

TOGO HONORED BY SEVERAL LEADERS

Addresses at Banquet Plight
Friendship Between Two
Countries.

HOSPITALITY WINS FIGHTER

On Eve of Sailing for Home Admiral
Pledges Gratitude to America.
Judge Barks Tells Business Men
Importance of Harmony.

TART TELEGRAPHS BON VOYAGE.

BEVERLY, Mass., Aug. 28.—President Taft sent the following telegram to Admiral Togo, at Seattle:

"Accept my best wishes for pleasant voyage. The Government and the people of the United States have much pleasure in welcoming you to this country, and regret that your visit to us could not have been prolonged."

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 28.—The final function on American soil in honor of Admiral Count Heihachiro Togo took place tonight when 100 business men sat with him at a banquet given by the Chamber of Commerce and the Commercial Club of this city.

Admiral Togo, having been the honored guest of the Nation in the East, and the guest of the City of Seattle on the day before his departure for Japan, took occasion tonight to reiterate his appreciation of the courtesies extended to him and to express anew his feeling of gratitude to the good will shown him as a representative of Japan by the American people.

Plates were laid for 125 guests and in addition to the Americans who sat at the table many prominent Japanese were present, among them Commander Hiraga, naval station attaché to the Japanese embassy at Washington, Consul-General Kakamura, of Ottawa, Hon. Consul Yada, of Vancouver, B. C., and representatives of the Japanese associations of California and Oregon.

Mayor George W. Dilling presided and toasts were responded to by Rear-Admiral W. H. H. Southland, commander of the second division of the Pacific fleet, Judge Thomas Burke and Consul Takahashi. Admiral Togo spoke in his native tongue, his address being translated by Commander Taniguchi, his aide.

Hospitality Is Appreciated.

"On the eve of my departure from your hospitable shores," he said, "I am happy to take advantage of this occasion to say once more that nothing could be more cordial than the reception which your Government, as well as all classes of your people, have been so good as to accord to me everywhere I visited as the guest of the Nation during my stay in your Republic. I have been deeply impressed and exceedingly gratified by the great honor which President Taft was pleased to confer upon me in your Capital City of Washington."

"Although I have already bidden farewell, officially, to your Government, the hospitality of Seattle have been so good and kind as not to let me pass through the city without a reception and I feel I am still the guest of the Nation."

"Moreover, I have learned that your Government will be good enough to do me a great honor once again in giving me an escort of a squadron of the command of Admiral Southland upon my departure from this port tomorrow morning."

"For all these honors, hospitality and friendship, I feel to find words which may give adequate expression to my feelings of profound gratitude. I can only say, however, that it is my most pleasant duty to carry home with me those evidences of great good will shown towards my country by your Government and people, and I can assure you that they will doubtless be highly appreciated, not only by my government, but also by the whole Japanese nation."

Japan Is Extolled.

Judge Thomas Burke, who has twice been decorated by the Emperor of Japan, made the principal address of the evening. He related how Seattle and Japan had always been closely united in commercial affairs and extolled the virtues of Japanese statesmen and thanked Admiral Togo for his words in favor of international peace.

Admiral Togo sails for Japan in the steamship Tamba Maru tomorrow. A big waterfront demonstration has been planned in his honor.

The Percheron stallion, Togo, presented to Admiral Togo by Fred J. Kiesel, of Ogden, Utah, was taken aboard the Tamba Maru today. Admiral Togo will see the animal for the first time when he goes aboard ship in the morning.

WARRANT WAITS PRISONER

Bad Railroad Checks and Bunco
Game Traced to Chehalis Cell.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—As R. R. Boyer left the County Jail tonight after finishing a 60-day sentence for short-changing the ticket agent at Centralia, he was recaptured on a warrant issued from the court of Justice of the Peace Armstrong, of Tacoma, charging him with obtaining \$20 from Joseph Bauer, of that place, by a bunco game.

Boyer is the man who also is wanted by a number of the railroads for using bad checks which he had made himself.

TWO HURT NEAR CHEHALIS

VEITCH SUCCESSOR NAMED

New Milwaukee Agent Here Serves
Long Time in Middle West.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—W. P. Warner, for three years

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"The President called the session for the purpose of securing action by Congress upon the proposed trade agreement with Canada. But the gag rules and other approved or rejected by Congress, and then the two houses would adjourn until the regular session, which convenes in December. But there is a chance in the majority in the House of Representatives, which now became Democratic, and that party held a caucus in which a legislative program was outlined along the lines of legislative action, involving also the tariff and emergency measures.

Delay Is Result.

"This delayed action upon many other important measures, which with equal propriety might have been considered. The tariff bills passed by this Congress were not well considered and I do not believe our Democratic friends have strengthened themselves before the people, either by the tariff measures they have presented or by the gag rules under which they were put through."

"I favor a revision of the tariff as a whole, or schedule by schedule, on a moderately protective basis, and as soon as it can be done scientifically. The important legislation of the session includes the trade agreement with Canada; the admission of Arizona and New Mexico as states; and for whose admission I voted three times; the re-appointment bill, giving Oregon an additional Representative in Congress; the constitutional amendment (in conference), providing for the direct election of United States Senators by the people; the corrupt practices act, and others, which were of Republican origin, and for all which I voted."

"I expect to remain in Oregon until I return to Washington for the December session and will devote my time in visiting and studying as far as possible the needs of the district. Oregon is a growing state and has a great future before her. She has large tracts of public lands and I believe that all of these that are suitable for homes should be thrown open to entry and that every encouragement should be extended to the honest homeseeker who comes to our state."

Irrigation Great Need.

"The irrigation projects of the state must be provided for, as they must be extended so as to include vast areas now arid, and all projects must be completed as soon as practicable. Our agricultural and horticultural needs must be attended to and I am glad to say that the Government is now ready to co-operate with us and is aiding in the construction of these waterways."

"I believe that if this can be done by a system of pre-cooling, or other scientific method, the excellence of our fruit will command a market of its own at good prices."

"Then, when Oregon has produced her wealth of natural products, plans must be made for marketing them with a reasonable cost for transportation. One of the greatest considerations in reducing rates charged for transportation is good river and harbor facilities as transportation by rail."

Oregon has a number of excellent waterways, some of which have been partly improved or are in the process of improvement. These waterways can be made a very material factor in transportation and I have secured the official designation of William E. Humphrey, of the committee on rivers and harbors of the House of Representatives, who will inspect our waterways this fall on behalf of the committee, as far as possible."

"More Money to Be Sought."

"In addition to large appropriations which I will ask for our rivers and harbors at the next session, it will be my purpose also to secure appropriations for the erection of public buildings in a number of our leading cities of Western and Southern Oregon. I have already been instrumental in securing a number of appropriations for such purposes and desire to secure many more, as our cities are growing rapidly in population and annually increasing in the transaction of public business."

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CHURCHWORKER ELOPES

CHARMS OF WIFE OF SECTION
FOREMAN IRRESISTIBLE.

Deserted Husband Swears Out War-
rant in Roseburg to Recover
Little Son and Daughter.

ROSEBURG, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—The result of an acquaintance formed on a ranch near Yoncalla a year ago, Mrs. F. Chesbro, wife of a Southern Pacific section foreman at Corvallis, Idaho, with William Simpson, until recently employed as clerk in a store conducted by Mrs. Chesbro's mother at Myrtle Creek, Simpson is 27 years old and was an active Sunday school worker during his residence in Myrtle Creek. Mrs. Chesbro is 25 years of age and is considered pretty.

According to the story told by the woman's husband today, Mrs. Chesbro left her home Friday under the pretense of passing a few days with relatives at Myrtle Creek. Instead, she came to Roseburg, where she met Simpson, who quit his position on the previous evening after appropriating about \$120. It is thought the couple left here Friday evening for Bellingham, Wash., accompanied by Mrs. Chesbro's two children, a 9-year-old girl and a 4-year-old boy.

Chesbro knew nothing of the elopement until yesterday, when he received word from Mrs. Chesbro's mother that they had gone. Chesbro caused a warrant to be issued for Simpson's arrest today in hope that he may recover his children.

BORAH SEES NO CHANCE

Idaho Senator Says He Would De-
cline Vice-Presidency Anyway.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 28.—"I know there is no chance of my being nominated for Vice-President," said Senator Borah, of Idaho, in an interview here today. "If any real chance were presented I would feel that I should be compelled to decline at the moment it was offered."

Senator Borah, with a smile, acknowledged that he came within the list of progressives referred to by President Taft Saturday as "La Follette and his associates," and accused of attempted tariff making "for politics only."

"If there has been any tariff legislation without politics for the last 30 years, I have failed to observe it," said Senator Borah. "I doubt if the present tariff Board has sufficient data to adjust the tariff on a scientific basis. The situation as it now develops makes me anxious for a board with enlarged official powers."

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
