REV. A. D. WATTERS SAYS LURE

OF WEST IS STRONG.

On Trip to Atlantic Coast Portland

Minister Finds Many Persons

Seeking Information.

People of the Middle West are turning their eyes toward Oregon as the promised land, says Rev. A. D. Watters, a prominent Methodist minister of this city, who has just returned from a trip of nearly four months in the East and Middle West.

Rev. Mr. Watters visited his old home in lowa, whence he went to Chi-

of nearly four months in the East and Middle West.
Rev. Mr. Watters visited his old home in Iowa, whence he went to Chicago, and from there to his birthplace in Ohio. He also sojourned at Baitimore, where his father was born, and visited a number of Eastern cities, including Washington, D. C. He was present when Aviator Atwood endircied the Washington monument and landed on the White House lawn, where the President greeted him.

Rev. Mr. Watters did a little missionary work in the way of advertising the advantages of Oregon and her resources. He sent in to the Commercial Club some 50 names of persons who wished to investigate Oregon with a view to settling here, and he says that of this number several are actually on the way here. He found the most interest in Oregon among the farmers of the Middle West and particularly among young men who had recently married or were just starting out in life and who desired to invest in farms. "Many inquiries were made concerning the timber, dairying and various forms of agriculure," said Rev. Mr. Watters, "but what excited the most interest was the climate and the fruit." Rev. Mr. Watters found a general condition of failure of the crops in many places. "In Eastern Colorade," he said, "the hay crop and the corn crop are dried up and in a desperate effort to obtain food for their stock, the farmers are making Russian thistles into hay and disposing of their porkers because they have nothing to feed them. The Eastern Colorade indeed in many places is being abandoned. It is to be had for from \$5 to \$10 an acre.

CLOSE FIRM NEAR TOP

Only Reaction in Prices at Chicago Follows Break in Corn Pit. Canadian Farmers Storing Until After Election.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—Prevalence of martial law in Spain and Vienna had a part in making the wheat market firm today. The close was %c net higher for the active months, but 4c off for September. Corn finished 4 to % lower than last night, cats up a shade to 1.9 %c and hog products varying from 20c decline to 17%c advance. In addition to the warlike conditions in the Spanish and Austrian dominions, cause for measiness by speculators short of wheat developed in the raising of the German bank rais and in the fail of British consols. Evidence that Canadian farmers were storing their whest until after the settlement of the reciprocity issue had far from a calming effect on the market. The only important reaction during the day followed a sharp break in corn futures. Simultaneously a generous increase in the total of the world's stock of wheat was announced.
