OREGON SPECIES TO RULE hang!

FARM WILL TRAVEL

Experts in Agriculture From State College Will Give Practical Demonstrations to Farmers in Deschutes Valley.

What promises to be a veritable farm on wheels will leave Portland in a special train on the O.-W. R. & N. tracks next month for a 10-day trip Into the Deschutes Valley and to the principal points in Sharman, Morrow and Gilliam Counties, for the purpose of demonstrating to the farmers of those sections the best manner of obtaining the biggest returns from their Isrid.

R. B. Miller, traffic manager of the Q.-W. R. & N. Company, is arranging for the trip, but it will be manned by a corps of experts from the State Agri-cultural College at Corvallis. They will have charge of the exhibits and will talk to the farmers at every stop-

ping place An interesting feature of the train will be the cars representing the hog and the chicken industries, to which the railroads are endeavoring to call special attention.

Practical Specimens Shown.

Practical Specimens Shown. One car will be fitted up to repre-sent the latest ideas in housing hogs. Two gilts or each the Berkshire. Po-land China and Duros breads will be contained, hesides foor specimens of cross-bred hogs to demonstrate the proper type of packing pork that can be grown successfully in Oregon. In-dividual hog houses will be construct-ed in the car and the manner of feed-ing, nursing and breeding will be shown.

shown. Another car will be a miniature poultry yard. Live chickens will be carried. Typical buildings, nests and roosts will be shown and demonstra-tions calculated to instruct on the best manner of caring, feeding, protecting sgainst disease and lice will be given. Bracks of conting that we best dested against disease and lice will be given. Brends of poultry that are best adapted to the Gregon climate and soll will be used as specimens. Feeding devices and watering troughs will be shown. A third car will contain actual speci-mens of Oregon field peas and methods whowing how they can be grown and fed successfully and profitably. Peas and pigs, Mr. Miller believes, are likely to become the sources of greatest reve-nue to the Oregon farmer and for this reason he has christened the train the "Hog and Field Pea Special."
