Oregon Editors Would Foil Ambitious Schemes of Free-Space Chasers.

STATE PUBLICITY FAVORED

Oregon State Editorial Association Concludes Successful Convention With Election of Board of Officers.

A general attack on publicity bureaus, press agents and scheming advertising agencies marked the close yesterday afternoon of the annual convention of the Oregon State Editorial Association.

"Scheming advertising agencies and concerns are carrying on a business," declared Hofer, "which is depriving us of a vast amount of money each year and we like a bunch of muttonheads, we are letting them use us as tools for their schemes."

"We favor a stronger and closer organization of the bona fide newspaper secretaries and managers, the organization rigidly to exclude all forms of graft advertising or any organized advertising agency from the press."

"The association also went on record as favoring the giving of wide publicity in all public affairs. The following resolution was adopted:

"The State Press Association desires to go upon record as favoring the utmost publicity in public affairs, and we demand restoration of the general custom of most states and the historical practice of this commonwealth of the publishing of all proceedings of all legislative amendments of the constitution."

Marvin Walker Is Unable to Have Wife Indicted.

WOMEN CAPTIVES' TRIALS ARE BEGUN

First of Disorderly Throng Heard Says She Will Close Place When Powers Order.

DECISION IS WITHHELD

Judge Tarwell to Weigh Testimony of All Caught in Raids Before Reaching Verdict—Fouts Says Cases Are Mere Plot.

"Violet Martin was the first person placed on trial when the Municipal Court began yesterday afternoon the long grind of disposing of cases brought about by raids of disorderly houses. Sergeant Riley testified that he had visited the woman's house about two weeks ago, when she frankly admitted that she was running a disorderly house in a quiet way."

Judge Tarwell announced that he would withhold his decision until the testimony in the other cases had been heard, and another case was taken up at once.

JUSTICE TO BE ARRESTED

Bean Issues Warrant for John W. Williams in Whisky Case.

Federal Judge Bean has issued a bench warrant for John W. Williams, a Justice of the Peace on the Siletz Indian reservation. Williams was subpoenaed to appear as a witness in the trial of Vincent Wentock and Stewart Rooney. The case went to the jury, and he did not appear.

LIQUOR CASE DISMISSED.

The case of the Government against Frank W. Hurlbert, charged with having introduced liquor on Siletz Indian reservation, was dismissed by Federal Judge Bean yesterday upon request of Deputy United States District Attorney Maguire, the ground for dismissal being that evidence was insufficient for conviction.

Woodward Avenue Receives Title of Ellsworth Street.

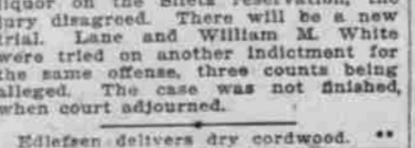

Committee Named to Conduct Employment Bureau—Places Listed.

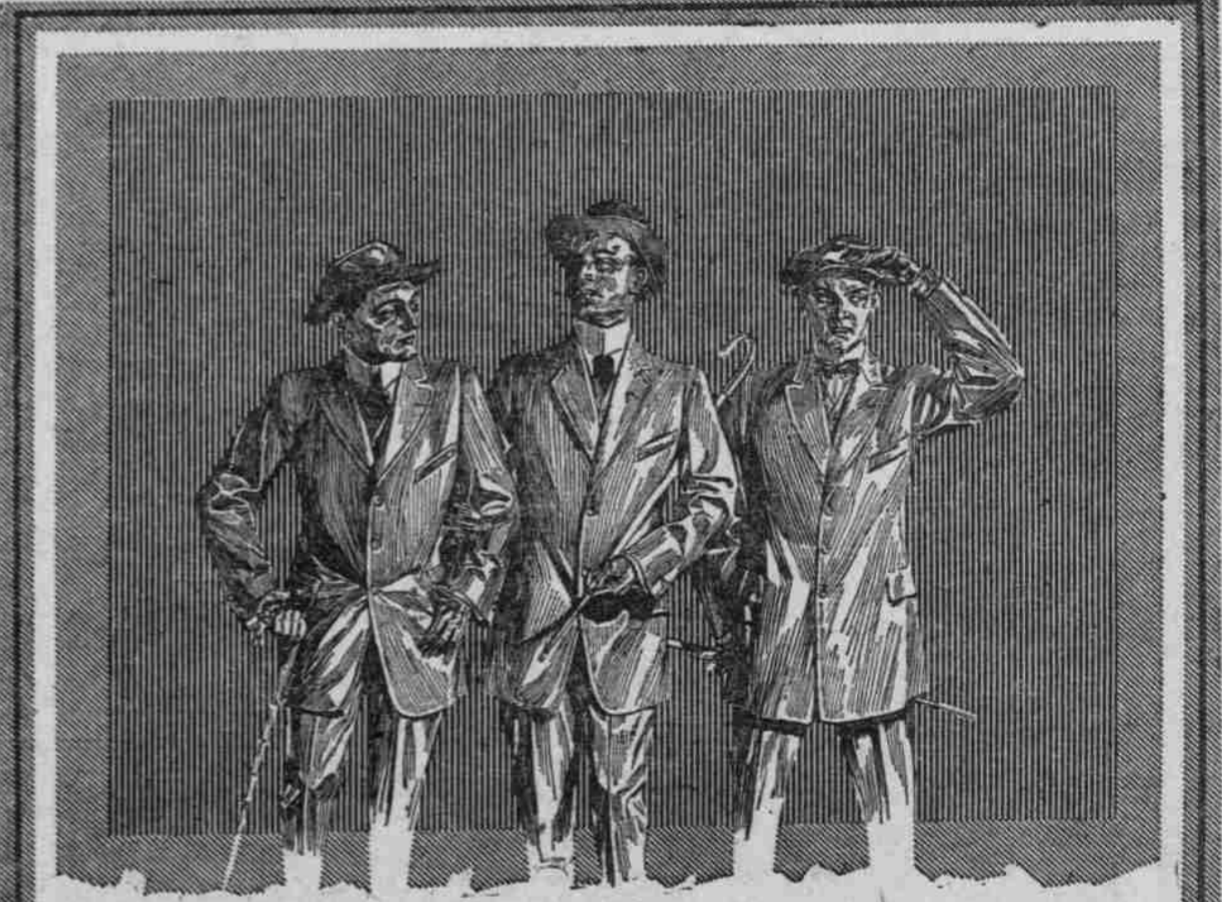
