HARMON QUICK TO **GRASPBIGCHANCE**

Governors' "Conference" With Supreme Court Excellent Political Capital.

BOOM IN NEED OF SUCCOR

Ohio Executive's Presidential Hurrah Has Been Faint but Spring Lake Meeting Came to Resone Very Obligingly.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Sept. 10.—Governor Harmon, of Chio, won the admiration of politicians generally by the smooth way in which he pulled off the Euprame Court conference stunt at the recent conference of Governors at Spring Lake.

While this move did not appear as the suggestion of Ohlo's chief executive, his championship of the idea, and the later fast that he was chosen to head a delegation of Governors to "confer" with the Supreme Court was indication aplenty that the move was made in his political interest, and developments will show that Governor Harmon is fully alive to the importance of the opportunity now shead of him. It is perfectly apparent that Governor Harmon will inject the issue of states rights into the campaign next year, he himself appearing as the principal champion of the idea. As head of the delegation of Governors, he will lead the march on Washington, and if he falls in his effort to present his appeal to the Supreme Court, he will not fall in getting his appeal before the public which, after all is the highly essential thing which Harmon hopes to necomplish.

Being a good lawyer, Governor Harmen knows, and he knew at Spring Lake, that a delegation of Governors has no recognized standing before the United States Supreme Court, and he probably still has serious doubt of his ability to get recognition before the court when he comes to Washington to but into the Minnesota rate case. However, that never for an instant deterred Governor Harmon. He was seeking publicly and got it, and he will get even more when he comes to make his grandstand play.

The United States Supreme Court renders its decisions in conformity with the Constitution and the law. It is not awayed by political influence, by sectional or local opinion, or by sentiment. There is no doubt in the world that its decision in the Minnesota rate case will be the same after the appeal, or attempted appeal by Governor Harmon as it would have been had the lovernor not been delegated to instruct the court in its duties.

If Judge Sanborn's decision is in conformity with the Constitution and the law, it will be received, without any appeal from the Governor.

Boom in Heavy Sen.

The Harmon Presidential boom has been laboring in a heavy sea ever since it was launched. It has not taken hold; there has been little enthusiasm; there has been no noise. Governor Harmon himself resilies this, and was just shrewd enough to use the Governors' nonference to promote his own pollulical fortunes, and the Governors were sailly duped into becoming a party to the scheme.

Governor Harmon will keep to the front of the movement to protect a states, and he unquestionably will go into the Democratic convention next year as the champion of state rights.

This is Harmon's first move indicating keen political foresight. If he has a few more trumps of equal value up his sleeve, he may be able to win out over Wilson, Clark and all other comers. But he will have to move fast to cover lost ground.

He and Robert Strong, manager of the estate, will leave for the East next week to complete the details of the lease with the heirs there.

"The major part of the money to be represented in this enterprise is Portland capital," said Mr. Holtz, "My brother, Max Holts, of New York, is not connected with our syndicate in any way. We have the enterprise sufficiently financed to assure the immediate establishment in Portland of a mammoth department store. Plans for the building and of the entire project will be announced in full as soon as the lease on the Mead property is signed."
