

## COWBOYS A-CANTER RIDE TO ROUND-UP

Sturdy Range Men and Punchers Come From Afar to Try Skill at Sports.

### BRONCHO BUSTERS READY

Pendleton's Big Three-Day Wild West Show Opens Thursday With Programme Full of Thrills for Tenderfoot.

**UNTAMED BRONCHO TROWS SEVEN MEN IN ROW.**  
PENDLETON, Sept. 12.—(Special.)—Seven riders were thrown from one horse in rapid succession at Round-Up Park this afternoon in the trials which are held preparatory to the opening of the round-up Thursday. "Hot Foot" is the name of the animal, and he was picked up by John Spahn in the mountains of Union County. No cowpuncher has been successful in riding him.

PENDLETON, Sept. 12.—(Special.)—Already the clans are gathering in Pendleton. From the most out-of-the-way part of Central Oregon and Central Washington cowboys are galloping into town, and for the first time this city is realizing the great extent of the range country for which it is the focus.

The one thing in the mind of all the rangemen is the Round-Up, which opens its three-day session of cowboy sports and pastimes Thursday afternoon. Concessions and amusement places of every kind fill the side streets.

Pendleton still has room for thousands of visitors, for although the leading hotels have every vestige of accommodation reserved for the Round-Up days, the Commercial Club has listed every available room in the town—and there are more than 2000 of them. Free camping sites are provided and as at least four special trains will be parked in the yards for each day of the frontier show, Pendleton is not worrying about how to take care of those who have been attracted by the promise of unlimited fun.

**Prize List Long.**  
In addition to offering what has been declared the longest list of prize awards ever put up at any frontier show, and having a long and attractive programme, the Pendleton idea went even farther. Not a transcontinental traveler over the Harriman Oregon line and no one who used the Northern Pacific to reach this city can have failed to notice the great Round-Up sign, 20 feet high, which runs the whole length of the grandstand and which can be seen plainly from the windows of passing trains.

Decorated with two accurate pictures in colors of a bucking horse and rider, the great sign has attracted the attention of thousands for the last three months. It is said that there are but two signs in the world of greater size. The stadium, too, is unique in the world, largest affair of its kind in the world, rivaling in extent the mammoth colonnaded bullfight ring of Madrid.

In cash prizes and trophies dear to the range rider, more than \$5000 have been expended. Many cups are hung up for the championships of the Northwest, which have attracted the most famous broncho busters and lariat experts of the country.

**Cowboys' Blood Up.**  
From the point of view of the cowboy, the struggle between Buffalo Vernon and Dell Blanchett for the title of bull-dogging champion, in which each contestant must throw his animal with naked hands, is most absorbing interest. There will be a last year Vernon won the Northwest championship, Blanchett holding the same honor in the Southwest, and two weeks ago Blanchett defeated Vernon. Vernon is now in Pendleton training daily to recover his lost laurels.

Following are the principal events in the long programme, and the prizes offered:

Bucking-horse contest for championship of Northwest—First prize, \$100 and 40-foot 7-10-inch lariat, with improved brass head, \$100; second prize, \$50 and 40-foot 7-10-inch lariat, with improved brass head, \$50; third prize, \$25 and 40-foot 7-10-inch lariat, with improved brass head, \$25. 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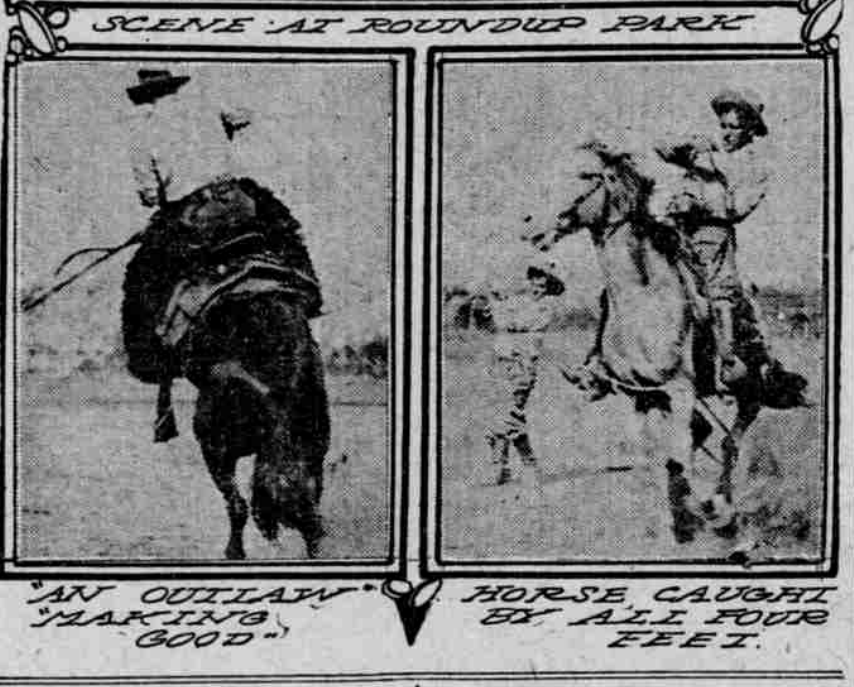
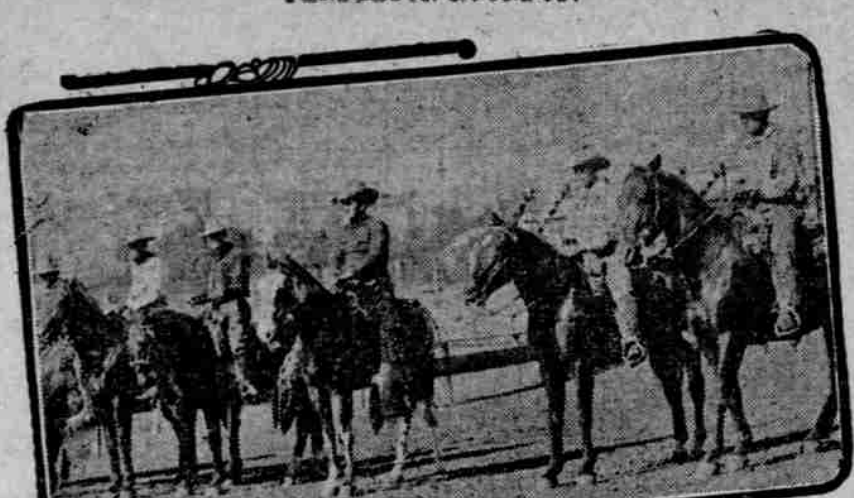
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DAREDEVIL RANGE RIDERS OF WEST COME FROM AFAR TO

Maverick race—A prize of \$5 and a 40-foot 7-10-inch lariat offered each day for the first man to get his rope on a wild steer, the steer to have 100 feet start. The contestants will start together at given signal.

Indian race—First prize, \$50; second prize, \$20; third prize, \$10. Fourth prize, \$5; fifth prize, \$2.50; sixth prize, \$1.50; seventh prize, \$1; eighth prize, \$1. One-half mile to be ridden on Indian ponies each day. The first four finishing on each of the first two days are required to compete in the final race Saturday.

Barred horse race—This race is exclusively for horses barred by the judges as undesirable for the other races. But one prize of \$20 to be offered, and the race will only be held on the first day of the Round-Up.

Indian square race of half a mile each day for three prizes—First prize, \$15; second prize, \$5; third prize, \$2.50.

There will also be barrel races, potato races and novelty races on horseback, which will vary each day and for which special prizes will be offered. Prizes consisting of bridles and martingales and revolvers will be offered to cowboys and cowgirls with best outfits.

Because the Round-Up is an amateur show for amateurs, the judges will reserve the right to exclude from competition those known as professional "Wild West Show" performers, and this prerogative, it is asserted, will be exercised.

**EDDY DEFENDANTS WIN**  
SUPREME COURT TO RULE ON  
LAW POINT INVOLVED.

Highest State Tribunal Will Settle Whether Church Request Contravenes Statutes.

CONCORD, N. H., Sept. 12.—The petition of the defendants in the litigation over the will of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, that the Supreme Court of New Hampshire should be asked to rule on the question of law at issue in the case before a trial is held in the Superior Court, was granted by Chief Justice Wallace of the latter court today.

The question of law is whether the residue clause of the will, leaving about \$2,000,000 to the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Boston, is invalid because of New Hampshire and Massachusetts statutes forbidding a bequest of more than a stipulated amount far below the value of this residue to any single church, is valid.

George W. Glover, of Lead, S. D., Mrs. Eddy's son and Dr. E. J. Foster Eddy, of Waterbury, Vt., her adopted son, seek to have the residuary clause declared illegal and the residue divided between them as next of kin.
