**NATUROPATH, FREE, SUES STATE BOARD**

**Dr. W. E. Mallory Is Released From Charge of Practicing Without License.**

**INJUNCTION THEN ASKED**

**Practitioner Alleges That Physicians Are Prompted by Desire to Damage Him—Decree Is Asked to Bar Further Arrests.**

Within three hours after a charge against him of practicing medicine without a license had been dismissed in the Justice Court, Dr. W. E. Mallory, a graduate naturopath, through his attorneys, Jay Bowerman and W. H. Abel, yesterday instituted suit in the State Circuit Court for an injunction permanently restraining the members of the State Board of Medical Examiners from further prosecuting or otherwise interfering with him in the practice of naturopathy. Enumerated as defendants in the suit are the following members of the State Medical Board: Drs. Harry F. McKay, R. C. Coffey, Herbert S. D. Nichols, E. B. McDaniel, F. E. Moore and H. L. Henderson.

Dismissal of the case against Dr. Mallory yesterday marked the outcome of the third attempted prosecution of a criminal charge against him since he opened an office in this city in May, 1910. The first two cases were brought at the instigation of the Medical Board, and they were filed in the Municipal Court, where in both instances, a jury returned a verdict of acquittal. In receiving the verdict in the second prosecution last March, Municipal Judge Tawwell from the advice of representatives of the Medical Board did not bring another case of the same kind in his court, as he would order its dismissal as soon as the papers were filed and without the formality of a trial.

But the Medical Board resolved to take another chance at Dr. Mallory, and 17 days ago caused his arrest on the identical charge of which he had been twice acquitted. His case, however, was brought in the Justice Court, Dr. Mallory on a number of occasions demanded a trial, but on one pretext and another the trial was postponed. In fact, no fixed time was set. Tiring of the dilatory tactics being employed, Justice of the Peace Tawwell Friday made an announcement that he would dismiss the case unless the representative of the District Attorney's office or Samuel White, special prosecutor for the Medical Board, would show some law authorizing the prosecution.

Deputy District Attorney Denison, after a consultation yesterday with Mr. White, who agreed to the action, went before Justice of the Peace Olson and moved the dismissal of the case against Dr. Mallory.

Dr. Mallory maintains that the prosecutions preferred against him of criminal nature are in violation of the statute of the Medical Board at the expense purpose of damaging his business and his personal rights. He makes the charge that the prosecution of him, as well as that of others, by the Medical Board has been conducted with funds improperly derived from fees collected by the Board from applicants taking examinations before that body.

**Restraint of Board Asked.** In his complaint against the Medical Board, Dr. Mallory represents that he is a graduate of the American School of Naturopathy, of New York, and that he has maintained offices in this city and followed his profession as a naturopath for over five years. Counsel for Dr. Mallory asks the court for a decree permanently enjoining the defendants from molesting him or his successors in office from bringing any action of criminal nature against him for the practice of his profession as a naturopath or for practicing anything except medicine and surgery as defined in the Oregon statutes. The further request is made that the Medical Board be enjoined permanently from diverting its funds for bringing criminal actions against any person or persons and for any other purpose than the payment of the expenses of the members of the board, as is contemplated and authorized by the laws of the state.

**MAINS TO BE PLACED**

**CITY COUNCIL RECOMMENDED TO SELL BOND ISSUE.**

**Bids for Site of New City Administration Building Will Be Opened Shortly.**

Action looking toward the installation of a system of reinforcing mains in the water-front district was taken by the Ways and Means Committee of the City Council yesterday afternoon, when it recommended the sale of bonds for that purpose. The estimated cost of this work is \$140,000.

Excellent premiums were obtained for improvement bonds of the aggregate value of \$14,670, which bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent and run for 10 years. The highest premium was paid by the United States National Bank for \$5000 worth, being 4 1/2. The largest individual allotment was to A. E. Eckhart, \$250,000 worth, at a premium of 1 1/2. The remainder was distributed among bidders. A total of \$3,000,000 in bids was entered.

John B. Coffey, chairman of the Police Committee of the Executive Board, was present to urge the sale of \$200,000 of bonds for the purpose of constructing a new police administration building. Members of the committee admitted that they will open bids for sites at the next regular meeting. They will determine upon a plan of construction that they expect to have the bonds sold.

**AUTO WILL BE MERCURY**

**Postmaster Merrick Supersedes Cart Collection on East Side.**

An automobile runabout will hereafter be used by the local postoffice for making collections on the East Side, as the Postmaster-General authorized Postmaster Merrick yesterday to employ the runabout in place of a horse and cart, used heretofore. This will extend the evening mail collection service of the East Side business sections, making it possible for business men to place their letters at 5 o'clock at night, have them collected the same evening, and forwarded from the main office on the first outgoing mail.
