

TWO POSSES TAKE LONG TRAIL TODAY

Officers Expect Battle With Uncle Who Is Thought to Have Slain Twins.

TRACY STORY RECALLED

Parties Seeking John Tornow, Dead or Alive, Traversing Wildest and Densest Country in Northwest. Funeral Largely Attended.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Sept. 6.—(Special.)—Two posses under the direction of Deputy Sheriff Colin McKenzie and Carl Swartz are camped tonight, on the west fork of the Upper Satsop River and the other between the banks of that fork and the east fork of the Satsop, ready to take the trail tomorrow and follow it for a month, if necessary, for John Tornow, uncle of John and Will Bauer, the 19-year-old twin sons of Henry Bauer, whom Tornow is thought to have slain Sunday.

Sheriff Payette, who came in from the trail at dusk, says that he does not expect to hear from either posse for several days at least, and probably not for weeks. He says they have orders to bring back Tornow dead or alive, and that he is not likely to learn anything of their movements unless Tornow is captured or a battle ensues.

The officers rather expect such a battle. They do not believe that Tornow will tamely submit to arrest, and he is a crack marksman and thorough woodsman. Payette anticipates that his apprehension will be difficult.

Tracy Tale Recalled.

"It will be the Tracy story over again," he said. The posses have no clues to follow. They expect to break their own trails. They are miles away from telephone or telegraph and railroad facilities, and the country which they are traversing is one of the wildest and densest in the Northwest. With one of the two posses is Joe Watkins, a settler whom the officers found on the trail today and who, without knowing anything of the tragedy, told the deputies of fresh footprints which he had followed this morning in the "Big Burn" on the Upper Satsop, not far from the scene of the tragedy.

He was pressed into service, sworn in as a deputy by Payette and sent back with the men. This, in addition to other circumstances, confirms the officers in their belief that Tornow, though he has practically three days' start, is not far from the scene of the murder. Tornow is well equipped with weapons, having with him not only his own modern Army rifle, but the rifle and shotgun which he took from the slain boys.

He is also well supplied with provisions and ammunition. But the men tracking him are also skilled woods-men and marksmen and have been picked for their knowledge of the woods and their skill displayed on former man hunts.

Funeral of Twins Held.
The funeral of the dead twins was held this afternoon at the Bauer home. Neighbors from miles around attended the ceremony and the coffin was literally hidden beneath loads of flowers. The burial was in the same lot in the country cemetery which holds the body of Mary Bauer, the dead sister of the lads whose tragic death occurred but a few months ago.

The most notable theory advanced now for the murder is that Tornow thought the boys were shooting at him when the bullets they directed at a bear whizzed over his head at his forest camp. He had stolen a part of a beef and was smoking the meat. It is thought, at the time of the tragedy, when he heard the shots it is supposed that he presumed that they were intended for him and his own shots were the reply.

The father of the dead boys heard the five shots Sunday afternoon and though he did not know his brother-in-law was in the district, became uneasy when the lads did not return to their home Sunday. He searched as best he could that night and the next morning and then his alarm growing, notified the Sheriff's office. There was no lead found so far as known through relations between the families had not been of the best for some months. The ranches of the Tornows and the Bauers are about two miles apart. None of Mrs. Bauer's three remaining brothers attended the funeral today.

The posses are fortified with provisions for a month.

GERMAN CROPS FAILURES

Official Report Shows Damage Wrought by Drought and Pests.

BERLIN, Sept. 6.—The official report made public today describes conditions throughout Prussia in gloomy terms. The prolonged drought not only burned the crops but also caused such a plague of field mice, larvae and other crop destroyers that great fears are entertained for the winter.

Crops of potatoes and sugar beets are of the poorest kind. Fodder crops suffered so severely that owners are selling off their cattle, despairing of means to keep them through the winter. Pastureage already has partly or wholly shriveled up.

Little progress has been made toward winter crops. The soil is so hard that plowing is difficult and sowing impossible.

KEENE SHOWS NO FEVER

No Complications Are Looked for After Operation.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—James R. Keene is progressing favorably since he underwent an operation for stomach trouble and his condition today shows uninterrupted improvement.

The attending surgeon announced tonight that Mr. Keene's condition continues satisfactory. He shows no febrile symptoms. His pulse is normal and no complications are looked for.

NEW DANGER FACED

Beulah Binford May Be Held Accessory in Beattie Case.

COUSIN PAUL INVOLVED

Message From West to Judge Urges Holding of Him as Well as Girl—Detectives Are Investigating Charges.

Binford might be arrested and indicted as an accessory.

Chicagoan Steps Into Case.

Judge Watson today received a telegram from a man in Chicago, advising that Paul Beattie, a cousin of Henry, be indicted as an accessory, the Chicagoan declaring he would come to Chesterfield Courthouse to testify if desired.

Detective Scherer, who has been working up the case of the prosecution, tonight repudiated any such purpose as to Beattie, but said investigation as to Miss Binford had not been completed.

Investigation Is On.

"I do not attach much importance to it," said Scherer tonight, "and it is probable that Beulah Binford will be released tomorrow. However, we are working on the information received and will continue to do so regardless of her release tomorrow, or the verdict in the case."

Detective Scherer made this statement immediately after leaving the county jail, where he talked with Miss Binford tonight.

Beulah Binford Free.

The latter fretted at her long detention and accused the prosecution of connivance in preventing her from testifying because "they knew she could get a bigger contract on the stage" if she had been allowed to take the stand.

In jail today, Miss Binford, on learning that Henry Beattie had declared he hoped to eat dinner with his family on Sunday, exclaimed, "I'd give a million dollars to see him do it."

The argument over the instructions to be given the jury occupied three hours today.

The instructions are brief and will not be made public until delivered to the jury tomorrow.

BEATTIE IS VERY CHEERFUL

Accused Wife-Murderer Expects That Jury Will Disagree.

CHESTERFIELD COURTHOUSE, Va., Sept. 6.—Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., spent the day resting in his cell while counsel conferred with Judge Watson in Richmond as to the instructions to the jury.

As the time for a verdict draws nearer, the spirits of the prisoner are increasingly cheerful. He was optimistic today over the outcome. From his observation of the faces of the jurors, he expressed the opinion that some of the jurors might vote for conviction and some for acquittal, but that the jury at any rate would disagree.

"Boys, I hope to eat dinner at home Sunday," said Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., today, addressing the little group of newspaper men gathered on the lawn where he was exercising. "Do you expect an acquittal?"

"Well, to be entirely frank with you, I do not at this time. My own guess is a hung jury, seven for conviction and five for acquittal. However, I do expect to get out at the next sitting of court. I am innocent and cannot feel otherwise."

"It is said that Beulah Binford is

going on the stage. What do you think of that?"

"I don't know what she would do on the stage," said the prisoner. "She is good looking, that's true, but she has no voice and so far as I know, no talent. However, boys, I do think that a skit with Beulah and the Sheriff, Mr. Gill, would make an immense hit in Virginia. By the way, it's rather hard on Beulah to hold her all this time and then not let her go on the stand."

"Do you think the defense would have used her?"

"Certainly. Why not? Had she not been held incommunicado in jail, I'm positive Mr. Smith would have put her on."

"What do you think of the testimony in rebuttal yesterday?"

"Nothing to it," laughed the prisoner. "The witnesses made absolutely no impression on the jury. It's a wonder to me that a certain one of them had not been afraid of being struck dead, he lied so unmercifully."

At this juncture the Sheriff arrived with Henry's dinner and the interview ended.

Uneasiness or nervousness were not visible in his countenance or manner. The courthouse and its pastoral vicinity were clothed in peaceful quiet today. The 13 men in whose minds is locked the secret of Beattie's fate, rose at usual with the break of day and, after breakfast in the tiny hotel here, strolled on the green, singing, but the songs of mirth, however, but the strains of religious hymns, and the prisoner, not far away, heard them.

WOMAN MAYOR PLUCKY

MRS. WILSON, KANSAS TOWN'S EXECUTIVE, WON'T RESIGN.

She Goes to Kansas City to Seek Advice of Special Investigator of Tangle.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 6.—Mrs. Ella Wilson, Mayor of Hunnewell, Kan., came to town tonight and went immediately to Kansas City, Kan., where she held a meeting with C. W. Trickett, special investigator appointed by Governor Stubbs, to untangle the involved municipal affairs of Hunnewell.

Wilson has been having a great deal of trouble with her Council since she took office and she is determined to bring the city fathers to task.

"I'm going to run that little town of Hunnewell," she said tonight, "even if I have to call on Governor Stubbs for the militia to carry out my orders."

"My Councilmen haven't treated me fairly. They have refused to meet with me, and as an added affront they have refused to make a tax levy for next year's municipal expenses. I could reach no agreement with them, so I decided to come to Kansas City and talk the situation over with Mr. Trickett. He assures me that the state officials will co-operate with me to restore peaceful conditions in Hunnewell."

"Resign? Well, I should say not. I am going to fight this whole thing out, and I'm going to win."

15,000-MILE CHASE ENDS

Boston Police Catch Men Wanted as Robbers in Austria.

BOSTON, Sept. 6.—The 15,000-mile journey made by Boston police inspectors in their search for the men who stole several thousand dollars' worth of jewelry from Samuel Ullian, in February, 1910, ended today when they produced in court the last two of the quartet charged with the robbery.

The men, Joseph and Jacob Goldberg, were found in a jail in Austria.

SINNER MUST PAY

Gaynor Says Restitution Precedes Forgiveness.

REAL RELIGION DEFINED

Answering Man Who Confesses Perjury, New York Mayor Tells Him to Make Loss Good, if Remorse Is Genuine.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—Mayor Gaynor, who was a State Supreme Court Justice before he became Mayor, today received from a former New Yorker, now living in Los Angeles, a letter confessing that the writer had committed perjury in a lawsuit tried before Justice Gaynor and thereby unjustly defeated the opposing party. The writer said he had since been "converted" and was certain to confess so that he might be forgiven. The Mayor in reply wrote:

"According to my views you have to do more than this to be forgiven. You have to make amends. Where anything is stolen or got unjustly, it must be refunded before forgiveness can be accepted, if the sinner be able to refund. That is the way I understand it."

"So you had better tell me what was the case so that I may look it up and see what loss the defeated party sustained, and then you must restore his money to him or make good his loss. If this be not your view, I fear you are in error in supposing that you have got religion, and are a Christian."

The Mayor did not disclose the name of the convert.

Gas Flows 28,000,000 Feet a Day.

CALGARY, Alberta, Sept. 6.—While drilling in what is known as No. 4 well at Bow Island, a few days ago, drillers employed by the company, which recently obtained a charter to supply gas to this city, struck a flow which, according to experts will reach 28,000,000 feet each 24 hours.

BOARD REFUSES TO SANCTION STRIKE

Illinois Central Shopmen, It Is Believed, Will Recede From Position.

HOPELESSNESS IS SEEN

Machinists to Hold Further Conference Sunday and Meanwhile Indications Point to Early End of Trouble.

CHICAGO, Sept. 6.—After members of the international committee representing the unions involved in the dispute with the Illinois Central Railroad Company had refused today to sanction a strike of the Federated Shop Employees of the road, definite action of any character was deferred until members of the executive board of the International Association of Machinists, and member of the conference committee, protested against turning over responsibility to the system federation representatives until the executive board of his organization could be consulted.

James O'Connell, president of the machinists, and other board members were telegraphed for and will arrive Sunday. Meantime little change in the strike situation is expected and indications point toward no strike.

The international committee was in session again today seeking to suggest some way to adjust matters without a strike. At the close of the day's conference V. F. Kramer, secretary of the International Association of Blacksmiths and Helpers and chairman of the international committee, declared there was no news for the public.

It was reported that many of the international officers, after a careful investigation, felt that a strike of the shop employees at this time would be inadvisable, if not impossible.

None of the Illinois Central Federation committeemen would talk about the situation tonight, but at a late hour it was certain that no strike order had been issued. For the Illinois Central shopmen to attempt the struggle without support of the international unions, it was admitted, would be folly.
