

OLGA MENN HOME, BROKEN-HEARTED

Suicide of Fiance, Young Baron Rothschild, Great Blow to Chicago Beauty.

SHE DISCUSSES SORROW

Young Woman Declares Sad End of Scion of Famous House of European Financiers Will Always Be Cloud Over Life.

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—(Special.)—After grieving most of two years over the suicide of her fiance, young Baron Oskar Rothschild, Miss Olga Menn returned to her home in Chicago today, prepared to emerge from gloom into which the suicide cast her and to take up life where she left it when her nobleman sweetheart ended his life rather than give her up.

Few knew the identity of the slender young woman dressed in a dark cloth suit, her face covered with a mauve chiffon veil, who stepped out of the Twentieth Century train today. She was met by her father, Dr. Rudolph Menn, and her brother, Paul. Mrs. Menn was with her daughter. They have been traveling abroad since the death of young Baron Rothschild, who killed himself in his father's palace in Vienna.

Rothschild Family Cordial

The Menns went at once to the family residence, 1833 Lincoln avenue. Dr. Menn said that the established cordial relations with the Rothschild family before she left Europe.

"My daughter is in correspondence with the mother of the late Baron Rothschild," she said, "and is friendly with them. She saw them before she sailed and they think a great deal of her."

Miss Menn indicated that she will try to master her grief and be cheerful within some other home. She smiled sadly at her father and brother and endeavored to appear lively when questioned by visitors.

Romance Ideal One

"It was a real romance, beautiful, ideal. How awful that it should have been shattered. But it was, and I must make the best of it. Every woman must have some terrible sorrow in her life. Some have it, most of them. I believe, when they were grown old and have a family. Mine came in my girlhood and ever will be a cloud over my life."

MRS. SAMUEL BROOKS DIES

Journey to California of The Dalles Resident of No Avail.

THE DALLES, Or., Sept. 12.—(Special.)—Mrs. Samuel L. Brooks, one of the oldest settlers of this city, died at Pasadena, Cal., Monday night. Mrs. Brooks, in company with her husband, went to California a few months ago in the hope of benefiting her health. The body will be brought here for burial.

Mrs. Brooks, who before her marriage was Anna Pentland, was a native of England. She was born May 26, 1842. When eight years of age she came to the United States with her parents. Her father crossed the plains in 1845, soon after settling at Portland, where he established and installed the first water works for the city of Portland. He removed to this city with his family in 1862, putting in the original Dalles water system.

"At best, however, initiating legislation by and referring laws to the people is cumbersome and not easy of use. A companion to and supplement of these laws, the power of the executive, should be strengthened by giving to him the right to present bills for the consideration of the Legislature."

VOLCANO IS TERRIFYING

STREAMS OF LAVA THREATEN FAMOUS VINEYARDS.

Etna Continues Turbulent, Earth Shocks Frighten People and Railway Is Menaced.

GATANIA, Sicily, Sept. 12.—The activity of Mount Etna increases. Sixteen new fissures have opened and from the two nearest the base of the volcano a great stream of lava issues. It is moving at the rate of 1250 feet an hour and today had covered several miles toward Linguaglossa, northeast of Etna. Linguaglossa and Randazzo, to the northwest, are on elevations and are not threatened by the flow of lava, though storms of ashes beat on them. The residents, however, are panic stricken and some have deserted the town. Earth shocks continue.

The river of lava has invaded the centuries old forests of larch and pine and appears to be about to destroy the beautiful vineyards and nutwoods. It is expected soon to reach the railway line circulating Mount Etna at a point between Linguaglossa and Randazzo.

REDMOND SEEKS OWN WATER SYSTEM

REDMOND, Or., Sept. 11.—(Special.)—At the meeting of the City Council this evening an initial petition signed by over 50 per cent of the voters of the city was presented, asking that the new city charter and bond issue of \$27,000 for municipal water bonds be adopted by the city. The petition passed by a unanimous vote. These proceedings were taken at the suggestion of Denver bond company that has been negotiating with the city to buy the \$27,000 issue of city bonds for the construction of the city water works system, the water to be taken from Clime Falls, on the Deschutes River, four miles west of here. The new charter and bond issue were voted on and carried at a recent election held here, but the bond company held that to legal the matter should be presented to the Council by initiative from the people. (Continued From First Page.) up by the force of the wind, and when the machine struck it was with the tail piece and propellers downward, thus splintering both propellers and the rudder. Fowler remained in his seat until the aeroplane struck, when he was hurled against the motor and through the debris of the rudder to the ground.

Spectators by the score who had witnessed Fowler's fall from a distance rushed to his assistance and his injuries quickly received attention. His mechanics were soon on the scene, having arrived on the special train which is following his course. Some of the broken pieces of the air craft were replaced with substitute parts carried on the train, but others had to be sent to Reno for repairs.

Mishap Is Explained. In explaining his mishap, Fowler said that his steering gear had become suddenly blocked a few miles from the scene of the accident and he was helpless to direct his course. At the same time his elevating plane refused to work and his efforts to control his machine resulted in the disconnecting of the defective magnet wire which had given trouble earlier in the morning.

(Continued From First Page.) his course from side to side, or up and down, but was powerless to shut down his engine. Had he been able to shut off the motor he could easily have glided down to an open field.

Fowler declared tonight that he would continue his journey within three days.

Hurt Is Not Serious. "The accident to my machine has not stopped me. I'll fly to New York as soon as the damage has been repaired," said Fowler.

Fowler is not seriously hurt. His back was badly wrenched and his body bruised, but he was out of the Alta Sanitarium a few hours after he had been taken there. Explaining his accident, Fowler said:

"The rear control of the plane began to work badly and the machine kept swinging around in a circle. I tried to maneuver by warping the wings so that I could make a landing. An extra heavy gust of wind struck me and turned the plane squarely around. I tried to point her down, but the controller would not respond.
