Bold.

Couceiro's manner of leaving Lisbon  
was indicative of the man. He went  
to the President and urged him to put  
the manner of government to the na-  
tion on a fair vote, for the republic or  
the monarchy. The reply was, of  
course, a refusal. Thereupon Couceiro  
left in his address and declared in-  
tentions to the government 24 hours be-  
fore setting out for the frontier. They  
did not arrest him; they merely  
struck his name off the army list.Besides Couceiro there are two men  
worth noting. Dom Joao d'Almeida,  
private secretary to Dom Miguel, and  
Senhor Chagas, ex-officer of the "Cor-  
po de Manha." These two are con-  
sistently on the side of Couceiro; that  
is to say they have agreed to his  
pledges as to the reference to the people  
of Portugal when the Republican re-  
gime is overthrown. But for all that  
they are pulling the wires for the en-  
thronement of Miguel, confident that  
they have behind them 90 per cent of  
the exiles, and could swing the mon-  
archist north to his side. Moreover they  
know the Portuguese, except in and  
cities, will accept whatever comes to  
them as the established rule.Until Couceiro came along they were  
making no headway. Their little risings  
in the north spluttered out like damp  
quicks. But now they are confident  
Couceiro can engineer the explosion,  
and they are waiting for the signal  
after Dom Miguel. One who went over  
the ground in Galicia thoroughly and  
has since closely investigated the Por-  
tuguese field, that the only way of

## WAR COUNCIL REFORMED

France Makes General Joffre Gen-  
eralissimo of Army Forces.PARIS, Aug. 28.—(Special.)—At the  
Cabinet Council held at Rambouillet M.  
Messimy, Minister of War, brought for-  
ward several proposals for the reform  
of the Supreme Council of War, and  
embodied two decrees which were  
prefaced by separate explanatory re-  
ports. In the first place the post of  
vice-president of the Council of War is  
abolished, and General Michel, who held  
the honor, is succeeded by General Jof-  
fre, whose title is head of the staff, or  
quarter-master general. The post of the  
Headquarters Staff is to be the  
general of the most important division  
of the French Army in time of war.This apparently implies that General  
Joffre is henceforth to be looked upon  
as generalissimo of the army, and com-  
mander of the first line of French  
troops on the eastern frontier in time  
of peace.
