MONETARY SYSTEM HIT. ROBERT W. BONYNGE SPEAKS TO PORTLAND BUSINESS MEN. Member of Federal Commission Details Existing Evils and Outlines Proposed Remedy.

Severe arraignment of a monetary system under which the banks of the country must "bend their knees to the old lady of Threadneedle Street," as during the panic of 1907, and proposal of a plan of finance under which the banks would be highly organized among themselves, formed the subject of an address by Robert W. Bonyngue, for several terms Representative in Congress from Colorado, and at present a member of the United States Monetary Commission, before 125 bankers and business men at a dinner at the Commercial Club Wednesday night.

Mr. Bonyngue did not advocate a revolution of the banking system, but a building up upon the material in hand. The plan, he said, would be a decentralization of the banking system, and would obviate having all the money of the country centered in one place, a condition, he said, always liable to cause a money panic.

"There is no reason," he said, "why any solvent business man of the country should go into bankruptcy. Under our present system of individual banking a bank cannot even accommodate its customers in time of financial stringency, and it's not the bank's fault, either, but the fault of the system, for it has no place to turn to, and cannot issue paper, except illegally, as in 1907. Under the system, which the commission contemplates submitting to Congress January 5, any business interest, if solvent, could get credit."

Mr. Bonyngue said that the commission found three great faults with the present system. First, the scattering of the reserves of banks among the thousands of individual banks of the country; secondly, a failure to provide a legal method whereby banks can cooperate for their mutual protection, or for the regulation of the general monetary conditions of the country; and third, the ineffectuality of the country's bank note currency.

On a measure which the commission will strongly urge, is the giving to the proposed banking association note issuing powers. The association, which he outlined, was a system organized along the lines of the political subdivision system. It begins with a local association, of not more than ten banks, which would associate themselves into a district. There would be 15 districts in the country. The 15 districts would constitute the National association. In every district there would be a branch of the National association, which would be supreme on all financial questions in that district. Ample safeguards would be provided, Mr. Bonyngue said, to prevent the association from falling into the hands of self-seeking interests.

FOUR FOUND GUILTY

Parasites Are Sentenced to Serve 90 Days at Quarry.

GRAND JURY HEARS TRIALS

Investigators in Municipal Court as Men They Seized Are Sent to Rockpile.—Appeal Probable. Another to Appear Today.

The grand jury sat in the Municipal Court yesterday afternoon, during the trials of five parasites, whom it ordered arrested last week. Four were found guilty by Judge Tarwell, and each was sentenced to serve 90 days on the rockpile. The case of the remaining one will be heard this afternoon.

The men found guilty are Walter Herman, Gabriel Masnet, Louis Goodrich and Gustav Legar. Victor Goodrich's case was set for this afternoon, as he asked to have Health Officer Wheeler testify in his behalf. The men convicted have five days in which to appeal, the court has decided that their bail shall be \$1000 each. The attorneys for the accused announced that they will appeal.

All the men convicted were arrested by County Detective Maher, assisted by City Detectives Coleman and Moloney, Thursday night, at the Milwaukee Tavern. The right of the detectives to cross the county line was questioned by the defense. District Attorney Cameron, and the foreman of the grand jury were put on the stand, the former to give an opinion on the subject, and the juryman to repeat the instructions the detectives had received from the grand jury in the case. Both declined to answer.
