Dismissal of the case against Dr. Mallory resterday marked the outcome of the third attempted prosecution of a riminal charge against him since he opened an office in this city in May, 1906. The first two cases were brought at the instigation of the Medical Board, also, and they were filed in the Municipal Court, where in both instances a jury returned a verdict of acquittal. In receiving the verdict in the second prosecution last March, Municipal Judge Taxwell from the bench advised representatives of the Medical Board not to bring another case of the same kind in his court, as he would order its dismissal as soon as the papers were filed and without the formality of a trial.

State Asks Diamissal.

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But the Medical Board resolved to take another chance at Dr. Mallory, and 17 days ago caused his arrest on the identical charge of which he had been twice acquitted. This case, however, was brought in the Justice Court. Dr. Mallory on a number of occasions demanded a trial, but on one pretext and another the time of trial was deferred; in fact, no fixed time was set. Tiring of the dilatory tactics being employed. Justice of the Peace Oison last Friday made the announcement that he would dismiss the case unless the representative of the District Attorney's office or Samuel White, special prosecutor for the Medical Board, would show some law authorizing the prosecution.

SUSPENDED BODY FOUND

Old Man Doubles String With Which to Make Death Noose.

The body of a man, supposed to be A Lenandowsky, age 31, was found hanging under an old shed near

The plans contemplate the installation of mains extending along both sides of the river, to be used exclusively for fire purposes. Utilmately, there will be a pumping station, but the bond issue is insufficient for this at the present time and it was determined to start the work of placing the first part of the system at once and to complete the work later. This will give the business sections excellent protection.

Excellent premiums were obtained for improvement bonds of the aggregate value of \$516,670, which bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent and run for 16 years. The highest premium was paid by the United States National Bank for \$5000 worth, being 4.1. The largest individual allotment was to A. E. Eckhart. \$256,000 worth, at a premium of 2.81. The remainder was distributed among bidders. A total of \$3,000,000 in bids was entered.

John B.
